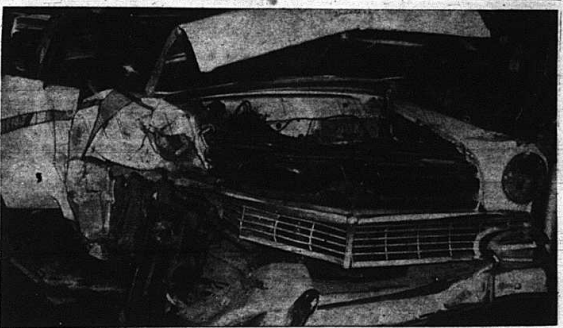

Further progress in the public schools of Kentucky depends upon a revision of our state constitution. This was the conclusion reached by educational leaders from this area who met in Berea Sept. 19 to work on ways to improve schools.

Recognizing the need for constitutional revision, the group studied the present constitution which such revision can be made. Dr. Gerald Jagers of the KEA staff, pointed out that the first step, and the one which has to be taken before any changes can be proposed, is to approve the calling of a constitutional convention. He also noted that the proposal upon which the people will vote in November would call for only a limited revision, and that any changes proposed by the convention would be submitted to the people for a vote before they could take effect.

# Farm And Home News

## FLOWERS AND BULBS

Gladioli should be kept moist to promote growth as long as possible in the fall. This means more food into the crams (bulbs), making better bloom next year. Corms should be dug up and stored after the first killing frost. September is the month to take up and divide Day Lilies and Iris and to plant perennials such as Larkspur, Hollyhocks and Columbinas.

Narcissus (called daffodils or Jonquils in most of Kentucky) may be planted up until December but do better if put in the ground shortly after Oct. 1. Be sure to put these bulbs six or seven inches in the ground.

Roses: It is probably too late to fertilize but keep spraying until freezing weather. Better get ready early to give them some winter protection.

Plant tulips now. Dust bulbs with a fungicide and insecticide before planting. Plant 8 or 9 inches deep except in heavy clay soils place them only 6 or 7 inches deep.

## VEGETABLES

Vegetables may be stored until frost depending on the crop. Many vegetables keep surprisingly well if stored under proper conditions. Store only clean, mature products of the highest quality. If they're not high quality they're not worth storing.

Pumpkins, squash and sweet potatoes prefer warm dry storage with the temperature 40 to 50 degrees.

Potatoes, turnips, cabbage, celery and carrots store best in cool moist storage, just above freezing.

Beans and onions require a temperature just under freezing—about 25 to 30 degrees.

## WINTER IS JUST AROUND THE CORNER

If your heating system won't work you'll probably get hot under the collar but that won't keep the house warm. Better get busy on the heating system. Clean all soot and rust from combustion chambers and flues. Examine that metal flue for rust holes especially on the lower side.

Replace filters, oil motors and don't forget to clean the chimney of birds' nests and leaves.

## HUNTING SEASON

Hunting season's coming up! That means good outdoor recreation for thousands of Kentuckians.

But, according to County Agent H. Lee Durham, to keep the hunting lands open, here's what hunters can do to make landowners happy to let you hunt their land.

Ask permission to hunt any land or water, and respect property rights. Obey the laws on bag limits, shooting seasons and shooting hours.

Tell the landowner when and where you will be hunting when he gives you permission. Don't invite friends along unless the landowner has given permission.

Offer to pay for any damages done to the landowner's property. You can even offer to pay him for the privilege of hunting.

Handle your firearms safely at all times, make sure all gates are closed behind you, don't break fences down by climbing—and above all, keep a wary eye out for the landowner's children or other members of his family, his workers and his livestock.

## FARMERS TAX REFUND DEADLINE IS SEPTEMBER 30

Deadline for filing, by farmers, for refunds on gasoline is Sept. 30, the UK Cooperative Extension Service agricultural economics department, said this week.

Refunds will cover federal tax paid on gasoline used on farms during the period July 1, 1959 - June 30, 1960.

Stephen Q. Allen, economist, said Federal Internal Revenue Service Form 2240 must be used for the refund application. These forms are available at the office of the district director of Internal Revenue, Louisville 2, Ky.

Allen noted the federal tax

on gasoline was increased from three cents to four cents per gallon in Oct., 1959. If farmers bought and used gasoline for farming purpose before that time, the refund will be three cents a gallon, after that date, four cents a gallon.

The refund form indicates that refund requests may have to be supported by records if the district director requests such verification.

## EVERGREENS MAY OUT-GROW YOUR PLANS; CHECK BEFORE BUYING

Find out how a certain type of evergreen will look when it is full-grown before you decide to buy it. September is the best time to plant evergreens; choose plants that will look well around your home not only this year but several years from now.

Buying evergreens from a reliable nursery will save you money in the long run—and you can depend on them to give you trustworthy answers to your questions. Ask for definite information about height and spread of plants and whether they are adapted to your location.

Plan where the evergreen will be planted before you go plant-shopping. Then make a sure, before you buy, that you are getting an evergreen that will grow well and look well in this spot when it is mature.

Ranch-type houses are well-suited for low-growing evergreens. However, low-growing means different heights for different plants; ask for definite heights, not general descriptions. For example, low-growing plants such as the spreading Taxus or Pfitzer's Juniper often are set in front of a low porch, 18 to 20 inches above the ground. These plants, when grown, will be from four to eight feet high. No amount of pruning will hold them down to porch level.

Although Hemlock and Norway Spruce are attractive when they are four to eight feet tall, both will grow into trees in spite of pruning. If you plan to use these as foundation plantings at house corners, remember that in 10 to 12 years you will have to move them; they will grow too tall for this purpose.

Buy varieties that do not burn easily for planting on the south or southeast side of the house. Junipers, for example, suffer when planted where they are subject to a lot of heat from the sun. Check soil drainage. Junipers and Pines prefer a soil that drains well.

## SPECIALIST GIVES SUGGESTIONS ON USE OF COLOR IN THE HOME

Every color is beautiful when used alone, but when you combine colors in home decorating, you must choose carefully to have a pleasing color scheme.

Start with a basic color when planning a room's color scheme. Perhaps wall color or furniture already in the room will decide your basic color. However, if you're "starting from scratch" to choose a color scheme, you may want to consider your favorite color—or Johnny's favorite color, if it is Johnny's room.

At least, the basic color should be one that is pleasing and flattering to those who will be using the room. Low may match, blend or contrast colors with your first choice. Don't use too many colors in your room; usually three colors are enough. Remember that the neutral colors—white, black

and grey—also fit into any color scheme if used correctly. Both light and dark colors are needed in a room to give variety and interest. Use more of a light, less of a medium, and still less of a dark color. A room seems more restful when color values (degree of lightness and darkness) are well balanced. Light values make a room seem larger and give better light reflection; darker values decrease the apparent size of a room.

White or near-white ceilings add height to a room and give better light reflection. Unless your ceilings are very high, keep them light.

Give the entire house a look of oneness by carrying over colors from one room to another. Consider the color in furniture woods when planning your color scheme. Pattern and texture should be considered along with color. Remember that color appears brighter on the wall than in a small sample.
