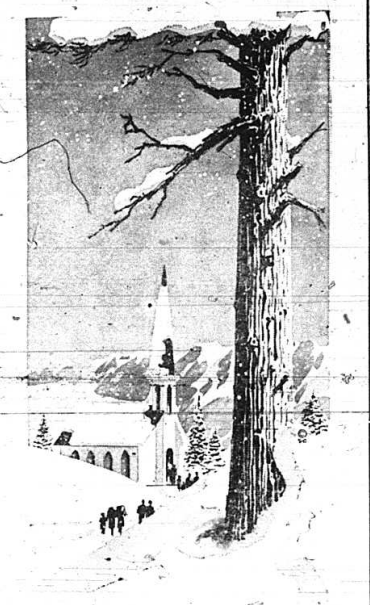



One way to do it: Build a pole shed for storage of this valuable, costly machinery. Properly built, pole sheds protect from winter weather and give a repair place.

Agricultural engineers say pole sheds can be built for reasonably low cost, perhaps 75 cents a square foot.

New Mexico researchers, using pole sheds, said they averaged saving one year tractor life for each 100 tractors so stored. When 100 combines were stored, the extra life was one and one-half years each.

Best thing about pole sheds is that farm-grown timber frequently can be used. This cuts construction costs drastically.

And generally, if plans are followed carefully, on-farm labor can do most of the construction.

Blue-prints for storage sheds are available through the County Agents Office.

Country-Ham Curing Process Is Listed

Kentucky is world famous for its "country hams" - but it doesn't take a highly trained expert to produce one.

So says Grady Sellards, UK Agricultural Extension Service Swine Specialist. Here are his rules for home-curing "old hams."

Prepare hams or shoulders in weather that is in the near-freezing range, 34 to 38 degrees Fahrenheit. This holds down spoilage organisms.

Make a curing mixture of 7½ pounds of salt, 2 and one-half pounds of sugar, and 2 and one-half ounces of saltpeter. This mixture, with about 100 pounds of ham or shoulder. Apply the mixture to the hams, etc. and put in curing space. Let hams 20 pounds or less cure about three weeks, shoulders about two weeks. Larger hams should cure about 1½ days per pound. If temperature drops to freezing or less, let hams cure somewhat longer.

When removed from curing space, wash cuts with lukewarm water or simply brush off the curing mixture. Smoke the cuts until they are a light cherry red on the skin side. Wrap cured cuts in several layers of clean paper, then store in heavy cloth bags for

aging. Cured hams age fastest in higher temperatures such as under metal roofs in summer.

Smoking, Sellards noted, contributes little to flavor if the cuts are aged for long periods.

Salt Applied To Icy Walks May Cause Plant Damage

Salt put on streets, walks or driveways to keep them ice-free may injure the trees, shrubs and flowers nearby, according to USDA Specialists.

To avoid such injury, sand can be used on icy walks and drives, USDA suggests. Home-makers sometimes object to the use of sand because it is "tracked" into the house; however, salt is "tracked" in, too, and can stain or injure floors and rugs, they point out.

A survey of roadside trees in Minnesota showed how salt washed off streets on to nearby soil injured trees growing there. The salt-injured trees seemed normal in the spring,

but, in summer, leaves turned yellow and brown and many dropped off. A few of the trees died.

Trees showing this injury were either at intersections or along streets where salt had been applied in winter. Trees that received the run-off from sloping streets were injured more than those on level streets; the street side of the trees showed the most damage.

As a check, shade tree seedlings in greenhouses were tested with salt applications such as that which would wash off streets. The same symptoms appeared as on the outdoor trees, USDA reports; some lost their leaves and others showed yellowing at leaf edges.

Food Preview For January

For after-the-holiday meals, many nutritious foods are featured at good prices this month, says Mrs. Letta Jasper, UK Extension Specialist in consumer marketing. Meats top the list

of plentiful foods for January. Beef supplies will be 6 to 8 percent higher than a month ago, she notes. You probably will see more veal and lamb this month, too. The supply of pork will be a little lower than at this time last year - with prices slightly higher; however, plenty of pork will be seen.

Frankfurters will be promoted during January for "National Kraut and Frankfurter Week." Broiler-fryers will be

the best poultry buy as they continue plentiful. Frozen and canned fishery products will be budget-wise choices this month, too; fish sticks and portions, breaded shrimp and canned tuna are plentiful.

Egg supplies will be lower than a year ago and prices will stay higher; December price levels are expected to continue through January.

Lots of fresh and canned cranberry items will be found

throughout the month. A good supply of apples is expected, although prices probably will rise gradually. Florida citrus fruits will be of fine quality. This is still the peak of the grapefruit season; banana quality should improve and much fancy fruit will be seen.

Grapes, avocados and pears will be less plentiful and probably more expensive.

Cabbage, onions and potatoes still will be economical vegetable choices. Celery, mushrooms, locally-produced greens, radishes and turnips also will remain in the low price range.

