# Farm And Home News

## Setting Fruit Trees

Anytime the ground can be worked from mid November until next March is a good time. Early December is an ideal time. Buy the best trees from the best nursery you can find. Unless the little trees can be set out on arrival, take time to heel them out. And don't let the rabbits eat them up while heeled out or after setting.

## Storm Windows

Storm windows help to keep heat inside the house, save fuel and give you a warmer and more comfortable house during cool weather. They help to prevent dirt and soot and noise from entering the house. The inside or house windows should be as tight as possible. The outside or storm window should fit somewhat loosely. This permits air to circulate between the two windows preventing fogging or condensation of moisture.

## Dairyman - Do This Before The Snow Falls

1. Time to breed heifers for fall production in 1961.
2. Replace broken windows in milking-parlors and barns.
3. Put all cows on part if not entire winter roughage feeding program.

## Fill in potential mud holes

around lots and yards.

5. Try to feed cows their roughage away from the loafing area.

6. Be sure water cups in stanchion barns are working properly.

7. Repair any broken hay feeding racks or feed bunks.

8. Be sure you have a good heating system in the milking parlor and the milk house.

You'll do a better job working in a comfortable place. And remember it comes twice every day.

## Fall Management Of Terraces

In cultivating terraced land there is a tendency to throw dirt away from the ridge of the terrace, thereby reducing the amount of water the terrace will carry. Terraces should be checked and dirt thrown back to the ridge so the terrace will carry the amount of water it was designed for.

## Rat Control

Have you been using anti-coagulant baits to clear out rats on your farm and wondering whether they're effective because you've found no dead rats so far?

Then don't be disappointed, says County Agent H. Lee Durham. The anti-coagulants are

slow-acting but very effective when properly used. In addition, they are very safe compared to some other poisons.

Anti-coagulants are chemicals that reduce or prevent normal clotting of blood. Rodents die from internal bleeding after eating the poison. But this is a slower process than when violent, quick-acting rat poisons are employed.

Some examples of anti-coagulants are poisons that contain diphacin, pumarin, pival, warfarin and FMP. These are sold under various trade names and can be used as either dry bait or mixed with water.

They are effective because they are slower acting; thus other rats do not become alarmed at sudden, violent deaths and will continue to feed without fear. Violent deaths from poisons may make other rats bashy. The anti-coagulants also are not very toxic if a single dose to farm animals, making them safer to use. However, these baits ought to be used in bait stations protected against entry except by rats.

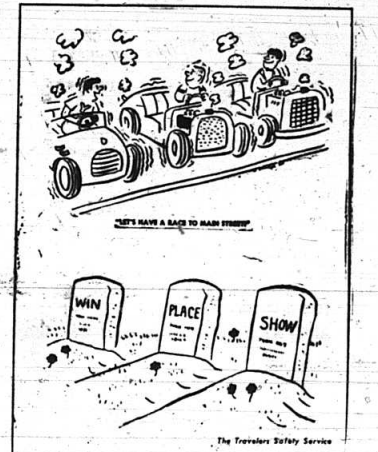

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Egg Law Has Been Misunderstood

Can farm housewives still market eggs without their being candled and graded?
Yes, say officials of the Kentucky Agriculture Department, University of Kentucky, and Kentucky Farm Bureau Federation.
Confusion has resulted from passage of a new egg-grading law by the 1960 Legislature, which some State officials say is causing more concern among farmers than the recently enacted sales tax.
"Under the new egg-marketing law farmers can market their eggs anywhere they want without their being candled or graded," says Gordon O'Banion, special assistant to the State commissioner of agriculture.
Where the confusion comes from, O'Banion says, is that many grocery stores which used to purchase already-graded eggs now are finding it more feasible to purchase already-graded eggs from wholesalers and producers. Eggs sold by anyone other than the producers must be graded before they can be sold to consumers, O'Banion said. Eggs have to be graded according to United States Department of Agriculture consumer-grade standards.
"The purpose of the recent legislation on egg grades, Kentucky said, is to prevent O'Banion said, is to prevent eggs from being dumped in grading ground for poor-quality eggs from some of the surrounding states which have rigid grading standards. Thirty-eight states now have rigid standards, he said.
Farmers Exempt
W. M. Insko, head of the poultry department at the University of Kentucky, said both the Kentucky Poultry Federation and Kentucky Poultry Improvement Association, made up of producers, handlers, feed dealers, and hatchery men, recently passed resolutions in meetings that no changes be made in the law.
Insko said, "Quality eggs are coming into Kentucky from other states and Kentucky egg producers have to meet the competition." The new egg law is an attempt to get quality eggs on Kentucky's markets.
O'Banion said farmers can sell their own eggs to anyone including running a route in nearby cities, without the eggs being graded and without purchasing a license.
Egg handlers, however, must sell only graded eggs, must have a license.

