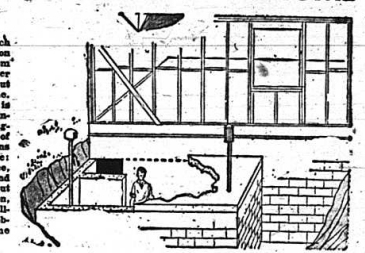

FALLOUT SHELTER FOR A NEW HOME

For Family Protection In Nuclear War

ANOTHER type of shelter which gives excellent fallout protection can be built as an add-on room to the basement of a home under construction. It would add about \$200 to the total cost of the home. The shelter illustrated here is based on such a room built in to a new home in the Washington, D. C., area in the Spring of 1959. Important considerations for each type of shelter are: arrangement of the entrance, ventilation, radio reception and lighting. WANTED BY THE FBI

JOSEPH CORBETT, JR.
Corbett, one of the FBI's Ten Most Wanted Fugitives, is wanted for escape from the California Institution for Men, Chico, Calif., where he was serving a 5 years to life sentence for murdering an Air Force sergeant. A federal warrant was issued at Los Angeles, Calif., on March 21, 1960, charging him with unlawful interstate flight to avoid confinement for murder. A white American, born on October 25, 1924, at Seattle, Wash., Corbett is 6 feet 1 inch to 6 feet 2 inches tall and weighs 160 to 170 pounds. He has light brown hair, hazel eyes, a fair complexion, a medium build, and has worked as a clerk-typist, laborer, warehouseman, laboratory technician, and oil-and-rain cooler for a paint manufacturer. His two upper front teeth slant inward and he wears glasses, reportedly being extremely nearsighted and capable of seeing only close objects without them. He has a mole under his chin and a C-shaped scar on his right thumb.
Corbett, once a premedical student, is interested in scientific matters, avidly reads technical and travel books, and is intensely interested in firearms and target shooting. He reportedly has a superior general intelligence and generally lives quietly and neatly but occasionally indulges in drinking alcoholic beverages.
Convicted of second-degree murder, he is considered dangerous.

Plant Food Gives Americans Top Living Standard
 IF FARMERS didn't use fertilizer, there would be shortages of food instead of the abundance and the American people would be "pretty hungry" reports Dr. George E. Smith, head of the University of Missouri's soil department.

"American workers would have to toil two to three times longer to earn a loaf of bread, a pound of butter or a pound of meat," said Smith in a radio interview over Station WFBM in Chicago.

His statement was summarized here by the National Food Institute, Midwest Division.

Smith estimates that about 25 per cent of the nation's food production can be attributed to the use of fertilizer.

"Undenably, we do have some surplus production at present," he says, "but I don't think it is nearly as critical as some people believe."

"A fact which many city people don't realize is that they benefit more from the use of fertilizer and the progress of agricultural research than do farmers."

"Food is actually the cheapest item in our budget—The average American worker buys more food with his dollar than probably any worker in any other part of the world."

And to specific, the use of fertilizer is one of the things that makes food cheaper.

Smith said that if the U. S. didn't have present agricultural production, "a big percentage of the people who are automating, refrigerators, radio and TV sets, building homes, making automobiles and other consumer items, would have to work on farms."

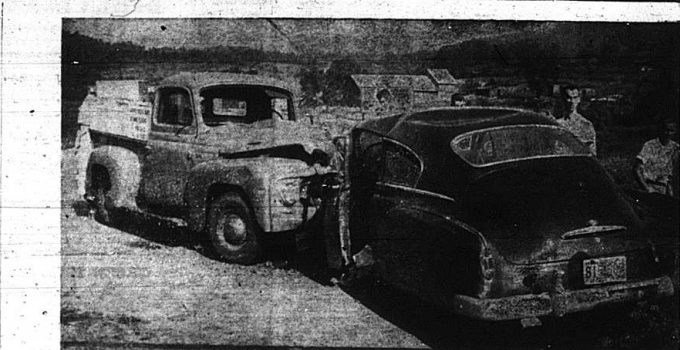

ANSWERS TO YOUR TAX QUESTIONS

BY WILLIAM E. SCENT
KENTUCKY'S COMMISSIONER OF REVENUE

Q. Will the sales tax apply to the federal luxury tax on jewelry, furs, toilet preparations and similar items?
A. No, the sales tax will apply only to the regular list price of the article exclusive of the federal tax.

Q. Are charges for car washes and grease jobs at service stations subject to the tax?
A. No.

Q. Is the sale of gasoline subject to the tax?
A. No.

Q. If a merchant sells to his employees, are the sales taxable?
A. Yes.

Q. What should a merchant do if he changes business location?
A. He should notify the Department of Revenue on the instruction sheet that accompanies his monthly reporting form.

Q. When a service station operator honors a credit card, must he report this as a taxable sale?
A. Yes, the credit card sale will be treated as a cash sale and will be included in the merchant gross receipts for the month in which he honors the credit card.

Q. What type of business are primarily engaged in rendering exempt services?
A. Service enterprises, which include banks, laundries, cleaners, barbers, beauty shop operators, insurance agencies, advertising agencies and morticians.

Q. What should a retailer do if he has not received his permit?
A. He should issue resale certificates to his suppliers and advise the suppliers that the permit number will be forthcoming.

SAVING BONDS
Occasionally someone will ask about his savings bonds—wanting to know what they are worth or how much interest they are drawing. For every person who asks, there must be many others who are thinking the same questions. Because rates have been increased three times in the past eight years, the answer can sometimes be complicated. So a review of the facts is in order here.

