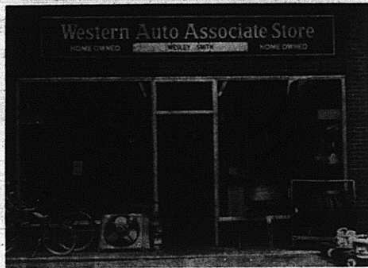

ANSWERS TO YOUR TAX QUESTIONS

BY WILLIAM E. SCENT
KENTUCKY'S COMMISSIONER OF REVENUE

Q. Does the Department of Revenue require a merchant to provide customers with a receipt showing the amount of sales tax paid?

A. No.

Q. What is the dead line for obtaining sales tax permits?

A. The retailer should have his permit by July 1.

Q. If a merchant does not yet have a sales tax permit, how does he obtain an application for one?

A. He should write immediately to the Department of Revenue in Frankfort or contact the department field office nearest him. Q. Could he receive assistance in completing an application?

A. Yes, a field representative of the Department of Revenue is available to give prompt assistance. The applicant may avail himself of this assistance by contacting the department at Frankfort or the nearest field office.

Q. What kind of sales tax return will a merchant use to report the tax?

A. The return will be an accounting machine card and will have important information pre-printed on it. He must use this card only for his return. These cards will be mailed to the permit holder each month.

Q. When is the first return due?

A. August 20, 1960.

Q. How often will returns be filed?

A. Monthly, on the 20th of each month.

Q. Will instructions for completion of the return be mailed with each return card?

A. Yes.

Retailers Get Tax Adjustment

The Revenue Department gave relief this week to Rockcastle county retailers who have elected to report their sales tax collections by the "cash collection" method. They now have a large amount of "exempt sales on account" when the sales tax goes into effect July 1.

Revenue Commissioner William E. Scent said his department has worked out an accounting aid for these merchants who make credit sales on a "crop to crop" basis, such as sales to a farmer of fertilizer on which payment is made once a year, upon sale of the crop.

Scent said the merchant would receive a credit on his pre-July 1 accounts when he files his return in either December or January - the month he makes the adjustment depending on the number of collections.

Scent said the merchant can do this only in the following manner:

"Total your accounts receivable as of the close of business on June 30, 1960."

"From this figure, subtract your accounts receivable as of the close of business on December 31, 1960 or January 31, 1960 or January 31, 1961."

"Take the resulting figure as a deduction in computing taxable receipts on either your (Continued on Page 4)"

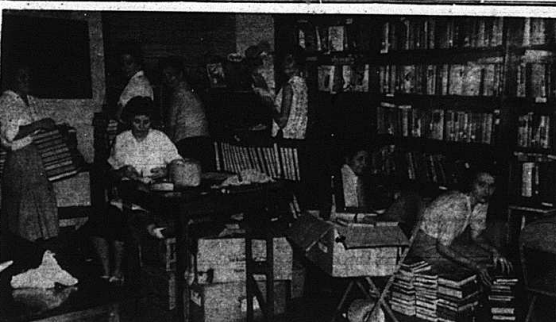

The 1960 Agronomy Field Day will be held at the University of Kentucky, Lexington, August 12, on the Central Farm of the Agricultural Experiment Station. Meeting place is the Farm Service Building (east of the Dairy Center).

A tour showing the latest research work on crops grown in Kentucky will be the feature of the day.

Starting time is 9:30 a.m. (EST). Ending time is 2:30 p.m. This is a special invitation to attend. Everyone is welcome.

Scientific research has recently come up with a way to make humans "disagreeable" to certain insects.

Now persons can eat outdoors, fish, hunt or sit in the shade without having to fight off mosquitoes, gnats and similar pests.

The answer? A "material" known as Delphene or meta-Delphene (N, N-diethyl toluamide) which is an insect repellent.

Scant gave the following examples: A grocer sells mostly on credit, including feed, seed and fertilizer, and collects from customers when they pick up their tobacco crops. The amount owed to the grocer is greater on June 30, 1960 than on December 31, 1960 because customers settle up in November and December.

On June 30, 1960 the total amount of accounts receivable owed to the grocer was \$6,000. On December 31, 1960 the total amount owed (accounts receivable) to the grocer was \$2,000. On his December return, which he would file by Jan. 20, 1961, the grocer would claim \$4,000 less \$2,000 or \$2,000 as a deduction.

He said it is necessary for the taxpayer to make adjustments to make this adjustment to get the total of all accounts receivable outstanding on June 30, 1960, and again on either December 30, 1960 or January 31, 1961 depending on which month's return he is to make the adjustment.

This adjustment can be made only one time - on either the December, 1960 return or the January, 1961 return.
