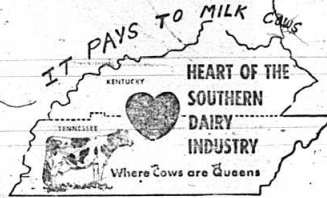

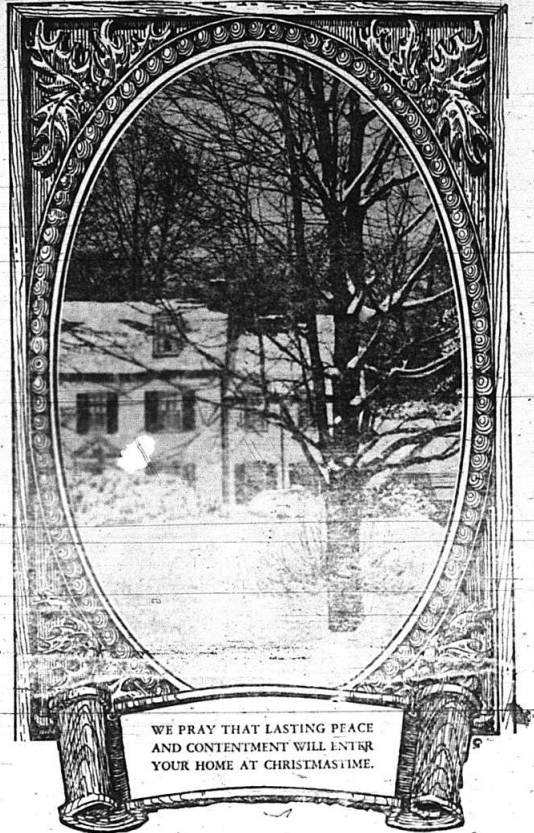

This Little Pig Went To Market

But - this little pig may never make it to market unless you give him some help. One of his greatest needs is a little heat - a little warmth. Pigs up to weaning have little body fat and they often suffer from being cold. That's why young pigs snuggle up so close to the brood sow. They're trying to get warm but a great many of them get crushed by the sow.

Artificial heat will save many pigs and this is often supplied by a 250-watt heat lamp. Many hog producers use an ordinary light bulb with reflector. This light bulb may be used in an improvised pig hovel in one corner of the farrowing pen. Other hog men adapt a discarded metal oil drum by cutting a hole in its side big enough for a rubber electric socket and use an ordinary light bulb without reflector, to provide heat.

New-born pigs should be started on a heat level of about 85 degrees. This temperature should be gradually reduced as the pigs get older. If pigs are farrowed in portable houses out in a lot or field it will pay to insulate the house with 8 to 12 inches of straw or stover applied to all sides and the roof of the house. If you can do so, it will also pay to run your electric line to these portable houses. This will add greatly to your chance of saving pigs, which means saving money.

Along with protection from cold, little pigs must also be guarded against dampness and drafts. Dampness and drafts start a lot of pig ailments by reducing resistance. So let's keep 'em warm, keep 'em dry, keep 'em free from drafts and keep 'em on the road to market.

Which Comes First, The Chicken Or The Egg??

That's a hard question to answer. We do know that hatches of production type chicks in the fall of 1958 and the spring of 1960 were off as much as 40 percent from a year earlier. This great shortage of chicks resulted in a shortage of hens so that good eggs were scarce and their prices were fairly high during this past fall.

Production type chicks will be scarce during the spring months, so if you plan to order chicks be sure to order them early. Remember the recommendation of your dealer in purchasing the home supply, or two thousand or more pullets if

include cotton fabrics and basting for decorations or costumes. (Non-combustible materials for these purposes, such as glass, metal or asbestos, need NOT be treated.)

Here's how to do it at home: Mix seven ounces of borax and three ounces of boric acid in two quarts of hot water. Spray this mixture on the decorations, costumes, or materials, or dip them in the solution. The flameproofing material is removed when the items are laundered.

And - here's a final tip on Christmas morning safety: Have a large, stout container in the middle of the room into which wrappings can be tossed as gifts are opened.

Christmas trees are particularly hazardous. Many acceptable flame-proofing materials can be bought commercially as sprays to treat trees.

When Cooking For Christmas, You May Need A "Substitute"

"Oh, no! I'm out of cake flour. And I must bake that cake now - there's no time to go to the grocery." Do you know what to do when this happens to you?

