Foods For Outdoor Meals Plentiful During July

For July, the month of picnics and outdoor meals, many ground meat mixtures (sausage products) such as frankfurters, cold cuts, canned meats and chunkologna will be in demand. Plenty of beef, pork and veal are available for July menus.

Turkey, of all sizes, is featured again this summer and supplies are expected to be heavier than last summer, broiler-friers for picnics and other summer meals will continue plentiful. Haddock, flounder, catfish, whitefish, and halibut are the main fish varieties plentiful during July. Eggs will be in good supply; small-size ones will be in larger quantity by the end of the month.

Summer fruits come to the market this month. Peaches, early summer apples, grapes, cherries, watermelons, cantaloupes are the center of attraction at fruit counters. Lemons and limes also are in good supply. California and western soft fruits such as plums, apricots, and nectarines are plentiful.

Fresh vegetables furnish economical variety at this season. Green beans, lettuce, green peppers, squash, corn, cabbage, onions, potatoes, cucumbers, eggplant and tomatoes are some of those most commonly found in all areas of the state.

Plenty of cottage cheese, ice cream and other dairy products which combine well with summer fruits and vegetables are on the market. Peanut butter, salad oils and dressings are other helpful items for summertime cooking which are in good supply.

Put Out An "Unwelcome" Mat For Those Household Pests
When ants, cockroaches, and silverfish come to visit your home, make sure their stay is not a pleasant one. Put out an "unwelcome" mat of chemicals

to get rid of these unwelcome guests.

Insects can enter your home in many ways. Having a home become infested is no disgrace; the disgrace is in allowing them to stay after they arrive.

A good "anti-ant" treatment is chlordane; use a 2 percent oil-base chlordane spray inside the house and a water-base chlordane spray outside rounda lawn and plants. To prevent ants from entering the house, spray the outside walls from the ground up to the windows around doors, under porches, cracks or openings in the floor, moldings, baseboards, around plumbing or heating pipes, sinks, bathtubs, and kitchen cupboards. Re-treat surfaces every two or three months.

For cockroach control, use malathion (3 percent water emulsion made by diluting 3 tablespoons of concentrated malathion liquid in one quart of water), 2 percent chlordane spray, or 0.5 percent dieldrin spray. Apply with a spray or paint brush to places where these pests run and hide so the roaches will contact it with their bodies. Use every few weeks as necessary.

To get rid of silverfish, spray surfaces where they crawl: door and window casings, baseboards, closets and where pipes go through the wall or floor. Sprays containing 5 percent DDT, 2 percent chlordane, 2 percent malathion, 0.5 percent lindane, or 0.5 percent dieldrin are effective. Sprays may damage some materials (books, magazines, papers) where silverfish like to hide; a dust of 10 percent DDT or 5 percent chlordane can be used here.

Prevention is the best remedy for household insects. Inspect carefully any old wooleens, rugs and furniture that are brought into the house; these are hiding places for many insect pests. Stacks of old maga-

zines, papers and books are good breeding places for them. Cleanliness is about 60 percent of control. For cockroaches, especially, a thorough house cleaning often can be more important than an insecticide treatment.

FARM ACCIDENTS

Drownings and fire-causes are two of the principal causes of fatal accidents on farm land, pointing up National Farm Safety Week July 24-30 inclusive. In 1957, for instance, drownings accounted for 14 percent of such accidental deaths, fire-causes, 13 percent.

Firearms, of course, should always be safely kept and handled. Farm pond safety is more difficult, ponds should be securely fenced so that children cannot easily get to them. Any play activities around a pond should be under adult supervision, too. If the pond is used for swimming, there should be plenty of lifesaving devices handy, such as ring buoys, ropes, long poles, a light boat, lifejackets, etc.

These safety precautions are simple, good sense. For instance, the 1958 drowning figure shows that nearly one third of the accidents occurred to persons less than 20 years old. Since there are more than a million farm ponds in the U. S., safety devices and practices are urgently needed.

