Farm And Home News

BURLEY HARVESTING SHOULD BE DELAYED
If you are thinking of cutting your burley tobacco, chances are it's not ready now for harvest, according to Russell Hunt, University of Kentucky extension tobacco specialist.

Although this is usually "tobacco cutting time," most Kentucky crops were set later this year. You'll have a better-selling crop if you wait until your tobacco is fully ripe, he says. Ripe tobacco shows a distinct yellow color at the bottom, with top leaves dappled.

Most farmers have two or three different plantings of tobacco on their farms. Each planting should be thought of as a separate crop and harvested as such. Don't cut all your tobacco when the first planting is ready for harvest, Hunt warns. Cut each planting separately; when it is fully ripe.

To be useful to the manufacturer, tobacco must be fairly ripe at harvest. Compared with tobacco harvested too early, mature tobacco yields higher, cures faster, is less likely to house-burn during bad-curing weather, and produces a higher percentage of grades that can be used for making cigarettes.

Fully-ripe tobacco makes better quality leaf, too. The cigarette manufacturer probably can use all grades of leaves produced on fully-ripe plants (from the flyings through the lugs, bright leaf, red leaf and tips). With immature tobacco, some of the grades cannot be used by the manufacturer, Hunt points out.

Tobacco harvested too early also contains chemical compounds that are objectionable to the manufacturer and to the smoker. These materials disappear when the plant is fully ripe.

Thus from both the physical and chemical standpoints, ripe tobacco is superior to immature plants. So wait until your tobacco is fully ripe before cutting it, Hunt recommends.

TOBACCO BEDS
Prepare beds this fall for tobacco plants next spring. WHY? Kill weed and grass seeds, control diseases and in-

sect; have soil ready for early seeding; keep moisture in soil.

WHERE? On deep, fertile soil; on a site with eastern or southern exposure; near available water.

RESULTS - Plenty of strong, healthy plants, ready for early setting.

WHEN? In September or October (soil conditions are good, weather is favorable, labor is available) in dry matter as follows:

HOW? PLOW two weeks before treating bed; burn, steam or use chemicals.

BEST TIME TO CUT CORN FOR SILAGE
What you want in silage is the largest possible amount of dry matter per ton. Ears have 80 to 40 percent more dry matter when well dented than when cut earlier. The leaves and stalks don't change much in composition but the ears increase greatly in dry matter as the corn matures. So let cut corn silage when the grain is well dented.

FERTILIZE STRAWBERRIES DURING AUG. OR SEPT.
Produce bigger and better berries next June. Use 300 to 600 pounds per acre of good quality fertilizer. Apply when the plants are perfectly dry. Any fertilizer that does not fall off the plants should be brushed off with a broom or by dragging a burlap bag over the row. The plants need this extra boost during August or September.

COVER CROPS
Protect the soil from washing away.

Add green manure for turning under next spring. Serve as nurse crops for legumes and grass. Their root system improves the structure of the soil. They tie up plant food and prevent its being lost from the soil.

MILKING THE EASY WAY
Kentucky farmers with small herds of six to twenty cows are learning that there is an easy, inexpensive, and more pleasant way to milk cows.

The new way of milking, which cuts labor about 50 percent, is made possible through the use of elevated milking parlors and cow-to-can milking machines.

The two types of elevated parlors most frequently used by manufacturing milk producers are the "V" type and the "parallel" type. In the V type parlor the two cows are elevated in the form of a V, and the operator, standing at the base of the V can milk the cows while keeping one foot almost in place. In the parallel type, the two cows are elevated parallel to each other and the operator, standing in the alley way between the two cows, can milk by using very little labor.

In both type parlors the cows are elevated to a convenient height, thereby taking most of the stooping and squatting out of the milking operation. Both type parlors are arranged so that the operators can let cows in and out, feed them, pump them for milking and milk the cows using a minimum of labor.

In addition to reducing labor and making the milking operation more pleasant, surveys have shown that use of the parlors makes it easier to produce high-quality milk.

Eighty-two farms in Kentucky using elevated milking parlors were surveyed in 1959. The survey showed that after installation of the parlor the number of cows was increased. The amount of milk sold per cow, and the gross sales per

cow also increased after installation of the parlor. The average "out of pocket" cost of the parlors in this survey was \$132.61.

Milk producers can secure more information concerning these parlors from their manufacturing milk company field service or by contacting their local County Agriculture Extension Agent.

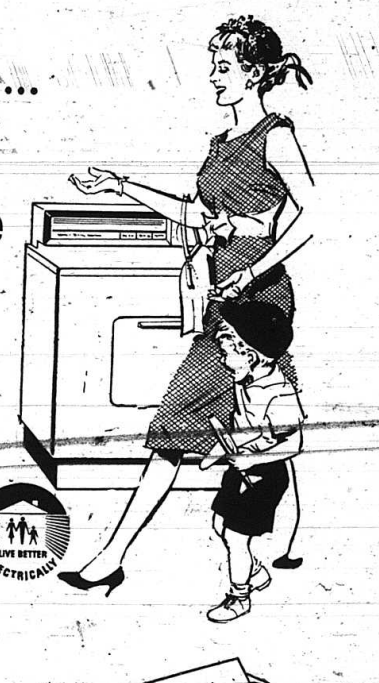

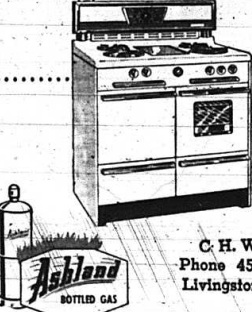
