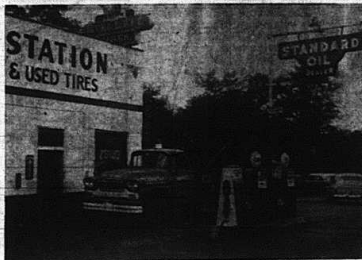

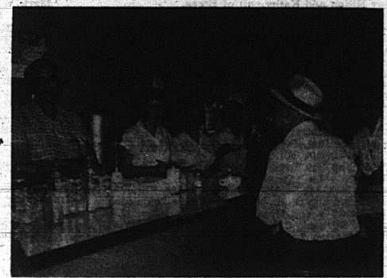

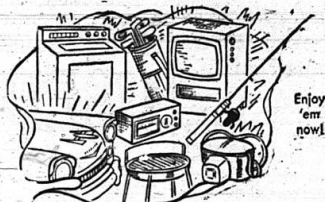

Farm And Home News

ACIDITY HELPS PREVENT COOKED FOOD SPOILAGE

Pickles on sandwiches and tart dressings on salads are not only tasty, they also help prevent spoilage of cooked foods in salad and sandwich mixtures. Acidity in sand mixtures or sandwich fillings that include cooked foods helps prevent growth of spoilage-causing bacteria, according to USDA home economists. When enough pickles, mayonnaise, french dressing or lemon juice are mixed in the acid they furnish is an aid against spoilage.

Potato, meat and poultry salads were tested recently by the New York (Cornell) Experiment Station, reports the USDA; also tested were egg and ham sandwiches. Such foods often are "suspect" after an outbreak of food poisoning. Of the various salad mixtures found appetizing, those with plenty of mayonnaise and pickle—both high in acid—had the lowest bacteria count. Sandwich fillings that included lemon juice, pickle and cranberry also were low.

For safety, foods for salads and sandwiches should be chilled promptly after cooking and be refrigerated from the time they are cooked and prepared until serving time. Clean hands, utensils and cutting board also are important to keep out spoilage-causing bacteria.

Marinate with tart salad dressing immediately after slicing or cutting such cooked salad foods as potatoes, chicken or turkey. Then refrigerate until other ingredients are added just before serving. Use as much pickle as desired. For sandwich fillings, add lemon juice, pickle or relish.

fewer stairs, the safer your home; gently-sloping ramps, covered with non-skid material, is safer. If you must have steps, always provide a handrail. Avoid steep-angle stairs and make steps the same size and height, wide enough to give good footing. Winding stairs and angle steps are especially dangerous.

Doors should not open directly on to a stairway; have a platform before the first step, wide enough to stand on with both feet. Doors should not swing into normal traffic lanes or into hallways. Sliding doors are safer than the swing-type. Don't use door thresholds inside the house.

Good lighting prevents accidents. Place lights and switches at the top and bottom of all stairs. Locate light switches at all entrances so you can light your way into rooms. Halls should be well-lighted, too. Light sources should be above or to the side; place lights so

you will never walk directly into the light or away from the light into your shadow. Plenty of electric outlets gives fire protection and helps avoid tripping over extension cords. Have a qualified electrician help you plan adequate wiring for your home - and have him install it. In the bathroom, make sure lights and electrical appliances are out of reach from the tub or shower. Sturdy grab-bars and non-skid mats should be included in the tub or shower, too.

Other safety suggestions include non-skid floors throughout the house; plenty of storage space, to help keep objects off the floors and stairs; no high storage, to eliminate climbing; and no lead paint, to protect babies who chew on everything.

AIR CONDITIONING

Farm machinery operators now can get an air-conditioned helmet that helps relieve the heat in open farm fields and the house, says the dust many equipment operators have to work in.

The new lightweight unit, can be purchased with mechanical refrigeration as optional equipment, and includes a centrifugal filter for removal of dust particles. The total unit is 22 inches long, 9 inches wide and almost 18 inches high and

weighs a total of 40 pounds. It has a fiberglass helmet and a six-foot flexible vinyl plastic hose which are lightweight. The entire unit wires into any 12-volt or converted 6-volt ignition system. Some of the "helmets" are manufactured equipped with only an air filtering system and a small strip heater, the latter to knock the chill from the air in certain seasons. This basic unit does not perform any cooling but does furnish the wearer with a supply of dust-and-pollen-free air.

UK WARNS AGAINST USING TOBACCO ON LATE NITROGEN

Applications of ammonium nitrate or nitrate of soda to tobacco crops will delay ripening, says Russell Hunt, UK Cooperative Extension Service specialist. Delayed maturity this season will be costly, he says, since only about 80 growing days remain before the first anticipated frost.

This season is going to take the very best management and the very best conditions to realize a crop," Hunt said, "because of much late-setting due to plant shortages, and water-damage from the extremely heavy recent rains."

Pouring nitrogen to such crops will only increase the problem. Nitrated tobacco will merely continue growing when it should be ripening in early autumn; and the nitrogen will not make the crop grow any faster, merely increase the total growth.

If fertilizer is used, apply from 200 to 300 pounds of a 5-10-15 fertilizer or similar analysis. Additional nitrogen, or nitrogen in heavy quantity, will merely work exactly the opposite way we want it, delaying maturity when what we want is a normal maturity. There are some cases where farmers have applied large amounts of nitrogen after the middle of July.

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WHY GET EXCITED ABOUT SIN?

One of our states twenty-six people died in highway accidents during one week end. The highway patrol was placed on a special alert. Road checks were set up. Law enforcement officers were called upon to get motorists to change bad driving habits. Radio and newspaper safety campaigns were started. Every effort was made to stop the death toll.

When death threatens it is time for people to get excited and try to save lives.

On the highway careless driving results in death. In the life of a person sin results in death.

The Bible puts it this way:
"The wages of sin is death" (Romans 6:23). "The soul that sinneth, it shall die" (Ezekiel 18:4). This is one reason people should get excited about sin.

But there is another and better reason. Something can be done about sin in the human heart. One can be saved from this death of the soul. He does not have to die. By getting excited enough to take action it is possible for us to lower the spiritual death rate.

What can we do?

We can attend church each Sunday where the gospel is preached and the Bible is taught. There special attention is given to sin, its deadly results, and the way of salvation from sin. The church people

are not perfect, but they realize what sin does. They are concerned about helping sinners live with the forgiveness and grace of God in their hearts.

You have been hearing about revivals in Baptist churches. These revivals are in progress because Baptist leaders believe that something can be done about sin. They have suggested that churches work together in a great effort to call people to salvation from sin. Pastors and local church leaders agree. We can do something about sin by attending revival meetings and sharing in their spirit and purpose.

If sin is so serious, what is it like?
It is the darkest fact about human nature. It is man at his worst. It is a person going in the wrong direction. It is a soul gone astray and lost in a wilderness. It is a life bound tight by heavy chains of evil.

A person who is in trouble needs help. He has a sense of guilt like the great preacher Spurgeon, "If I slept I dreamed of the bottomless pit and when I awoke I seemed to feel the misery I had dreamed. God's law was hoggling me with its iron-thonged whip."

If a sinner does not have such a sense of guilt, he needs to realize his great trouble. Then he can be pointed to the Lord Jesus Christ, the Saviour.