Just seven-eighths cup regular white flour and 2 tablespoons cornstarch for each cup of cake flour needed.

In the holiday rush of preparing meals for family and guests, staples on your kitchen shelf disappear quickly. You may find you're "out" of something you need immediately. But don't panic - perhaps there's a good substitute. Here are a few of them:

A substitute for one square (1 ounce) of chocolate is 3/2 tablespoons cocoa and 1/2 tablespoon butter.

In white sauces, one teaspoon cornstarch may be used for one tablespoon flour.

If you must substitute lard for butter or margarine in a recipe, use seven-eighths cup lard for each cup butter or margarine called for in the recipe. Or you can use 3/4 cup lard instead of 1 cup of shortening. If you use butter or margarine instead of lard, use 1

cup plus 2 tablespoons for each cup of lard needed.

If your recipe calls for sour milk and you don't have it, you can "sour" sweet milk by adding 1 tablespoon vinegar or lemon juice to 1 cup cream or evaporated milk. And, of course, if your milk supply is low, "dried milk" or evaporated milk can be used for cooking. Check instructions on the can for amounts to use.

How Wide For A Driveway?

A straight driveway should be eight feet wide while a curved one had better be at least nine feet wide. If the driveway is to double as a walk, it will need to be at least 10 feet wide.

That's the warning from County Agent H. Lee Durham. His advice on handling Christmas decorations and Christmas costumes - flameproof them. Materials to be flameproofed

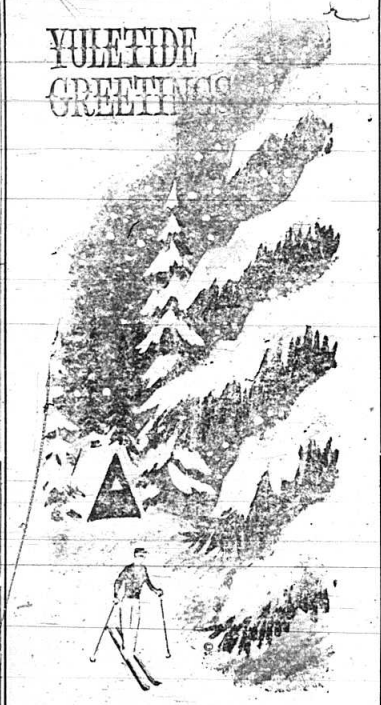

Awards Presented At Farm Bureau Banquet

Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Schiff of route 3, Crab Orchard, received a \$25 savings bond, Mrs. Lucille Hysinger of Mt. Vernon and Miss Mary Ellen Hansel of route 1, Mt. Vernon, each received a silver pitcher at the annual Farm Bureau banquet which was held at Roundstone Elementary School, Friday night.

The Schiffs struggle to make good in farming was described by Wayne Stewart. They were named outstanding farmers of the County for the year.

He reported that the Schiff couple came to Rockcastle County after Andrew, who is from Rockcastle, had been in service and met and married Mrs. Schiff at Akron, Ohio. They settled in a two room log cabin at route 3, Crab Orchard, near their present home.

Their farming career started in 1948. Andrew was turned down for Veteran on-the-farm training because "the committee felt he could not make a living on a ten acre farm."

Schiff acquired 25 acres and applied again. This time he was accepted. At present, Stewart reported, the Schiff couple own 160 acres, their pasture land is seeded in ladino, they have a modern farm house complete with water, furnace and bath. They also own a herd of beef cattle, 24 bred sows and one

boar. They have experimented with raising turkish tobacco. Their burley crop recently sold for \$3367. This came from about two acres of tobacco base.

At present the Schiffs are building a green house. Stewart said the story of their success in farming is a story of determination, liking to farm and demonstrates what you can do with determination.

Mary Ellen received her silver pitcher from the Kentucky Chain Store Council. It was presented by County Agent Lee Durham after Home Demonstration Agent Martha Owen read a report of all her accomplishments while she was a member of the 4-H Club. (She is now a freshman in Berea College.)

Some of her achievements include: making two wool suits for one of which she won the County dress revue, keeping house for her mother while she worked, earning enough money to purchase a piano.

