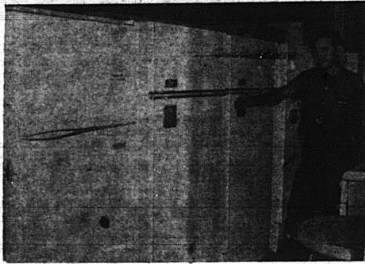

## Vernon Cox Produces Bountiful Bean Crop

Beans of a giant variety grow in the garden of Vernon "Swiftie" Cox of Mt. Vernon.

On some 500 feet of rows he has staked beans Indian tepee style. The beans have grown to the top of the ten foot stakes. They reach some four feet above the top of the step ladder which Mr. and Mrs. Cox use to pick the beans.

The name of the beans is not known, Mr. Cox reported. Seed was brought from North Carolina by Mrs. Virginia McKenzie.

The individual beans grow to some 9 or 9 1/2 inches in length and some three fourths to one inch in width.

Some of the other produce which are grown on the half acre plot of ground includes: rhubarb, squash, carrots, two kinds of onions, peppers, okra, corn, radishes, kale, spinach, mustard, butter beans, bush beans, stuck beans, beets, tomatoes, cabbage, sweet potatoes, Irish potatoes, broccoli, asparagus, peas, strawberries, gladiolus, hellebore, apples and grapes.

Due to lack of space they have staked the numbers. Mr. Cox attributes his abundant produce to a good season, "a good dose of fertilizer" and help from Mrs. Cox.

Their garden was plowed and had the first planting made around the first of April, was planted again last Friday. They plan to plant turnips later.

# Farm And Home News

## FARM AND HOME NEWS EGG GRADING SCHOOL

The new amendment to the Kentucky Egg Marketing Law requires that all eggs bought or sold by or to retailers, consumers, and institutional users by licensees, shall be identified according to grade and size using USDA standards and weight classes for consumer grades.

In this connection I have scheduled an Egg Quality Grading School for Thursday, August 4, at 7:30 p.m. in the Mt. Vernon High School Agriculture Classroom. Everett Mackey, Extension Specialist in Marketing Eggs, will give a demonstration of grading eggs and also answer any questions that might be brought up concerning the new amendment to the Kentucky Egg Marketing Law.

If you are dealing in eggs as a producer, wholesaler, retailer or in any other capacity I would like for you to attend this meeting.

Remember the date is Aug. 4, at 7:30 p.m. and the place at the vocational Agriculture classroom at the Mt. Vernon High School.

## BUDWORMS ON TOBACCO:

Budworms attack tobacco plants two or three weeks after setting and continue their attacks until plants are topped.

Budworms feed on the leaves while they are still in the bud, and as the leaves unfold the holes in the leaves become larger and the leaves ragged.

Insects often cause serious damage to young tobacco plants. Often the damage occurs before you are aware of their presence.

To be sure about budworms, examine the buds of young plants very carefully for green or brownish worms. These are the young budworms.

At the first sign of the insects, begin a systematic control program using DDT, TDE or Endrin. Two applications 8 to 10 days apart may be necessary for good control. Dusts are safer to use than emulsion concentrates.

The control program for budworms should also be valuable in controlling hornworms and flea beetles.

## JOHNSON GRASS CONTROL MEASURES ARE DUE NOW:

Another step in the fight to control Johnson grass, a major pest of farm fields in some Kentucky areas, is due now.

It is to sow second-growth Johnson grass to prevent formation of seed. Johnson grass reproduces from seed as well as underground rootstocks, intensifying the control problem.

J. F. Freeman, UK Agricultural Experiment Station Weed Control Specialist, recommends spraying in addition to the mowing. When regrowth is 9 to 15 inches high, use sodium dalapon (called Dowpon commercially) at the rate of three-quarters of an ounce to an ounce per 100 square feet of infested area; this works out to 20 to 27 pounds of the material per acre. Mix the materials with water and wet the foliage thoroughly. The foregoing amounts can be divided for split applications two or three times at 7 to 10 day intervals.

