Farm And Home News

Nix - On Strawberries This Fall
By all means late winter or early spring is the time to set strawberries. Our Experiment Station people produce the best berries with spring-set for a number of years. The fall-set plants are never satisfactory.

It's a good idea to break the ground this fall. Then in March or early April rake it down and set virus-free cold set plants, and your chance for berries will be good. For most of Kentucky, fall is such a poor season for setting strawberries that many reputable nurseries will not sell plants for fall delivery.

Dwarf Fruit Trees
Dwarf fruit trees produce fruit of normal size but the trees are very small. Thousands are being planted around homes as well as commercially. Where they are well cared for, they prove very satisfactory. Because of their small size, no expensive spray equipment is necessary, although these dwarf trees require the same spray schedule as regular trees. Ladders are not needed, as practically all fruit can be picked from the ground. Even the dwarf apple trees bear substantial amounts of fruit by the third or fourth year. They are set fruit trees? Any time from mid-November to March when ground can be worked.

Faults of Dwarf Fruit Trees?
Dwarf trees are rather expensive. They are weak rooted and many must be braced to keep them from blowing over. They bear so prolifically that dwarf fruits must be thinned to keep

the tree from breaking down from the weight of the fruit.

Speaking Of Rabbits And Fruit Trees
A well-developed fruit tree, three or four years old is worth 12 or 15 dollars. Mighty tasty food for rabbits; they love fruit-tree bark, and who can blame them for stripping a dozen or so trees on a cold winter night? It's good for the rabbits but death for the trees, and bad for the pocketbook.

Tubby Magill says you can prevent this rabbit trouble by wrapping trunks with a couple sheets of magazine-type paper. Just tear up an old heavy-paper type magazine and wrap a couple of sheets around each tree, tie it in a couple of places and you're done. Remember the rabbits can stand on snow and reach higher up the tree than you think you are. Accordingly, next spring the paper should be cut off the trees. Why does the printed paper keep the rabbits away? Tubby says he doesn't know but anyway it works.

Have You Made A Will?
Have you made a will - or do you want a court to handle your estate?

That's your choice, according to County Agent H. Lee Durham in having or not having a will. If you have one, your estate will be handled like you want it to be; if a court has to do it, the disposition may not be along lines you wanted. And, says Durham, the wife should have a will as well as the husband, and for the same reason.

Drawing a will should NOT be a do-it-yourself project. Rather, an attorney should do it. The fee for this service will be reasonable and the advantages and savings will far outweigh the modest costs.

Wills should be reviewed periodically and kept up to date. The document should be kept in a safe deposit box or similar safe place and key persons should know where the will is kept.

And don't let someone talk you out of a will - simply be-

cause your estate will be small. Size of the estate has nothing to do with whether or not there should be a will.

Children Need Adult's Help In Learning Good Manners
Any child can learn good just as any normal child can learn to read. However, teaching good manners may take harder work and more patience than teaching the child to count to 10.

A child does not develop good manners by himself; he must be helped from adults. Home environment almost always shows up in the child's conduct. Children's bad manners usually can be traced to one of two major causes in their home life.

The first cause may be carelessness in the parents' own manners and speech - the parents may insist the child have

good manners that the adults in his family do not practice themselves. The second cause could be unbalanced love; where over-fond parents can't bear to curb their child's freedom of expression or thwart his desires. Giving in to a child's every whim results in a spoiled child who causes everyone unhappiness, including himself.

Children's manners - good or bad - usually are copied from the older persons with whom they spend their first few years. Yet very few adults bother to be as polite to children as they are to other adults, she notes. If the child hears "please" and "thank you" often, he quickly will learn to use them himself.

Parents often make the mistake of considering manners apart from everything else the child thinks, does and says. His manners should be a part of his natural way of acting. Don't forget that company man-

ners must be based on everyday manners. Children who are made by habit cannot be taught to be polite on special occasions unless they are very good actors.

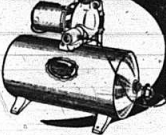
True politeness is the outward expression of the sympathy and kindness felt toward another. The child's manners should spring from his feelings. Unless he is guided so that he "feels" gracious or respectful or generous, there's no point in having him pretend to feel that way.

The first need, then, for training a well-mannered child is a home life - no matter how simple - where each person is treated politely and considered of real worth. The child's manners will reflect what he has seen and heard at home. Very few polite children come from homes where children are "seen but not heard"; helpers always are "put in their places"; or older persons are pushed aside as of no account.

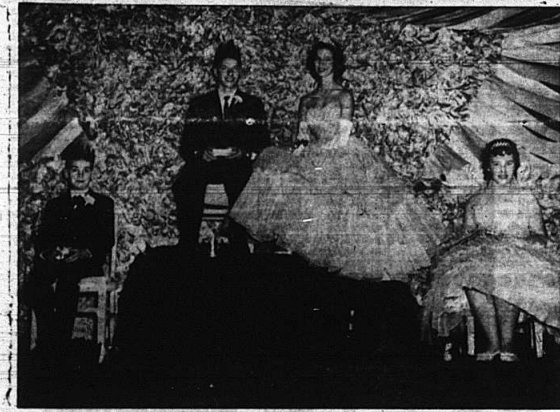


