



## HIGHWAY PROGRAM ADOPTED

We commend the Fiscal Court of Rockcastle County for what we consider an excellent example of foresight when they adopted the State proposed highway program at their regular meeting, Tuesday.

We feel that Rockcastle County will now have at least twice as much road work accomplished as it would, had the program been rejected. Everyone wants better roads and unfortunately, many roads in the county are in a sad state of disrepair.

Some members of the Fiscal Court worried about spending a large sum of money for the initial investment in machinery. This, we feel, is a healthy balance to have. It is obvious that the County has only a limited amount of funds on which to operate. It is a happy circumstance that County funds are guarded with frugality. It has been said, "without frugality none can become rich, and with it few would be poor".

With any budget, decisions must be made as to what investments are wise. We feel that the Court has made the best decision, for the well being of the County, by adopting the highway program even though it involves the expenditure of some \$40,000 over a period of years.

In this instance, the Republicans and Democrats have united their efforts to initiate this program.

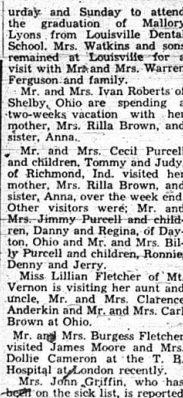

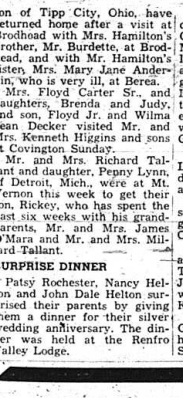
