## Fiscal Court Finances Low

Judge Money E. Cummins, Roy Norton and Clell Pike went to Frankfort Wednesday, to see Rural Highway Commissioner, Ted Marcus, and find out how much, if any, money would be sent to the County for the road work.

Judge Cummins reported that Commissioner Marcus informed them that money would be sent to the county treasurer as payment for the truck, which the county rents to the State. The money is to be used for operation of machinery and to pay employees, amounts would vary.

At the regular meeting of the Fiscal Court Tuesday, County Court Clerk, Clarence Carter, informed the court that there was no more money in the general fund—a fund which is set aside to pay for tires and mechanics on the road machinery of the county.

Carter read a list of bills which he submitted to the court, which could not be paid from the exhausted general fund. The court decided to divide the expense over the next fiscal year among the five magistrates. Each magistrate paid \$184 from his \$2,000 fund which he used on county road work.

It was brought out at the meeting that the funds of the Court are being depleted too rapidly and that the rate will be exhausted before the next fiscal year.

The Court agreed that when funds run out, the road work would come to a halt.

Rhoda Parsons, who has been employed as road supervisor, said she would pay him when money was received from Frankfort. Marcus told County Clerk, Clarence Carter, that Parsons said she would pay him when money was received from the county.

When asked about rumors of road work being done in Lincoln County, Magistrate F. F. Robbins denied that it was done. He said he had men put two road trucks on the road where County trucks had torn up the drive.

Keith Kelley, District Supervisor of agricultural extension agents in Southeastern Kentucky, requested the court to pay travel expenses to county and home agents on a mileage-travelled basis rather than in a lump sum. They agreed. The expenses will come from the \$1440 which the court has set up for travel expenses. It is just a more business like way to pay, Kelley stated. No two persons could possibly get the exact number of miles, year after year. The agents understand that when the \$1440 is exhausted, their travel money is gone, he added.

A motion was made by F. F. Robbins and seconded by J. S. Snodgrass and Ontario, Canada, Snodgrass - Burdette Brown road as a supplement to rural highway program. These people will be carrying out a program to help the mail carrier, Robbins said.

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# Farm And Home News

BY H. Lee Durham and Martha Owen County Extension Agents

## HOUSING PULLETS

Pullets at six months of age should be laying and in permanent quarters. For good housing these things are necessary: A clean house with at least 2 square feet per pullet, 25 nests per 100 birds, two inches of litter on the floor, 50 feet of feeder space per 100 birds, water within 10 feet of all birds and clean enough for you to drink, proper ventilation. These things are not but the days are still hot. Remember also to be nice and polite to the pullets.

## FOR PUTTING LEGUMES BACK IN PASTURES

Spring is the best time because of moisture conditions, but some farmers prefer to do this in the fall. Early September is a pretty good time for this. In addition to having the necessary moisture, we must: Graze or mow the grass close, test the soil and put on lime, phosphate and potash in line with the test. Nitrogen should not be used because it would cause the grass to outgrow the legume. In the fall, mow the grass, stand of grass remains, seed the legume at the rate for a full stand, manage the grazing, mowing and annual fertilizing so as to favor the legume, control insects that would damage the pasture.

## BALBO RYE ON LESPEDEZA FIELDS

Makes a good winter pasture when pasture is scarce. Requires early sowing and good fertility. Lespedeza provides a ready-made seed bed with only disking being needed. Lespedeza leaves about half 50 pounds of nitrogen per acre in the soil. This is enough for a good rye crop, but the nitrogen will be leached out by winter rains unless rye or some other crop takes it up.

A cheap crop to sow, the rye prevents soil erosion. Only two objections! Puts a bad flavor in milk and on some days the pasture may be too wet to graze.

## LIMING THE SOIL

And now about liming the soil. A lot of our people would make more money if they used more lime. Now is a wonderful time to put the lime on if a good soil test shows you need more lime. By putting lime on now it has a good chance to soak in or, as we say, to neutralize the soil before next spring. A properly limed soil uses fertilizer more efficiently and produces larger crop yields.

More than half of our Kentucky soils are too acid for top crop production and would produce more if they had more lime. More lime does not require a great deal of lime but some of our soils are too acid for best tobacco production.

## DO YOU LIKE TO EAT BEEF?

Not if it has a wild onion flavor. This onion flavor is a real problem in the spring and may be a big problem in the fall. All beef cattle should be removed from onion pastures at least four days before slaughter. If beef animals are slaughtered with the onion flavor still in the meat, the flavor will stay in the meat. There isn't much you can do to take the onion flavor out of meat.

Let's get those beef cattle out of onion pastures at least four days before slaughter.

## IF YOU PLAN TO BUY BEEF FOR THE HOME FREEZER

You may find the price varies with the time of year and the type of beef you are buying. Steaks are most popular in

summer, which makes steak meat or hind-quarter meat cost more during summer months. Roasts are used more after during cold weather, making roast meat or forequarters cost more during winter. So in most cases you get more of your money by buying a hindquarter during the winter or a forequarter during the summer.

## SEEDING AND FERTILIZING

September is the best month of the year for sowing Bluegrass seed. Cool nights and warm days promote germination. The new plants will become well established during the fall and winter and are able to withstand next spring's droughts.

September and March are the best months for fertilizing the lawn. On each 1,000 square feet of new or old lawn, spread 15 pounds of 10-10-10 or other good fertilizer every September and every March. This 15 pounds per 1,000-square feet is at the rate of about 600 to 700 pounds per acre.

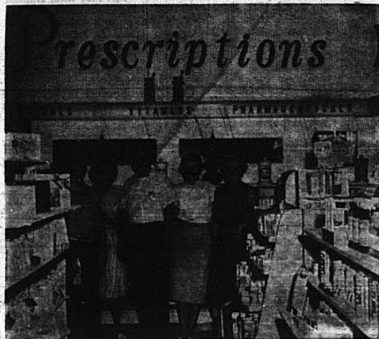
