Farm And Home News

Suggestions To Farmers About Income Taxes

A good many Kentucky farmers overpay their income taxes. Often this is because they fail to keep good farm records.

Some farmers may be able to save tax dollars by watching the variations in income from year to year. Usually less tax will be paid in the long-run if the annual net income from year to year does not vary too widely.

All allowable depreciation when filing their income tax, and as a result actually pay more tax than they should.

Winter Feeding Problems Created During Summer

Farmers milking cows in Kentucky who have winter feeding problems can probably trace them to things they did or did not do last summer.

What differences do we find in consumption between early-cut and late-cut hay? Cornell University workers found that cows ate 39 percent more hay when it was cut early compared with late cutting.

(Graded Markets) can increase the rate of feeding concentrates greatly and get good returns from it. In fact, it would usually be economical to feed 50 to 75 percent more than the usual amount.

Those farmers who do not sell on the fluid markets should be recommended for the fluid milk producers. A 15 to 20 percent increase will be economical in many cases.

Ketosis A Problem In Dairy Herds

Ketosis in dairy cattle occurs in practically every county where dairying is practiced. Over a million cases a year occur in the United States.

Ketosis is not a specific disease but a metabolic disorder. It is an imbalance between the nutritive intake and the nutritive requirements of the animal.

The symptoms are loss of appetite, drop in milk production, rapid loss in body weight, low blood glucose and excess ketone bodies in the blood, urine and milk.

Prevention is the ultimate objective. Be alert to recognize conditions of infection, disease, stress, exposure or disturbances that might subject the animal to unnecessary stress.

Feed an adequate amount of high quality hay and roughage. Check silage, especially grass silage, for its content of butyric acid. A high concentration of this acid would tend to increase the incidence of ketosis.

Consult the local veterinarian for treatment of ketosis in the herd.

Want that power mower to start next spring when you need it? Then give it winter maintenance now.

There are many makes of power mowers, and some of them may have different wintering requirements.

1 - Drain the old oil from crankcase when motor is warm and put in new oil. Start engine again, run it a few minutes to coat interior engine surfaces with the new oil.

2 - Drain gasoline from fuel tank and carburetor. Do not start the engine for this latter operation.

If in doubt about winterizing requirements of your mower, consult your service manual or ask the dealer from whom you bought it.

Cold Wet Weather Can Cause Foot Rot In State Cattle

Keep a sharp lookout the next few months for limping cattle, says the UK Experiment Station animal pathology department.

This disease which causes a raw condition on the feet of cattle can spread rapidly through a herd. The foot-rot organism gets its start when feet of cattle become softened and damaged in wet, muddy lots and pastures in winter.

Early treatment usually can repair up the condition. Generally a trimming of affected tissue will do the job. The farmer can help by keeping cattle out of pools of stagnant water, away from water-logged lots and pastures, and by keeping areas around water and feed troughs as clean and dry as possible.

Choosing Accessories For The Home As Gifts
