An automobile accident near Richmond Saturday morning at 3:45 a.m. was fatal to a young housewife, mother of three. Her husband suffered critical injuries.

According to State Police Troopers Bobby L. Hagan and Homer Baker, the mishap occurred two miles north of Richmond on Goggins Lane near the Park residence.

The officers reported Mrs. Park was driving with her husband a passenger when their car went out of control rounding a curve. The vehicle climbed a three-foot embankment and smashed into a large tree. Park's head shattered the windshield.

Visibility poor due to heavy fog, the officers stated. Mrs. Park climbed out of the damaged automobile and ran to the home of Frenis Masters. A phone call was made for her ambulance come for her husband.

The officers said Park was at his home when the ambulance arrived but they did not know if he was taken there by his wife before she went to the Masters' home or if he walked there by himself. Park was unable to make a statement concerning the wreck.

**Didn't Seem Serious**  
Mrs. Park was pinned in the ambulance with her husband and she did not seem to be badly injured, the officers said. However, she was pronounced dead when the vehicle reached the hospital. Madison County Deputy Coroner Ben Joe Turpin said her death was due to shock.

It was learned Mr. and Mrs. Park were returning home after being in Richmond. No one else was reported in the car.

Mrs. Park gave birth to a daughter, Lesa Frances Park, about six weeks ago. She was a native of Rockcastle County and was a member of the Mt. Vernon Baptist Church.

## Make Application For 1961 Tobacco Allotment Now

Applications for 1961 new grower tobacco allotments are now being accepted in the Rockcastle County Agricultural Station and Conservation Office according to announcement made by Shellie Mullins, chairman.

Mullins pointed out that all of the following requirements must be met in order to qualify: The applicant must: 1. Have had at least two years experience in growing tobacco (1956-1960) in growing tobacco as owner, operator, sharetenant or cash renter; 2. Live on the farm; 3. Own the farm; 4. Operate the farm; 5. Not own or operate another farm that will have a 1961 tobacco acreage allotment established on it, and the farm covered by the application must not have a 1961 allotment established for any other type of tobacco; 6. Derive at least 25 percent of his livelihood from the farm covered by the application.

In addition the farm must not have been part of a farm that has had an allotment established on it within the past five years, unless the entire tract covered by the application was determined to be noncropland at the time it was divided from the parent farm. A farm must not have been divided in the past five years because of failure to harvest tobacco in any of those years would be eligible for a new grower allotment if all other eligibility requirements are met.

# Farm And Home News

### The Coldest Job On The Farm?

There may be colder jobs but I nominate hog killing. It is not necessary to wait for freezing weather for killing hogs. A temperature of 36 to 38 degrees is cold enough and that is well above freezing.

### Mulching Strawberries

Mulching pays in most years. Get straw or other material ready now and put it on the plants in late December. Good clean wheat straw is the best material to use. Provide one and one-half tons per acre.

### Orchard Mice

Most mouse injury to fruit trees comes during winter months. The field mouse has above ground runways in the grass and weeds and usually gnaws the bark at or above the ground line. The Pine mouse

uses mostly underground tunnels with frequent surface openings and usually feeds on the roots and bark below the ground line. Protection against orchard mice starts with removing all grass and weeds from around the trunks in a 25-foot circle.

### Winter Protection For Roses And Chrysanthemums

The large and rugged climbing roses need little if any winter protection in Kentucky. All other roses should get protection in early December. About the best protection is a mound of dirt, eight or ten inches deep around each plant. The soil needed should not be hoed up from between the bushes, as this exposes the rose roots to the freezing weather. A better method is to bring in soil from another location and return it next spring.

### Lice On Dairy And Beef Cattle

This time of year many cattle get lousy. They look lousy and they must feel lousy. And now about hardy chrysanthemums. During December they should be cut back to six inches in height and be mulched with either hay or straw. A covering of burlap makes a satisfactory winter protection for hardy chrysanthemums. Frost leaves are not satisfactory as they tend to pack down and smother the plants.

be repeated in two or three weeks. For beef cattle use Toxaphene, Methoxychlor or Malathion dust ranging from four to ten percent, depending on the insecticide used, or one-half percent spray. Lindane can be used as a three-hundredths percent spray.

### Ornamental Evergreens In Winter

Young evergreens that have just been planted or even those set last fall, will swing in the wind and the stem of the plant gets loosened in the soil. This makes it very difficult for the roots to become firmly fixed in the soil. This is best corrected by tramping around the stem of the plant.

One thing that kills many evergreens during the winter is lack of water. Water is much more important to evergreens in winter than to other plants which lose their leaves and become dormant. Evergreens hold their foliage or needles all year. That is why we call them evergreens. The wind blows through the foliage during the winter and takes moisture out of the plant. The plant suffers unless it can get more moisture from the soil. In most winters we cannot count on rains to furnish enough water for young evergreens.

### It is our job to keep moisture in the soil by watering at least once a month during the entire winter. When the temperature

### Tips For Children's Indoor Entertainment

"Something new to do" is what the pre-school child looks for on those winter days when he must stay indoors. If the child's early training has taught him to be resourceful, he usually can find his own entertainment. But, sometimes, Mommy must provide something for him to do.

Amusing a small child on such days can be a full-time job unless you're ready with ideas for things he can do alone. A few suggestions for children's indoor entertainment are as follows:

A "rainy-day bag" filled with odds-and-ends will interest a child on those long days indoors. Keep a shopping bag especially for this purpose. When you find an interesting object, put it in the bag. It could be a button, a string, a piece of fabric, etc.

alone or with a friend. If you have a warm basement, give your child a paint brush and a can of water and let him "paint" things in the basement. Although you'll want to check on him often, he'll enjoy himself alone as he "paints" an old table or chair or even the basement walls with water. Other basement activities he might enjoy include riding a tricycle or hobby horse.

Many mothers forget about "old stand-by ways" to entertain a child. Cutting out pictures from magazines, sales catalogs or old Christmas cards will keep a child happy for hours; give him blunt-tipped scissors for safety's sake. Or playing with modeling clay may interest him. Most children like to draw with crayons or water colors, to finger-paint, etc. Be sure to give the child a chance to display his art work - don't just throw it in the waste can.

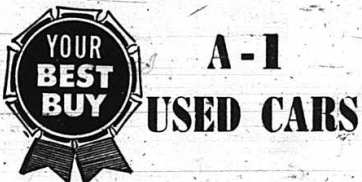

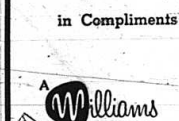