If the single application is used, the Johnson grass should be plowed under one to two weeks later to help control the pest and the land disked each month until time to sow winter-month until time to sow winter-

## grain crops.

For spot applications (where the grass is in patches) use one to one and one-half pounds of sodium chlorate per 100 square feet. Spread the dry salt of sodium chlorate uniformly over the soil if infested areas. If sodium TCA is used, three to four ounces of the salt or powder per 100 square feet is required; the powder should be mixed in enough water to allow spraying or sprinkling uniformly over the soil. Sodium chlorate, at rates given, sterilize the soil for one to two years; sodium TCA for three months or longer and sodium dalapon for only a few days. Long-term sterilization is better in spots where seeds of Johnson grass are likely to sprout and reinfest the soil. Re-treatment is needed where seedling plants or escaped root-stock plants start up again.

## PROMPT COOLING PREVENTS MALTY FLAVOR

Malty flavor, a common defect in raw milk, occurs during the spring and summer is caused by failure to cool these products below 50 degrees F. The flavor resembles that of Grape Nuts and is very objectionable to consumers.

"Malty flavor is very hard to dilute out with other milk. A bulk-tank truckload of milk will have this flavor when only one shipper's milk has a malty flavor. This objectionable flavor cannot be removed by vacuum-type pasteurization equipment in the dairy plant.

Malty flavor can be prevented by promptly cooling the raw milk and cream to 40 degrees F. The bacteria that cause this flavor defect belong to the same family as those that sour milk. Consequently there will also be an increase in acidity as well as the development of the Federal Food and Drug Administration.

## LET'S CALL IT MILK FOR MANUFACTURING

It has been said that "a rose by any other name would smell as sweet." This perhaps is true. It might also be true that cheese, evaporated milk or powdered milk would taste as good and be as wholesome regardless of the name applied to the milk going into these finished products. However, let's consider what effect the name often applied to this class of milk might have upon the consumer of dairy products.

Milk used for manufacturing purposes has long been called "grade C", "ungraded", or "uninspected milk". We do not like to eat in restaurants which have a "grade C" rating; nor, in my opinion, does the consumer want to eat cheese or other dairy products which have been made from milk re-

## ferred to as "grade C milk".

In addition to having an adverse effect upon the consumer, the use of the above mentioned terms should be discontinued because they are incorrect. Milk for manufacturing purposes is graded and inspected closely. First, the plant grades must closely examine the milk to determine if it can be used in making a quality product. Then, since much of our manufactured dairy products must be sold outside the state, the milk, the plants in which it is processed, and the finished products are subjected to rigid inspections by personnel of the Federal Food and Drug Administration.

Let's call this class of milk by a name which accurately describes it, "Milk for Manufacturing".

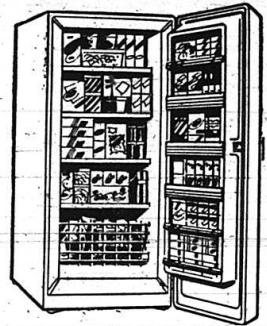

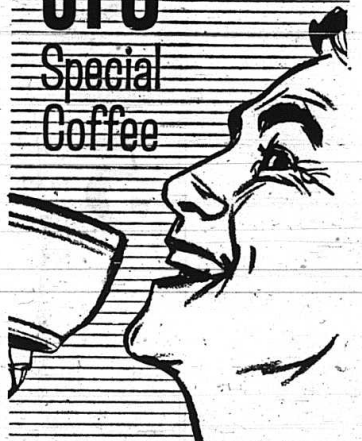

## E & H Bond Sales Total \$900 In June

"During June, the sale of Series E and H Savings Bonds in Rockcastle County amounted to \$900. This raised the cumulative figure for the first six months to \$44,150. The County's goal is \$50,000."

In Kentucky, sales for June totaled \$4,521,530, raising the cumulative figure to \$28,942,187 against the annual goal of \$60,700,000.

Congratulations to Mr. Faris Morris, Chairman, citizens and volunteer workers in Jackson County which exceeded its goal with this report.

