Farm And Home News

SOIL SAMPLES FOR LATE SUMMER AND EARLY FALL SEEDING OF PASTURES

High production of pastures depends largely on proper fertilization. Take soil samples now and get them to the laboratory. Liming, if needed, is especially important now.

You can get further instructions for taking soil samples at your County Agricultural Extension Office.

SEPT. 10th FOR ALFALFA FIELDS

Alfalfa should not be cut after Sept. 10th if you want the stand to last through the winter. Also the same date, Sept. 10th is about the latest you can sow alfalfa with any reasonable hope of getting a stand that will last through the winter.

IS YOUR POULTRY EQUIPMENT AT THE RIGHT HEIGHT?

The height of waterers and feeders should be raised as the broilers or replacement pullets develop.

Place the equipment on a level with the bird's backs and much less feed and water will be spilled out; also less litter will be scratched into the feeders.

Feed may also be wasted if feeder space is not increased as the birds grow. So let's have plenty of feeder space and keep it at the right height.

AUGUST IS A GOOD TIME TO: Treat beef cattle with Corral or Ronnel for heel flies which produce grubs or ox-warbles in cattle next winter and spring.

Good on beef cattle - not for dairy cattle. These grub treatments work mighty well. Ask for more information at our Extension Office.

To: spray crabgrass with crabgrass killer. It may not kill the roots but will prevent formation of seed which helps next year.

This works especially well if the crabgrass is in a lush and fast growing condition due to rains or sprinkling.

Blue grass may be burned brown but it will recover. Follow exactly directions on the container.

To: kill Peach tree borers. Paint or spray the bark of the trunk of peach, plum, and cherry trees with DDT and let a little run down the bark into the ground. Repeat this treatment a month later.

SMALL GRAIN VARIETIES

If possible use only certified seed.

Wheat: Good early varieties are Knox and Vermillion. A medium late is Vigo which is an older wheat and not as good as Knox or Vermillion. Good late Hessian Fly resists a n t wheat are Dual and Todd. Mogan, a new and very early wheat, is Hessian Fly resistant but seed will not be available for general planting until next year.

Barley: Kenbar, Dayton, Hudson and Kenate are good varieties. Kenate is more winter hardy than other varieties.

Oats: Dubois, Forkedear, Atlantic and Bronco are good. Dubois has short stiff straw and Bronco is the most winter hardy.

WILL WE HAVE TOBACCO PLANTS NEXT YEAR?

"Third times a charm" - we got by (or did we?) on tobacco plants in 1959 and again in 1960. How about next year - 1961? Can we count on luck to pull us through next year?

The best possible guarantee of plenty of good stocky plants next spring is to prepare the plant beds this fall - during September and October. This is a must. Let's not get caught next year with our plants down.

SPECIALIST GIVES TIPS ON STORING VEGETABLES

Do you know just where to store those vegetables you bring in from the garden or buy at the grocery or roadside market? Properly stored, many summer and fall vegetables will keep for several months.

according to George Marlowe, UK Extension horticulture specialist.

He lists three types of storage and the vegetables will keep in each: A warm, dry place is best for storing pump k i n s, squash and sweet potatoes. "Warm means 40 to 50 degrees here.

Beans, peas and on i o n s should be stored where it is cool (25 to 32 degrees) and dry.

A cool, moist location is the place for carrots, potatoes, turnips, cabbage, celery and rutabagas. A temperature of 32 to 36 degrees is best for these vegetables. Cabbage should be stored away from other vegetables because of the odor.

Store only clean, mature vegetables that are free of bruises and blemishes, Marlowe recommends. The old saying about one rotten apple spoiling the entire barrel holds true when most fruits and vegetables, so keep only the best products.

4-H Tractor Driving Contest

An added feature to this year's Farm Bureau-RECC program, is the 4-H Tractor Driving Contest. This will be held on the Race track, starting at 7:30 a.m., Fair time.

Other Activities. Other activities for your pleasure and enjoyment include the Livestock Judging plus many other activities.

Attendance Prizes. All Farm Bureau members registered and in attendance, Wednesday, Sept. 14, will be eligible to participate in the drawing of an outstanding array of prizes which have been made available by various segments of industry interested in the welfare of agriculture.

