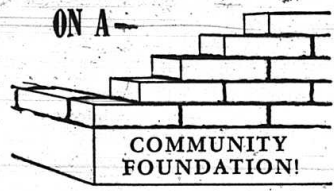

## EARLY TREATMENTS NOW MAY CATCH GRASSHOPPERS

Treatment in edges of fields, along fence rows and along roadways may check serious invasions of legume or row crops later by grasshoppers which may be numerous in grasses in some areas. When grasses are less desirable as food, the hoppers may migrate into more desirable crops and do considerable damage.

So, while the hoppers are concentrated along field edges and fence rows, use an insecticide to get them. Use 1½ ounces of actual Dieldrin or 4 ounces actual of Heptachlor or Aldrin per acre in a spray, or 1 pound of actual Toxaphene. Foliage treated with any of these insecticides may NOT be fed to dairy cows. No pre-slaughter interval as required for Toxaphene unless this insecticide is also being used for external parasites, in which case there is a six-week waiting period for beef cattle. Wait 90 days after treatment before allowing beef cattle to graze on forage treated with Dieldrin, Heptachlor or Aldrin. If Malathion is used (at the rate of one pound actual per acre) pastures so treated can be grazed within one week by both dairy and beef cattle. Malathion should be used in preference to other insecticides around ponds. However, Malathion lasts for a comparatively short time and is a more expensive recom-

in many areas.

Dark fire-cured tobacco production continues to decline, probably 10 percent in 1960 from the 1959 figure. Production is estimated at 8,100,000 pounds. Dark air-cured tobacco also probably will decline in 1960, by about one million pounds. Per-acre yields for both types are also expected to be down from 1959.

## TOBACCO CROP MAY BE SEVEN PERCENT BELOW THE CROP POUNDAGE LAST YEAR

Kentucky corn yields are estimated at 47 bushels an acre, same as for 1959, though acreage in corn will be down about 100,000 acres. Indicated production is nearly 80 million bushels, compared to 85 million in 1959.

Small grain acreage in Kentucky this year is estimated to be considerably under the 1959 figure. Wheat for harvest is estimated at 179,000 acres (down 4,000 acres), oats acreage for harvest down about 5,000 acres, barley down 2,000 acres.

## FALL GARDEN PLANTING SHOULD BE DONE NOW

Persons who want fall gardens should be planting them now, since the first killing frost of autumn is only slightly more than 70 days away.

Short-season and fall vegetable crops would have time to mature if planted now. Fall cauliflower, cabbage and broccoli plants should be planted only if watering facilities are available.

When planting, plant seeds deeper than usual and prepare a firm seedbed. Best way to plant is to dig a furrow, water it well, then plant seed. Watering immediately after seed are planted is a poor practice, as the soil will pack and poor germination will be the result.

Crops that will mature in 80 to 90 days should be selected. Beans, beets, chard, mustard, leaf and Bibb lettuce will mature in 45 to 60 days. Carrots, kale and sweet corn and turnips, 60 to 75 days.

Kale, a crop seldom planted in Kentucky gardens, is high in vitamins and well adapted to state soils. It tastes even better after the first frost and will over-winter and start growing again in the spring.

## KEEP RECORD OF WHAT GOES IN YOUR FREEZER

Most of us forget things—and even with the best memory in the world, remembering what, how much and when foods

were put in the home freezer would be quite a task. So keep accurate inventory of all the foods in your freezer.

Keeping a good record of what, when and how much you freeze is the first rule of good freezer management—and the first step toward making your freezer "pay".

The list of "what" is in the freezer can remind you just what you have on hand and help you plan more interesting meals for your family.

The "how much" record tells you the approximate amount of each food to freeze next year—whether to freeze more, less or about the same. For example, if you had 12 quarts of beans left over from last year, you'll know to freeze about 12 quarts fewer this summer. However, if all your beans were gone from the freezer long before winter ended, you'll need to freeze more this year.

Use the "when" record as a reminder of when to use your frozen foods, any food begins to lose quality after a certain

length of time in the freezer; some foods stay top quality longer than others. Keep handy a list of the recommended periods within which different foods should be used.

## FREEZER RECORDS

A frequent check of this list with the "when" column of your inventory will remind you to use food within the recommended period.

When you need strawberries from the freezer, for example, check your inventory for the "oldest" berries. Then you'll know what date to look for on the strawberry packages in the freezer. (Freezer containers always should be labeled with "what's in it" and the date frozen), and remember to mark off the inventory what you take out of the freezer.

Freezer the foods you need and use often for the best use of your freezer. If your family doesn't like a certain food, freezing it is a waste of time. Your freezer inventory will show what foods were most popular (most used) for family meals during the past year. What foods from the freezer will your family need this year? How much of each will they need? How much freezer space is available? Check your inventory and answer these questions; then plan to make the best use of freezer space for fruits, vegetables, meats and prepared foods. Planning ahead allows you to freeze foods when they're in season or when stores offer money-saving specials.

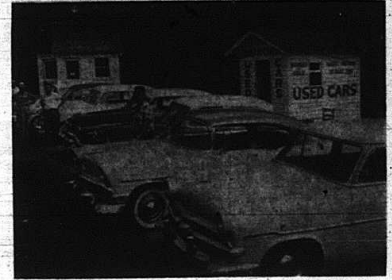