First any E and H bond more than a year ago won't have the current table of values on the back. That's because the interest rate was increased last year on old bonds as well as new ones. So your bond is worth more than you might think it is.

Another thing sometimes forgotten is that the yield is greater as the bond gets older. Let's say you bought an E bond in May 1952. It was a three per cent bond, true. Now you wonder, should you cash it in for something that would pay four per cent or more? Well hardly. Your bond will earn you 4.64 per cent from now to maturity. Your banker will be glad to tell you what your bonds are worth, and how much interest they will draw in the future.

SOIL PREPARATION NEEDED NOW FOR LATE-SUMMER PASTURES

Land should be prepared now if a permanent pasture is to be seeded late this summer, says Warren Thompson, UK Cooperative Extension Service agronomist.

This is called summer fallowing, one of the best ways to get the soil ready for a late summer seeding. Break or disk the ground as soon as possible—early July—and disk after each rain or as weeds show up. This should take from three to five diskings. A harrow or cultipacker to get and keep a firm seedbed should be used.

Seeding should be done by early August. A good practice is to purchase or order seed early so that the best and desired variety will be available. Soil tests should be made, too, to determine fertilizer and lime needs.

Thompson noted that certified seed is the best guarantee of production (if proper management is practiced) and that good pastures don't just happen, but are planned ahead of time and planted on time.

CATTLE GRUB TREATMENT CAN BE ADMINISTERED NOW

Treatment of beef cattle against cattle grubs can be administered now according to Richard Thurston, UK Experiment Station entomologist. Application time of the systemic materials that kill grubs in the animals' systems—is from July to November.

These systems can be used only on beef cattle, Thurston noted, and must NOT be used sooner than 60 days before slaughter of the beef.

Two materials are recommended. They are Ronnel given in the bolus (large pill form, and Co-ral, given in spray form. If Ronnel is used, one bolus for each 300 pounds of body weight; that is the dosage. For animals (calves) under that weight, a half bolus for each 150 pounds

of body weight. Co-ral is used as a wettable powder spray or one-half of one percent strength. Approximately one gallon of the spray with Co-ral, Thurston said. When applying the material be sure the ground as soon as possible to keep it in proper solution.

Dairy cattle still get, for grub control, Rotenone either sprayed or rubbed in as a powder in January, February or March.

Thurston emphasized that the systems Co-ral and Ronnel can NOT be used for grub control on dairy cattle.

A wreck on U. S. 25 one mile south of Mt. Vernon last Saturday caused the death of a ten-year-old girl and injuries suffered by 17 other persons—six local and 12 of St. Anne, Ill. The Courier-Journal termed this wreck the bloodiest which occurred in Kentucky during the Independence Day Holiday.

For some reason Rockcastle County has a high accident rate. In an attempt to remedy this situation the State Police have assigned four troopers to this area. Two highways which cross the county are very heavily traveled constantly and, during a holiday week end, traffic is much like an expressway in a large city except with no traffic lights and not nearly as many caution signs and directions.

LETTER TO EDITOR

This letter could be labeled "Sticking Your Neck Out" or "One Way Traffic". The first possibility doesn't worry me, but the latter - I am concerned about.

The one way traffic is the flow of persons to our business establishments, and it is a drive being conducted to keep our dollars in Rockcastle County. We should appreciate that drive. 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140,000 Taxpayers Removed from Rolls

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530,000 Get Tax Cut; Kentucky More Attractive to Industry

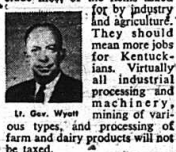

Governor Bert T. Combs and Lieutenant Governor Wilson W. Wyatt announced that income tax relief for more than 530,000 persons and a stronger competition for new industry will be two immediate results of the state's new 3 per cent sales tax, according to a recently completed study.

The tax relief will come from a 36 per cent reduction in the personal income levy, while sales tax exclusions for most of the machinery and raw materials used in manufacturing are more favorable than 10 and the same as two of the 12 states which are Kentucky's chief competitors for new plants.

Enactment of the sales tax, which goes into effect July 1, will allow a \$200,000,000 annual cut in income tax starting January 1. At the same time, it will provide record sums of money for such critical state government operations as public education, health, welfare, airports, agriculture, highways, research, and industrial promotion, to name just a few.

Some 140,000 Kentuckians will be dropped entirely from the income tax rolls. Another 390,000 or more will benefit substantially through the removal of the much-burdened surtax and an increase of 54 per cent in the tax credit for exemptions. The surtax, which is a tax in addition to the normal levy, carried a charge of



10 per cent on the first \$25 due, 20 per cent on the next \$75 and 30 per cent on all tax over \$100. Kentucky and in the 12 states which are its main rivals for manufacturing machinery and materials, will make more competitive Kentucky's position as an expanding industrial region.

How competitive that position now is was pointed up in the comparison of sales taxes in Kentucky and in the 12 states which are its main rivals for industry. The study, made by the Kentucky Department of Economic Development, covered Ohio, North Carolina, West Virginia, Georgia, Indiana, Tennessee, Pennsylvania, Alabama, Mississippi, Illinois, Arkansas and Louisiana.

Kentucky's exemptions include most of the items asked for by industry and agriculture. They include such items as machinery, processing and mining of various types, and processing of farm and dairy products will not be taxed.

In the matter of coal used for the production of electricity, the Kentucky rate is more favorable than eight of the competitor states, the same as four. This, combined with its abundance of coal and water, is expected to insure the state's position as a major producer of electricity from steam.
