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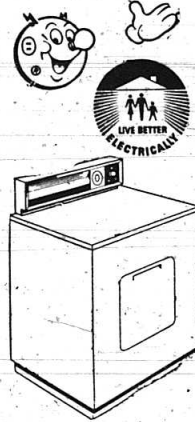

Dairying is Big Business In Rockcastle County

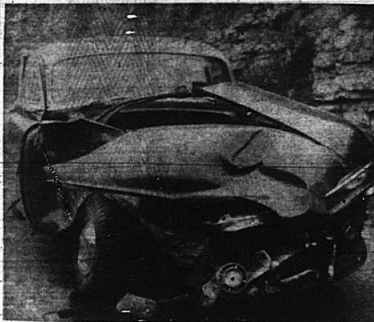

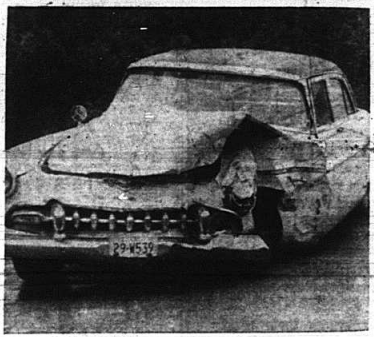
An industry contributing approximately one million dollars annually to Rockcastle County farmers—that is a good estimate of the importance of dairying in the County.

TOBACCO PLANT BED FERTILIZER

In the past, a large number of grades of fertilizers have been used in plant beds. Many of them were unsuited for plant beds and, as a result, the young plants were often killed.

The College of Agriculture is now recommending one grade only of fertilizer for plant beds. This special fertilizer grade is recommended for all type soils, and for all methods of plant bed preparation.

The 4-16-4 (sulphate) is a special fertilizer grade to be recommended only for tobacco plant beds in the spring of 1961. This fertilizer, low in nitrogen and potash, when applied at recommended rates of 30 lbs. per 100 feet of 9-foot-bed or 40 lbs. per 100 feet of 12-foot-bed, should reduce fertilizer injury to young tobacco seedlings.

Dealers should order enough of this grade of fertilizer to meet the needs of their customers for tobacco plant bed fertilization next spring. Our recommendation will be useless, if the material isn't made available in the county.

The recommended list of ratios and grades of mixed fertilizer for 1961, will be the same as for 1960 except for the addition of the 4-16-4 sulfate which is to be recommended for tobacco plant beds only.

TOBACCO STALKS AND TOBACCO STEMS

Tobacco stalks are an important by-product on Kentucky farms. Their main value lies in the great amount of Nitrogen and Potash they contain. One ton of tobacco stalks will contain about the following:

Nitrogen, 55 lbs. x 12¢ = \$4.56
Phosphate, 12 lbs. x 8¢ = .96
Potash, 174 lbs. x 5¢ = 8.70
Making a total of \$14.22

Plant nutrients leach out of tobacco stalks and stems spread on the soil during the winter are taken up and held by cover crops or sod and, by the soil microorganisms.

Dr. Johnson, Plant pathologist, University of Kentucky, reports that tobacco stems should not be used on tobacco

ground unless they are sterilized. Also, if a mosaic susceptible variety is grown, tobacco stalks should not be used on either tobacco beds or tobacco fields.

Tobacco stalks from a Black Shank field should not be used on tobacco ground. Use them on a pasture or corn field.

SMALL GRAIN VARIETIES LISTED BY UK STATION
Small grain varieties recommended for Kentucky use were listed this week by the UK, Experiment Station agronomy department.

S. H. Phillips, agronomist, in releasing the list, said that each recommended variety had been tested over long periods of time to determine its suitability and adaptability under Kentucky conditions. Such testing is continuous, he noted, and new varieties are almost always "in the mill" to see if they are any better suited for Kentucky use.

The recommended list is:
WHEAT: Knox, Vermillion, Dual, Todd, and Vigo. Kentucky wheat is a soft red winter type used in pastry; there is little or no market for hard red winter wheats (used in bread) or white wheats (used in crackers, etc.).

WINTER OATS: Dubois, Atlantic, Forkedear and Bronco.

BARLEY: Kenbar, Dayton, Kenalle and Hudson.

PREPARE PULTRY HOUSES FOR FLOCK OCCUPANCY

Present indications are for better egg prices this fall and winter, the UK Cooperative Extension Service poultry department says. Good handling of laying-flock pullets will help realize good egg prices.

Here are some things to do, if pullets are approaching egg-laying now.

Thoroughly clean and disinfect laying quarters. Allow at least two square feet of floor space per pullet, plus ample feed and water space. Put in 50 linear feet of feeders for each 100 pullets and pure drinking water within 10 feet of the pullets at all times. Use good clean litter (corn cobs, planer shavings, sawdust, peanut hulls, peat moss, or cane pulp); two or three inches of litter is sufficient in hot weather but when cold weather comes the litter should be six inches in depth at the minimum.

Open roosts are satisfactory for pullets if the birds can scratch enough under the roosts to keep droppings dry. Each pullet needs six inches of roosting space and there should be one nest for each four pullets. Many producers use an 8-inch nest for smaller size pullets, plus plenty of clean nesting material.

Poultry houses should be wired so that one watt of illumination per four square feet of floor space is provided. Lights probably will not be needed until fall or early winter; a good rule of thumb is to give pullets 12 to 14 hours of light a day.

NITROFURAN DRUG PREVENTS SCOURS IN UK SWINE HERD

A nitrofurantoin compound called Furazolidone, fed to brood sows in varying amounts during their gestation period and for three weeks after birth of their litters, protected the pigs from scours.

That's the report of C. E. Barnhart, swine specialist of the UK Experiment Station. Barnhart said that the experiment showed that the practice of feeding NF-180 (Furazolidone) to sows prior to farrowing and during the first two to three weeks of lactation is highly desirable.

He said the practice apparently would be especially beneficial in controlling the Salmonella germ, which causes enteritis (scours).

Another factor in the value of the NF-180 was the fact that even the control groups sows and pigs (no NF-180 given) were free of scours. Barnhart thinks this was due to the fact

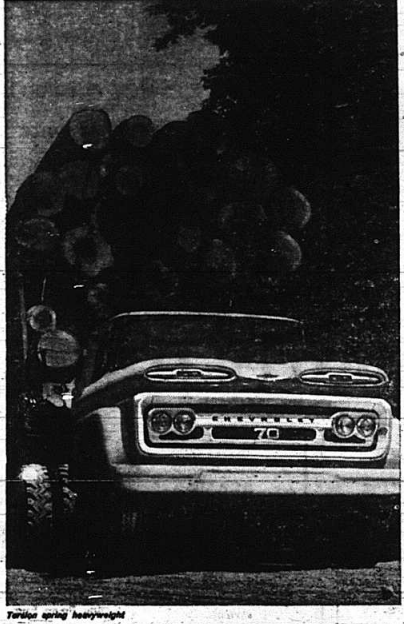