A total of 6,575 persons are registered voters in this county. Votes cast totaled 5,275. This is 275 more votes than were recorded four years ago voting for Eisenhower, according to County Court Clerk Clarence Carter.

## I-Li, Wm. L. Adams Transferred to N. Dak.

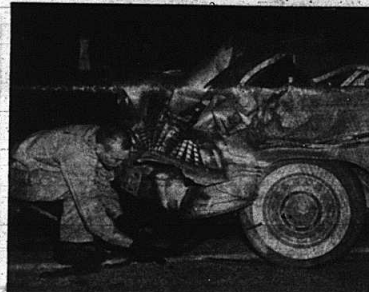

Tobacco warehouses in the area around Rockcastle County are opening to receive tobacco, Nov. 14.

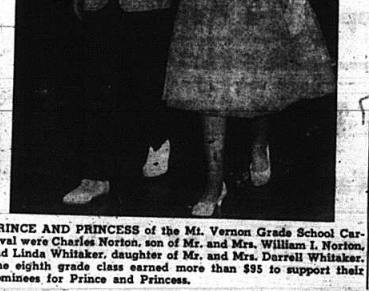

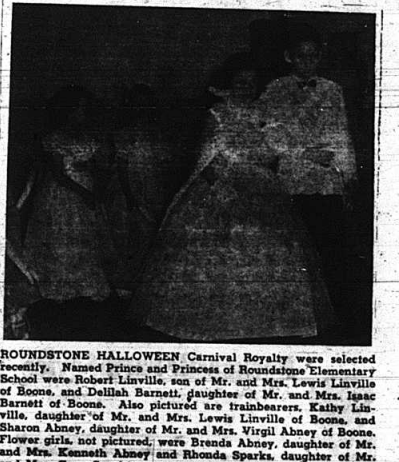
The time limit was adopted in an effort to overcome the problem of shrinkage short weights.

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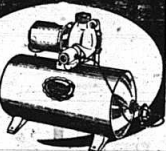

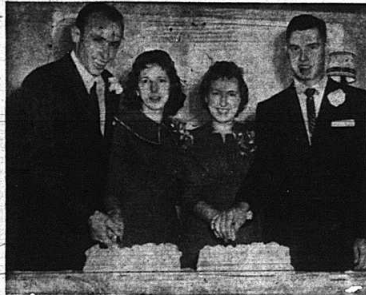

## GRAIN CROPS

Farmers should not sell their crops below the Government support rate according to William G. Bertram, Chairman of the Kentucky State ASC Committee. Bertram noted that many farmers are selling their grain at reduced prices because they do not think they can comply with the new rules for securing Government price support. These new rules require grain being offered for farm-to-stored loan to be stored in a rodent proof structure, or if not stored in a rodent proof structure, the farmer must conduct an effective rodent control program.

An effective rodent control program is a relatively easy task, as it only requires the distribution of any of the safe, commercially prepared rodent baits, which are available locally.

## PAY TO BLIND

State public assistance payments to blind and disabled persons in Rockcastle County totaled \$4,337 last month.

August payments to the needy blind averaged \$43.50, while permanently and totally disabled persons received an average payment of \$51.78. This last figure is an increase of \$8.10 over the August, 1959

payments. Commissioner of Economic Security J. M. Ferguson said the increased payment is a result of funds collected through the newly-instated sales tax. These appropriations, combined with federal matching funds, have put Kentucky in the lead over all other southeastern states in the amount of public assistance payments to indigent recipients in all categories, Ferguson stated.