Mrs. Hysinger was presented the pitcher by County Agent Lee Durham for her long years of service as a 4-H Club Leader. Mrs. Hysinger, who was County Agent in Rockcastle County for more than 30 years, led the invocation. He later congratulated the ones who received awards and reported

that he noticed many farmer 4-H members among those present.

John Houston, president of the Farm Bureau, presided over the meeting.

Clyde Linville, principal of Roundstone Elementary School, welcomed the crowd of about 150 persons. He also introduced the speaker, Dr. Gordon Ross, head of the Department of Philosophy at Berea College. Dr. Ross's speech consisted of a series of amusing episodes about rural people.

Kenneth Stewart reported that the by-laws as presented by the state office were approved by the directors.

Snow Snares County Traffic

The snow that hit Rockcastle good rain had fallen caused numerable traffic problems, Wednesday.

Rural Route 3 Replaces Star Routes, January 3

A new mail route is to be established by Rockcastle County Jan. 3, 1967, postmaster James O. Smith announced this week.

The new route will cover 70.20 miles and will be known as rural route 3.

All patrons now served by Willis Coffey's star route from Mt. Vernon to Conway, Hardin Northern's star route from Climax to Boone and Homer McNew's star route from Wildie to Bill Clark's residence will be on this new route.

The new address of persons living on the new route will be rural route 3, Mt. Vernon, postmaster Smith reported.

Persons will not be required to change their address, he said, but their mail service in many cases could be speeded up as much as 24 hours if they change the address to rural route 3. It would also be easier for mail carriers to provide faster service, he stated.

New mail box delivery service is being offered from Wildie to Roundstone, persons who wish mail box delivery are requested to erect mail boxes on the right side of the road going north from Wildie.

Those who live on old horse shoe bend road will also be provided mail box service when boxes are erected.

Patrons who now have boxes placed at the junction of the Scaffold Gate road are requested to place boxes in front of their houses because service will now be provided up to the Scaffold Gate Check.

Postmaster Smith pointed out that the change from star route to rural route will provide all services that can be obtained at the post office such as delivery of C.O.D. packages, registered mail, insured mail, etc.

Anyone who has a question concerning the new mail service may call on postmaster Smith, his office can be obtained at the post office such as delivery of C.O.D. packages, registered mail, insured mail, etc.



Have A Safe Holiday

Governor Bert Combs has pointed out a way along which we Kentuckians can move to make our state a better place for living and vacationing. He has reminded us that we have a moral responsibility in avoiding traffic accidents.

That seems to us to put the problem in proper perspective. Auto manufacturers, highway builders, safety experts and police agencies all help to make the roads safer, but who are they helping? Too much, we fear, theirs is the thankless task of helping persons who are not helping themselves — the drivers. Now, the drivers certainly have a moral responsibility to help themselves. Theirs is the safety they are guarding, theirs are the lives they are protecting.

This idea of moral responsibility on the highways goes farther, though. The Association of State and Provincial Safety Coordinators uses it in a campaign which has the theme, "Drive By The Golden Rule—You Are Your Brother's Keeper."

Many statistics measure the lack of traffic safety—750 killed in Kentucky last year, 7,814 in the past decade, and 673 in the first 11 months of this year. None of these cold figures begin to put the tragedy of fatalities on the highways into a proper perspective.

The idea that highway accidents are unavoidable has been scotched, we hope. It has been proven to be a poor excuse for laziness behind the wheel of an automobile. We recognize, too, that many more people are driving more automobiles on roads that were not designed for them. But that in no wise relieves the driver of his responsibility for keeping his automobile out of accidents.

The Governor has suggested a phrase from the Book we could all pay more attention to, as an apt reminder of our moral responsibility in preventing traffic accidents. Take with you when you drive these four words—Thou Shalt Not Kill.

Aliens Must Register Addresses, Each Jan.

Thomas M. Pederson, District Director of the Immigration and Naturalization Service, stated that the annual alien address report program usually causes a sharp rise in the number of applications for naturalization.

The law requires all aliens in the United States, with few exceptions, to report their address each January.

Forms for making the reports will be available to aliens at all Post Offices and offices of the immigration and Naturalization Service during the month of January. Mr. Pederson indicated that aliens desir-

ing information concerning naturalization or similar matters should obtain the forms at an office of the Immigration and Naturalization Service where personnel trained in these fields will be available to answer inquiries.


