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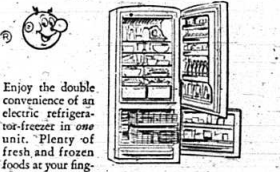

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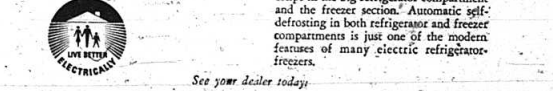

### County Banks Close Two Days Next Week

The Bank of Mt. Vernon and the Citizens Bank of Brodhead will both be closed Monday, May 30 and Friday, June 3, according to a joint announcement by the two banks. President of the Bank of Mt. Vernon and R. C. Anderson, first vice-president and cashier of the Citizens Bank at Brodhead.

This year, Memorial Day and Confederate Memorial Day fall in the same week. According to a legal bulletin from the Kentucky Bankers Association of Louisville, Memorial Day is a major holiday and banks must close on Saturday, June 4.

June 3 is a minor holiday and banks may remain open, but if they do they are required to close on the following Saturday.

If a band wishes to remain open on Saturday, June 4, the bulletin continues, it must close not only on Monday, but also on the minor holiday Friday, June 3.

## Reception Honors Miss Bryant Retiring After This School Year

The Mt. Vernon School faculty sponsored a surprise reception Monday evening honoring Miss Myrtle Bryant on her retirement from the teaching profession.

Some 50 persons attended the reception at the home of Mr. and Mrs. James W. Lambert.

Some of Miss Bryant's favorite songs were sung. Mrs. Edna Fain read the history of Miss Bryant's teaching career. A set of vases and a hand painted china table lamp were presented to Miss Bryant.

The teaching career of Miss Bryant began in 1906, when she was asked to finish a school from which a teacher had resigned. The school was at Langford Station, approximately a mile and a half from what later became the Hummel School.

At that time she lived on a farm and rode horseback, approximately six miles to her school. She had to cross Roundstone Creek over which there was no bridge. Frequently, after a hard rain, she was unable to get back home and had to stay in the community.

The next year, 1909, she took the teachers' examination which was sent out from the State Department at Frankfort. Two days were required to complete the examination on the 11 subjects.

At that time certificates were of three grades. A first class certificate was issued on an 85 percent paper; a second and third class on lower grades. A first class certificate qualified a teacher to go into the largest school; a third class into the smallest schools and a second class to those schools between.

Miss Bryant was issued a first class certificate. That year she taught the whole school of seven months in the Buckeye School, her home school. She received \$35 per month.

In 1910 she went to Marietta, Va. to teach in the Negro Creek School beyond Brodhead. Here she was held in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Matt Stevens, parents of Colson Stevens. They charged \$10 a month for board and pastured her horse.

In 1912 she began a three-year period of teaching in the Pine Hill School. The first year there were two teachers, but only one large room. She moved the lower grades to improvised seats at behind the school house. Most classes were held out in the open until

# Farm And Home News

## TOBACCO TALK

From present reports it seems that tobacco plants will be in short supply over most of the state. In many areas, they will be extremely late. If the crop is to be set at the normal time, it will require the best plant bed management possible to have enough plants to do the job.

Russell Hunt, Ira Massie and George Everette, Extension Specialists in tobacco are asking for reports to be made by county agents of the plant situation in each county.

There will be three categories to report on:

1. If you will have enough plants to set your crop.
2. If you will need plants from outside your county.
3. If you will have a surplus of plants.

When the Extension Specialists receive these reports, they will tabulate the information and inform any one desiring plants, where they may be obtained.

I would appreciate it if you would help me determine the plant situation for Rockcastle County in order that I might let the Extension Specialists know. If some of you in the county have surplus plants maybe you would want to help some one who is in need of

## READ THE PESTICIDE LABEL

Some simple rules for the grower.

Growers of food crops frequently ask, "How can I be sure, without expensive laboratory analyses, that my crops will not contain too much residue?" Generally, growers can avoid excessive pesticide residues on harvested crops by carefully following directions on the pesticide label.

The labeling for all pesticides shipped interstate, must be registered with the U. S. Department of Agriculture under the Federal Insecticide, Fungicide, and Rodenticide Act. All labeling submitted to the Department of Agriculture with applications for registration is thoroughly examined to remove or modify any directions for use on particular crops which do not appear to fulfill the requirements of that law. Among other considerations, USDA determines whether any pesticide is likely to leave excessive chemical residues on the harvested raw agricultural commodities.

The grower will be safe if he follows these simple rules:

1. Use a pesticide only on the crops for which its use is recommended by the manufacturer on the registered label.

2. Use the pesticide in the amounts specified on the label.

3. Apply the pesticide only at the time specified on the label.

If a crop is not named on the label of a particular pesticide, this may mean that no residue of that pesticide is permitted on that crop; and hence the treated crop could not be shipped if it contains a residue of that chemical.

It is not safe to reason that "if a little is good, more will be better." Observation of the recommended time of application gives assurance that the pesticides will not contaminate the edible portion of the fruit or vegetable, or will have been removed or sufficiently decreased by weathering, decomposition, or other process so that at harvest the residue will not be excessive.

If airplane or other contact applicators are employed, make sure that they know their business and follow good agricultural practices.

nearly Thanksgiving. Pupils and teachers were brown as berries but never healthier. Nobody had even a cold, she reported. By the next year an extra room had been provided.

In 1914 she came to Mt. Vernon School to teach third and fourth grades. That year the graduating class consisted of two members, Homer Proctor and Logan Bryant, her brother. Teaching regularly and going to college between times to keep her certificate up-to-date, kept her too busy to finish your high school work. In 1918 she taught a high school course and earned a credit that she lacked for graduation. She received her diploma with the other eight of the graduating class.

Miss Bryant taught the eighth grade class until 1929, when she was promoted to the English field in high school. Among those in her first high school class were: Mrs. Marie Cox; Mrs. Ruth Lambert; Mrs. Edna Fain and Charlie Hines. Miss Bryant taught English

at Mt. Vernon until 1935 when she resigned to become Superintendent of the Rockcastle County Schools. After serving in that capacity for 13 years she returned to Mt. Vernon where she has taught English and been Attendance Officer until the present.

One summer Miss Bryant was employed as telegraph operator with her brother. After attending Berea College and the University of Kentucky Miss Bryant received an AB Degree from Eastern State College in 1934 with a major in English and a minor in Social Science.