Check prices of canned ripe olives at your local grocery. They are reported to be in record supply. You will find attractive prices on dried fruits and nuts in the shell during January, too. Peanut butter, cheese, ground beef, and macaroni products also are good buys this month.



The pencil and the farm account book combined may be the most valuable tool on the farm.

Every farmer needs to keep good farm records because they help him make money.

Records provide information for income tax and social security returns.

If the farmer has a total income of \$600 or more during the year, he must file a Federal income tax return, even though no tax is due.

Regardless of age the farmer must file a self-employment or social security tax return for any year that he has \$400 or

more of net earnings from self-employment. Some farmers may wish to file a return even though their net earnings are less than \$400 in order to come under the social security system.

Good farm records provide information that will improve the management decisions on the farm.

They help locate strong and weak points in the farm business.

They furnish historical information about the farming operations.

They help in dividing costs and returns with tenants and partners and are also important in father-son farming agreements.

Actual farm earnings can be determined from good records and this figure can be compared with returns in other years.

The type of record a farmer should keep depends on: The kinds of information the farmer wants to get from his records. The farmer's education and his experience in record keeping.

And the genuine interest the farmer has in records.

Kentucky County Agricultural Agents can furnish the "Kentucky Farm Record Book" for those who want to keep simple farm records or the "Kentucky Farm Account Book" for those who wish to keep more complete records.

Fall Freshening Means More Profit
December, January, and February are the months to breed those cows!

This means they will freshen in fall or early winter. Freshening at this time of year means selling your cows highest production when the demand for milk is greatest and the price is highest.

Fall freshening cows produce up to 20 percent more milk in the course of a lactation, and production holds up better throughout the period. Dairy Herd Improvement Association records over a three-year period showed that fall-freshening cows returned as much as \$228.00 a year above feed cost.

while spring-freshening cows returned only \$194 over feed cost.

Here are other advantages of fall freshening: 1—Farm work is somewhat slack during the winter months and more time can be given to the cows, hence better management. 2—Cows are dry during the hot summer months when heat and flies lower milk production. 3—Fall

calves are large enough by spring to make good use of pasture and are better able to stand the hot weather. 4—Where hired help is needed, the work load is better distributed throughout the year. 5—The fall-freshening cow will have new spring pasture just at the right time to boost her production when it would ordinarily be dropping off.

All of these advantages mean more complex and expensive one thing: Fall-freshening cows than ever before. So, says County Agent, H. Lee Durham, it needs some "taking-care-of" (Continued on page 7)

PRIVILEGE LICENSE ORDINANCE Ordinance No. 74

An Ordinance Levying and Imposing a License Tax, and Fixing a Rate of Same on Different Lines of Businesses, Trades and Occupations and Professions carried on in The City of Livingston, Rockcastle County, Kentucky, and on Motor Vehicles for the purpose of supervising and Regulating same, and for Raising Revenue for Exercising such Regulations, And Imposing Fine for Violation of Same.

BE IT OBTAINED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE TOWN (CITY) OF LIVINGSTON, ROCKCASTLE COUNTY, KENTUCKY: That for the purpose of raising Revenue for exercising a supervisory regulation over the various kinds of business trades, occupations and professions in the City of Livingston, Kentucky, for Policing said City, reserving motor traffic therein, and keep in repair the public ways thereof, Thereby is hereby imposed and ordered to be collected on the kind of motor vehicles stipulated and classified herein the following rates of license Tax on various kinds of business, Trades, Occupations and Professions, for the Year 1961 and for all ensuing calendar years unless or until the Board of Trustees deem it advisable to make changes in coverage or rates, at which time it will not be necessary to change the entire Ordinance. Each person, Firm or Corporation, transacting business in the City of Livingston, Kentucky, by selling goods, wares or merchandise from trucks shall be required to pay the privilege license tax imposed for the operation of that branch of business in Livingston, Ky.

The revenue levied and collected above shall be used exclusively for the purpose above set out, and shall be collected by the City Clerk of Livingston, Ky., whose duty it is to issue said License and collect therefor, And no person firm or corporation shall be engaged in any business, trade or profession or occupation set out herein or operate any motor vehicle as set out in the above schedule without first procuring said License and paid therefor.

Every License granted and provided herein, is subjected to be suspended or revoked at the pleasure of the City Council of Livingston, Ky., upon sufficient cause and upon such revocation, the License shall become NULL and the Tax fee paid for such License shall be forfeited to the said City of Livingston, Ky. The City Council may for good cause, waive the forfeiture and pay back the License the proportionate part of the unexpired time of any City License. Any person, Firm or Corporation violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a Misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be FINED for each offence, not less than Five (\$5.00) Dollars, or not more than Nineteen (\$19.00) Dollars. Where the License is stipulated by the Year or the Day, each day in the business, trade or profession is pursued in violation of Ordinance for any part thereof, shall constitute a separate offence. Any Section or clause herein declared unconstitutional shall not affect the validity of any other section or clause. All Ordinances or parts of Ordinances that are in conflict with this Ordinance are hereby repealed.

Passed by the Board of Trustees of the City of Livingston, Kentucky, This 5th Day of December, 1960.