RABIES
Rabies, one of the oldest identified diseases to which humans are subject, still is a big killer of farm livestock.

Figures from the American Foundation for Animal Health show a 400 percent increase in rabies among dogs in a recent four-year period, 300 percent increase in sheep and 35 percent among cattle. Family pets,

of course, are highly susceptible. Rabid wild animals such as foxes and skunks are believed to be the chief spreaders of the disease on farms. They transmit the deadly germ through bites to domestic livestock. The disease is always fatal unless a veterinarian can vaccinate the bitten livestock before rabies symptoms have developed.

To curb the growing threat, authorities have suggested area-wide programs to eradicate skunks, foxes and similar carriers, and vaccination of all the dog population of the area.

LETTER TO THE EDITOR
Hats off to Kenneth Stewart for his excellent points in his letter to the editor published in the Signal July 7.
He pointed out, first, that the Signal is currently conducting a campaign to raise money and keep our money at home, which he praised, and so do I. Then he pointed out that the Livestock Improvement Association held a Dairy Field Day and the association had invited business men to attend the meeting, yet only two attended. He brought out that possibly the business men stayed home to collect their dollars without thought to the fact that the dollars come from the farmers.
Mr. Stewart intended his letter to be of the constructive criticism type. No doubt he was hoping for a better relationship between farmer and business man. I personally take Mr. Stewart's letter to be good constructive criticism, and feel that every business man should take it the same way. He thought crossed my mind—do we, the business men, realize what part of our income is from the farmers? What part is from other sources? Do the farmers and business men cooperate

for the benefit of all concerned and for the country? Therefore I think Mr. Stewart should have stated in his letter just how the farmers help the business men and what part they play in helping the country.
Mr. Stewart implied, and I agree, that Rockcastle is chiefly a farming county. The most money coming into this county is payment for the farmer's tobacco, hay, corn, cattle, etc. and not forgetting the newest source of income, the milk business (Thanks to Armour). That's one side, and no doubt that's the other side, let's see where the other money, coming into Rockcastle, comes from.
First, I suppose, (Thanks to John Lahr). Next would be Kentucky Stone Company as our biggest industry.
Second, there are those who bring money into the county from Blue Grass Ordinance, Berea Rubber Plantation, and Lancaster, and Goodall at Danville. Of this last group, I am glad that a large percentage of those who work out of the county, cash their checks out of the county and buy food, clothing, gas and other necessities in their county. Granted this is their privilege, but since Mr. Stewart suggests that the farmers who work out of the county, it seems to me that the business men and those who do also get to know each other better.
Mr. Stewart talked about the money being used in Rockcastle that will never be used in the county again, a point on which I also agree. But that money is used in, maybe Mr. Stewart can tell me. We, the business people, expect and hope the farmers who work out of the county will trade with us, yet do we go out of our way to encourage them to trade in Rockcastle County?
Following are some questions that have entered my mind, that I would like to know the answers to, and if answers can be had then perhaps the cooperation that Mr. Stewart and I hope for can be accomplished.
(1) Approximately how much money do the farm people and out of town workers spend in Rockcastle County?
(2) How much does the county lose in out of town workers' wages?
(3) How much is sent to mail order houses?
(4) What are the business people doing to attract the farmers' trade, as well as those who work out of the county?
(5) Do the merchants offer town or town offers?
(6) Do we have or need drinking fountains, clean toilet facilities, shaded benches for rest?
(7) Are markets needed in town for farm products?
(8) The most important question, what do the farmers and out of town workers want?
(9) How many business people belong to a civic organization?
(10) How many farmers belong to a farmers' organization?
(11) How many farmers and business men's organizations?
(12) How many farmers and business men's organizations?
So, Mr. Stewart, our opinions aren't disagreed with you but there are some of my ideas and points to ponder. Now Mr. Stewart you started the ball rolling, I carried it for someone else.
After all, the farmers, the townspeople, those who work out of town and the business men all have a stake in Rockcastle County. For instance, all children in the county go to the same school system, we all have a stake in the school system, we all pay county taxes, we all go to us to elect county officials to see that our tax

money is spent properly, we all expect protection from the sheriff's office. And there are many places where we all benefit. Naturally, the more money in the county, the more the benefits we all can realize.
The cooperation between the business men and the farmers in two recent examples have been very good, that of supporting the Rockcastle Development Association by pledging money to bring industry into the county. And, of course, the Rockcastle Recreation Association, the Farm Bureau contributed \$300 toward this project, and some farmers donated money. Naturally, there are other examples of cooperation.

