



## Farm And Home News

Farmers who have regular off-farm employment, if otherwise eligible, may obtain farm operating and development loans from the Farmers Home Administration, under the recently revised regulations of the agency.

Robert Wynn, Farmers Home Administration county supervisor for Rockcastle County, said the new regulation went into effect Oct. 1. Previously, except in rural development counties, a farmer had to spend

most of his time farming in order to qualify for a loan.

Other eligibility requirements remain unchanged. Applicants must have sufficient farm experience to carry on sound farm operation, and be unable to obtain financial assistance they need from other sources at terms and conditions that they could reasonably fulfill. As in the past, credit will be extended only to operators of farms which are family-type size or smaller.

No loan will be made unless a plan for the coming year's farming operations shows that income from the farm and other sources will be large enough to enable the farm family to have a reasonable standard of living, pay debts, and have an adequate reserve for emergencies. Loan funds may be used to pay farm operating costs, purchase equipment and livestock, pay for development costs, and refinance certain debts. The interest rate is five percent. Repayment schedules depend upon the purpose for which funds are advanced and upon the estimated incomes from the farms. Usually, loans made for real estate purposes will be from funds advanced by private lenders and insured by the agency.

Technical farm and money management assistance is supplied to each borrower to the extent necessary. The Farmers Home Administration office serving Rockcastle County is located at Mt. Vernon in the County Educational Building and is open for the first and third Monday mornings of each month; however, there is an office in the Courthouse in Stanford which is open Monday through Friday and which is in the office every Friday morning.

The agency also supplies credit for farm housing and soil and water conservation. The farm housing loan, according to Wynn is available for repair or construction of farm buildings and bears interest at rate of four percent on unpaid principal and up to 33 years in repayment. Included in the purposes of farm housing loans is a water supply for farm buildings, silos, milking parlors, installing both rooms, modernizing kitchens as well as new construction and repair of existing buildings.

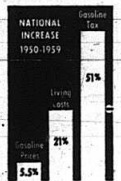