John U. Courtney, State Director, U. S. Savings Bonds Division, issued the following reminder to all holders of Series F and G Savings Bonds: "Except for banks in their own right, that, since neither of these series carries the extension privilege, it means that the date upon reaching maturity (12 years) they cease to draw interest. Both series were first placed on sale May 1, 1941, and were withdrawn from sale April 30, 1952, so they will mature during the period May 1, 1953 through April 30, 1964. All holders of both series should be especially careful to note the maturity date for their bonds."

Holders of Series F Bonds have several privileges, one of which is the exchange of their bonds for Series H Bonds without regard to the limitation on annual holdings, and another is the deferral of the payment of taxes on the interest until such time as the Series H Bonds are either cashed or matured. The holders of Series G Bonds have several privileges, one of which is the purchasing of Series E or Series H Bonds without regard to the limitation on annual holdings.

## Increases In July Public Assistance Pay

Commissioner of Economic Security Jo M. Ferguson has announced an increase in Public Assistance payments in Kentucky beginning July 1. The higher benefits for public assistance recipients are another dividend from the state's new revenue program, which includes the sales tax. The legislature appropriated a record-breaking \$15,806,400 for the public assistance program in the July Term.

## Midsummer Is Time To Catch Bluegill

During hot weather when most fish are lazy, the bluegill is active and gets the attention of many midsummer fishermen in Kentucky, reports from the State Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources.

The bluegill, or bream, is caught from all types of water and in all sections of the state—rivers and creeks, farm-ponds, major lakes.

As he spawns throughout the summer the bluegill is a brawler. When he is on the spawning bed, he is a voracious fellow. When the angler locates a bed, and will hit hard and often he may pull a sackful of bluegill from this one spot.

Several methods of fishing hook the bluegill. The fly-croder can find no better sport than casting flies, just after sunrise or at sunset, for this fish. He strikes with vengeance, but his fight is brief, after which he may be glided safely in.

The cane polefisherman uses a long pole and a very light line attached to the very up. The smaller the hook the better. The best bait is the earth worm, but crawfish tails and peeled shrimp are palatable to the bluegill. A small cork is used as the very smallest.

A couple of hooks may be used. Also rods and reels and spinning outfits obtain big catches of this fish. The lighter the tackle, the more fight the bluegill will offer. Avoid dashing the water too much to prevent scaring the bluegill away; move lures slowly.

# ANSWERS TO YOUR TAX QUESTIONS

BY WILLIAM E. SCENT KENTUCKY'S COMMISSIONER OF REVENUE

Q. Can the tax be collected from customers for sales made on account prior to July 1, 1960 but collected after July 1?  
A. No.  
Q. Does the tax apply to the redemption of trading stamps?  
A. Yes. The tax applies to the fair cash value of the property for which the stamps are redeemed.  
Q. Does the sales tax apply to sales of tangible personal property sold at public auction?  
A. Yes.  
Q. Are auctioneers required to hold a sales tax permit?  
A. Yes.  
Q. Will the seller be required to pay tax on items used personally which are bought for resale?  
A. Yes, he must include the cost to him of the goods consumed in the use tax column on his monthly reporting form.  
Q. Is it necessary for the merchant to ring up the tax separate from the price of the merchandise sold?  
A. No. The tax can be removed from the total monthly receipts by using the taxable receipts table provided by the Department.

The Revenue Department will provide personalized service to small retailers experiencing difficulty in reporting their taxable receipts under the new Sales and Use Tax law. The reports are to be filed monthly with the department by the 20th of each month. First reports are due in August.

Revenue Commissioner William E. Scent said his field force would be on a stand-by basis awaiting call from retailers who may be confused about the new reporting procedure. He said retailers should visit or call any of the Revenue District Offices for a personal orientation on the methods of reporting the tax. The department will have auditors at each of the twelve offices to discuss problems with retailers. Closest district offices are located at Corbin and Lexington.

In addition, beginning after the first week in August, department representatives will be available in each county seat on dates to be announced. Retailers should watch for announcements in next week's papers for the exact dates and places. Scent said, "Although the department has conducted at least one educational meeting in each of the counties, we anticipate that some retailers who could not attend may find the reporting procedure slightly confusing when they make out their first report, and we urge them to avail themselves of this opportunity for assistance."