ANSWERS TO YOUR TAX QUESTIONS
BY WILLIAM E. SCENT
KENTUCKY'S COMMISSIONER OF REVENUE

Q. Were Kentucky individual income taxes reduced as a result of the Sales and Use Tax Law?
A. Yes. The Income Surtax was repealed and the credit for personal exemption was increased from \$13.00 to \$20.00 effective January 1, 1961.
Q. Does the permit holder receive any compensation for his services in reporting and remitting the tax?
A. Yes. The permit holder is allowed to retain 2% of the tax found to be due on the return.
Q. May a retailer absorb the tax if he desires?
A. Yes. He may absorb the tax although he is not permitted to advertise that he is doing so.
Q. What major groups of sales are not taxable?
A. Non-taxable sales include:
1. Property which will be resold.
2. Sales of property to be delivered by the seller outside Kentucky, for use outside Kentucky.
3. Sales which are specifically non-taxable including gasoline, feed, seed, fertilizer, real estate, and services.

Q. Are "occasional sales" subject to the tax?
A. No. "Occasional sales, generally defined as two or less sales per year, may be made without the holding of a permit or the collecting of a tax."
Q. Will utilities be subject to additional tax as a result of the Sales and Use Tax?
A. No. Although the sales tax will apply to these sales, the 3% gross utilities has been taken off.
Q. Are charges for repair work on automobiles taxable?
A. Labor charges are not taxable if charged separately on the invoice or statement. Only parts and materials are taxable.
Q. Is the sale of new motor vehicles subject to the sales tax?
A. No.
Q. Are professional services subject to the sales tax?
A. No. Some examples of these exempt services are lawyers, architects, engineers and accountants.
Q. Will motels and hotels collect the sales tax?
A. Yes.
Q. If a person stays in a motel or hotel for a period of more than 90 consecutive days, does the tax apply?
A. No. However, he will pay the tax for the first 90 days and receive a refund or credit at the end of such a period. All charges for lodging thereafter will be tax free.
Q. Are admissions for rides such as those operated by circuses and amusement parks subject to the sales tax?
A. No.
Q. What admissions are taxable?
A. Admissions to sports, non-participating sporting events or other entertainment.
Q. Are complimentary passes to such events subject to the sales tax?
A. Yes. If the ticket is purchased to be given as a complimentary pass, the tax does not apply.
Q. If a show tours Kentucky and is sponsored by local groups at each appearance, who must collect and report the tax?
A. The person of group managing sales of admissions.
Q. Are admissions to high school and college athletic events taxable?
A. No.
Q. Are sales to students are not taxable if admissions were included in tuition or if sales were made direct by the school acting in its own capacity and in advance of scheduled event. All sales to the general public are taxable, sales to students at the gate are also taxable.

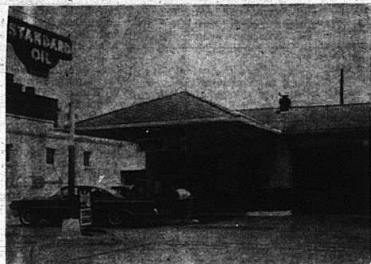

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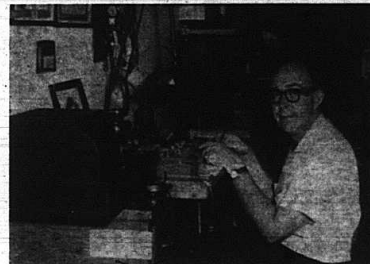
