

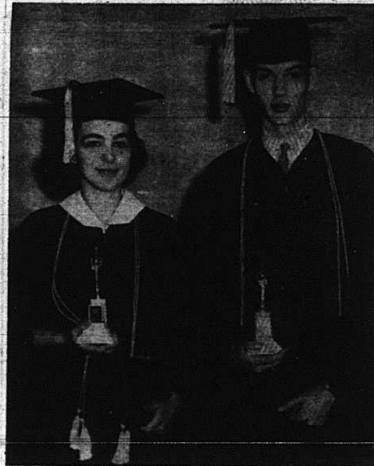

Farm And Home News

Anthraxose is a destructive fungus that can destroy buckeye beds has made its appearance. It has been found in about eight counties. Rowan, Magoffin, Morgan, Marion, Scott, Henry, Washington and Hart. Recent warm humid days have helped the fungus get well established. Anthracnose causes small tan spots on tobacco leaves which later turn a papery white. The spots gradually enlarge while stunting the plants.

The following materials at the rates recommended give good control if application is started when the plants are small.

Ferbam (Fermate), 2 pound per 50 gallon water or, 5 level tablespoons, or 15 percent dust; Zineb, 1 1/2 pounds per 50 gallon water, or 1/2 level tablespoons, or 10 percent dust; Maneb, 1/4 pound per 50 gallon water or, 1 level teaspoon, or 2 percent dust.

In spraying use 3 to 6 gallons of any of the above sprays per 100 square yards per application depending on size of plants

larger plants use more. Use one and one half to four pounds of any of the above dust per bed per application. It is more effective to spray or dust with the canvas off, but it can be done through the cotton.

Spray or dust twice a week until setting is complete.

The antibiotics such as streptomycin, used for wildfire control, are of no value with anthracnose control.

Tobacco Field Area Needs Protection Against Insects

Fields where tobacco crops will be grown this season should be treated now to protect the newly transplanted crop against certain insects. If a 1/2 lb is needed treatment most are those newly plowed from sod, or fields that have a past history of wireworms.

According to Richard Thurston, UK Experiment Station entomologist, the insects for which the treatment is recommended are wireworms, flea-beetle larvae and some underground culicid larvae.

Materials and rates: Aldrin

and Heptachlor at 3 pounds per acre; or Chlordane at 6 pounds actual an acre; or Dieldrin at 1 1/2 pounds actual an acre.

Distribute evenly over the ground, Thurston says, then disk in the materials to a depth of three to four inches. Do NOT plow the materials in, he cautions. The materials can be applied in any form that helps even distribution, emulsion concentrate sprays, dusts or wettable powder sprays.

Thurston reminds farmers that this treatment should go on about two to four weeks before transplanting will be started. He says the Station does NOT recommend adding any insecticides to the water in setter barrels.

On the day before transplanting, Thurston says, plant beds should get an application of DDT. This should be at a rate of 1 pound per 100 square yards of bed if the 10 percent dust is used, or 12 level tablespoons in water of the 50 percent wettable powder for the same area.

Pictures: Where To Hang Them?

"Where and how should I arrange the pictures in my home for the best results?" is a question homemakers often ask.

The modern trend is toward hanging one larger picture rather than several that are too small to see and enjoy. Too many small pictures and objects hanging in a group can give a cluttered effect.

"One picture should hold the spot of interest in a room—perhaps over the couch or mantle. In the same room, two or more smaller pictures might be used to give the effect of one large picture. Remember that not all walls need pictures; some free walls are restful.

Always hang a picture over some piece of furniture; this gives the picture support—otherwise, it may appear to be

sliding off the wall. How high over the furniture should the picture be hung? Measure the height of the picture; the bottom edge of the picture should be no farther than this distance from the piece of furniture.

Pictures can be used to balance accessories on the furniture beneath them or elsewhere in the room; but never set a tall accessory in front of a picture. Use pictures that match the space in which they are to be placed—horizontal pictures in horizontal spaces, vertical pictures in vertical spaces, etc.

Space between pictures in a group should be less than the width of one picture. Combining squares, rectangles and ovals in the same grouping is difficult; the same shapes are easier to work with in a single grouping.

When hanging one large and one small picture in a vertical grouping, the small picture should hang under the large one. Pictures of two different sizes over a couch may be hung with the bottoms even; hanging pictures start-step fashion gives an unattractive effect—your eye tends to follow the "steps".

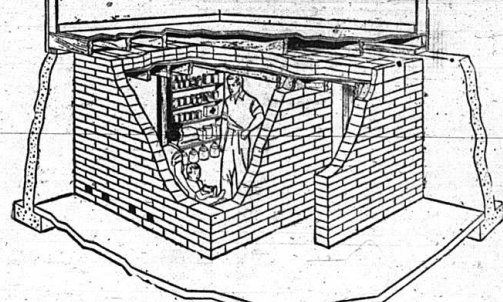

For Family Protection From Radioactive Fallout



BASEMENT SHELTERS generally are the least expensive type that will give substantial protection. The basement shelter shown here can be built with solid concrete blocks as a do-it-yourself project for \$150 to \$200. Standard 8-inch solid concrete blocks are recommended because hollow blocks would have to be filled with concrete to give effective protection. Bricks are an alternative. If they are used, the walls and roof should be 18 inches thick to give the same protection as 8-inch solid concrete blocks. Money-Making Corn Growers Watch Fertility, Stalk Stand



Net profits go up when farmers use needed fertilizer and other good management practices.

PROFIT figures tell farmers more about the business of growing corn than yields can do, reports Dr. Curtis Overdahl, University of Minnesota extension soil specialist.

To get high profits, a farmer must keep a close eye on costs in relation to yields. Overdahl points out in a statement summarized by the Midwest division of the National Plant Food Institute.

"This means paying attention to the fertility needs as indicated by soil tests," he says. "It also means planting enough corn stalks to make maximum use of the soil's fertility resources and probable moisture. And it involves weed and insect control and other good management practices."

As an example of what can be accomplished when attention is paid to all these good management practices, Overdahl cites the record of J. Troy Schrock, of Preston, Minnesota, who recorded corn profit of \$86.35 per acre last season. Schrock was first place winner in the University of

Minnesota's 1959 Extra-Profit Corn Contest. He also took top honors in the contest's highest net yield division, with 170.3 bushels of corn per acre on a fertilized field.

The net profit on Schrock's corn was figured after subtracting the cost of land, fertilizer, tillage and measures to control weeds and insects.

More than 250 Minnesota farmers participated in the contest, according to Dr. Overdahl. County agents, vocational agriculture teachers and other agricultural leaders work with farmers in setting up the "see-for-yourself" demonstration plots. They also assist in checking results.

First place in the contest's extra yield division, went to Merlin Hildebrandt of Waasica, who recorded a 115.5 bushel-per-acre increase on his fertilized plot, compared with the results on an unfertilized check plot. The fertilized area yielded 140 bushels per acre, compared to 24.5 from the check area.

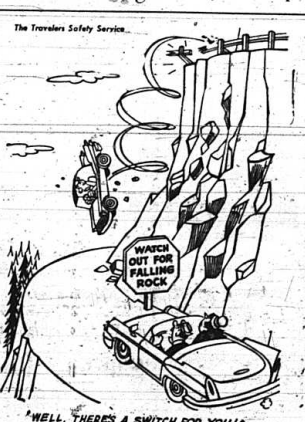

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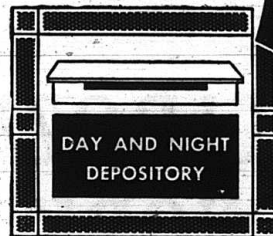