DENVER TRIP. Again this year an all-expense trip to the American Farm Bureau Federation Convention in Denver, this December, will be given to the county Farm Bureau that compiles the most mileage in coming to the Fair. Of course, the number of persons attending the Fair from any particular county, determines the number of miles traveled and increases your chances of winning this trip which is being presented by the Kentucky Farm Bureau Mutual Insurance Company. In other words, it is the accumulated mileage of all Farm Bureau Members from your county that determines the winner.

Farm Housing Loan Requirements Change

Under a recent change in the eligibility requirements for Farm Housing loans, a farmer who owns a farm that is in agricultural production and will annually produce for sale or home use at least \$400 worth of commodities, may, if he meets other eligibility requirements, be able to obtain a Farm Housing loan.

Previously, according to Robert Winn, Farmers Home Administration County Supervisor for Rockcastle County, an applicant had to own a farm that would produce a substantial amount of the operator's income.

Farm Housing loans are made by the Farmers Home Administration and are used to construct and repair needed farm houses and other farm buildings, also to provide water supply for dwellings and other farm buildings. During the past ten years a comparatively small number of loans have been made for this purpose in Rockcastle County but Winn says he believes that many farmers in this area are eligible and could profit by such a loan.

Other eligibility requirements for Farm Housing loans remain unchanged. These requirements are applicable to a farmer who must lack resources needed to obtain credit elsewhere upon terms and conditions that he could reasonably fulfill, be a citizen of the United States, have sufficient income from farm and other sources to pay farm operating and family living expenses and meet payments when due on his debts.

Each Farm Housing loan bears interest at the rate of 4 percent per year on the unpaid principal and may be scheduled for repayment over a period not to exceed 33 years from the date of loan closing. Applications for this type of credit may be made at the county office of the Farmers Home Administration in Stanford at the courthouse or in Mt. Vernon on the first and third Monday mornings at the office located in the Rockcastle County Educational Building.

Of some 200 purgation notices mailed out this year a total of 37 have been returned because of a change of address, according to T. C. O'Mara, purgation board chairman.

The following list of voters' names are being published in order to give these persons an opportunity to come to the County Court Clerk's office and re-register before books are closed on Sept. 10.

According to Purgation Board Chairman O'Mara, the purgation board takes a voters' card from the books for any of these reasons: If a voter fails to vote for two years; if a female voter does not re-register under her married name; in some cases election officers fail to check a voter's card when he votes.

O'Mara recommends that persons make sure their card is checked before leaving the polls on election day.

ASC Pays Farmers \$43,049 In 1950

A total of \$43,049 was paid to Rockcastle County farmers in 1950 for their farm conservation work under the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation program, Shellie Mullins, chairman of the county ASC committee, reported.

Many local farmers are now using or have used the federal government's cost-sharing agricultural conservation program (ACP) to help control or solve their soil and water conservation problems, Mullins stated.

A total of 300 farmers in the county have already filed applications to participate in the program this year, chairman Mullins declared. Pointing out that more applications can be handled, the chairman emphasized that all farmers are eligible to apply and urged any who have conservation problems to obtain complete information at the county ASC office in Mt. Vernon.

According to Mullins, "unfavorable weather conditions have slowed up some of the farm conservation work planned for this spring. There is still plenty of time to carry out many needed practices before the end of the year. We hope that farmers will check up on their conservation problems and file applications for needed practices at the earliest possible time so they will be eligible to start work as soon as weather conditions are favorable."

Under the ASC plan, the government pays about 50 percent of the cost of establishing most practices. A higher percentage is paid for certain practices which have a comparatively high initial cost or provide benefits which are spread over a period of years. One requirement to qualify for cost-sharing is that an application must be filed at the county ASC office before work on the needed practice is started.

Following is a summary of farm conservation work carried out in Rockcastle County in 1949 under the cost-sharing program:

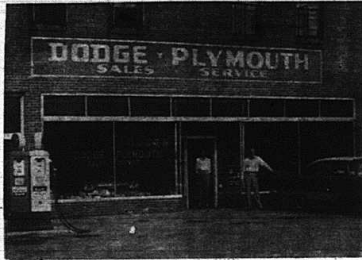
