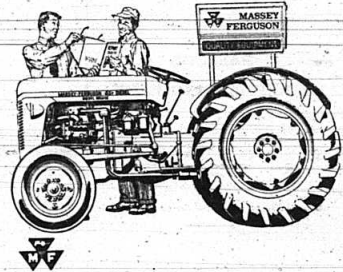

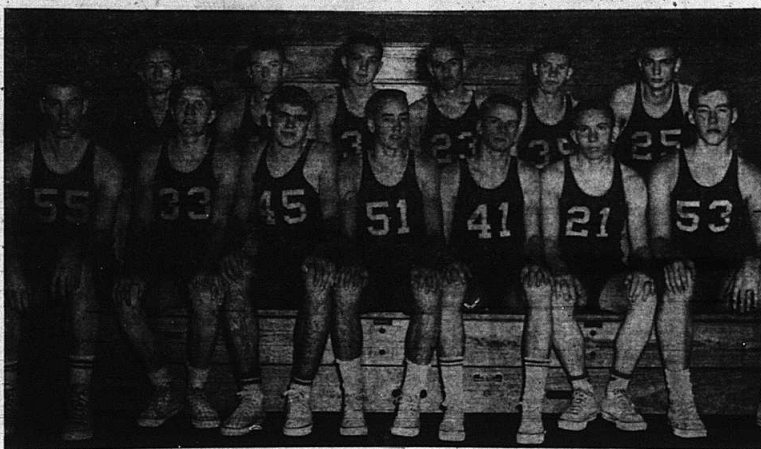

Fire Destroys 2 Rockcastle County Homes

Fire destroyed two homes in the Rockcastle County area during the last few days.

Starting in the attic area, fire completely destroyed the home of Lee Mullins, Sr., of Livingston, a about midnight Saturday.

Fire, apparently starting in the flue, also destroyed the home of John Anglin in the Three Links area of the county.

According to Lee Mullins Jr., who lived with his father, the fire in the Mullins home was discovered by his brother, Amos, when it broke through the ceiling in a back bedroom.

While the Livingston Fire Department battled the fire, the family and neighbors were able to save about a third of the furnishings in the one-story frame house.

The fire department fought over four hours to keep the fire from spreading to the Mullins store about 10 feet from the house, and to another house about 50 feet away.

Mr. Mullins estimated the loss at about \$8,000. The family only recently spent \$2,500 on repairs. The house and contents were partially insured.

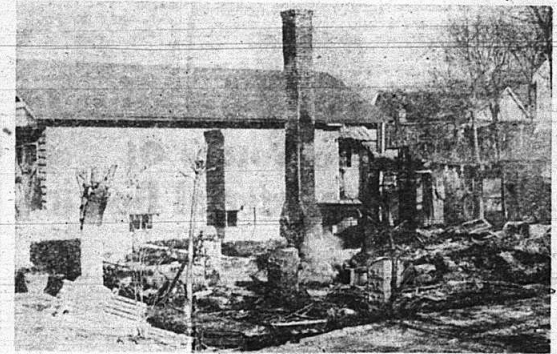
Mr. Mullins stated the Fire Department did a "wonderful job in containing the fire in the house."

Through their efforts they were able to save my store and another house. We also wish to express our thanks to everyone who helped us save many of our belongings," Mr. Mullins said.

John Cox, Mt. Vernon's assistant fire chief and his son, Jimmy, assisted Livingston firemen in their work and received the thanks of the Livingston department.

The only belongings saved in the Anglin fire were four quilts and a mattress.

Official 10 Below Recorded Locally

The coldest weather since 1938 paid a visit to Kentucky and Rockcastle County early Friday morning and left residents shivering and auto and water pipes frozen.

The temperature was officially recorded at 10 below zero on the U.S. Weather Bureau thermometer at the Mt. Vernon Fire Department.

Other thermometers in the area varied. Some people reported as low as 14 below in areas around Renfro Valley. Some Mt. Vernon thermometers were "only" 8 below.

The cold, plus the snow on the ground, only made things more difficult by making walking hazardous. Most highways were clear when the big drop in temperature came.

Several residents reported frozen water pipes. Wreckers and tow-trucks were out in force as batteries failed to start auto motors.

The intense cold, thankfully, was short lived and the following day the temperature was at a high of 20 degrees, followed by a 6 above night reading. (Continued On Page 4)

TWO DIED HERE

Minister, Daughter Die When Car Hits Truck

A Waco Baptist minister and his daughter were killed early Monday in an auto-truck collision near scenic View Motel, about four miles north of Mt. Vernon. It was Rockcastle's first traffic deaths of 1961.

The Rev. H. B. Harris, 43, pastor of the Waco Baptist Church, was killed instantly in the accident. His daughter, Elizabeth Ann, 17, died a short time after arrival at Berea College Hospital.

His son, David Allen Harris, 23, driver of the auto, suffered head injuries believed not serious.

Mr. Harris will be remembered by several friends in Rockcastle County, mostly through his evangelistic efforts in the Baptist Churches.

According to State Trooper Willis Martin, the Harris car struck the rear of a tractor-trailer loaded to Webb Transfer, and driven by Tom Shepherd, 33, Middleboro. Shepherd was not injured.

Martin quoted the younger Harris as saying the wreck took place at the crest of the hill and that he did not see the truck in time to avoid the accident.

The right side and top of the car were torn away. The tandem axle of the truck was knocked loose by the impact.

According to friends of the family, Reverend Harris was injured critically about a year ago in an accident. A short time after he was able to leave the hospital, he fell and broke his hip.

Reverend Harris was ordained a minister in 1940 at Morris-town, Tennessee. He had held several pastorates throughout Kentucky and Tennessee. He had also participated in missionary crusades in Cuba. He was chairman of evangelism for the Tates Creek Association of Baptists, and a member of several civic organizations.

Miss Harris had attended Madison Central High School and was a student at Berea Foundation School. She was a member of the Waco Baptist Church.

Freeman Increases Burley Quota 6 Percent

Burley-tobacco-acreage allotments will be increased 6 per cent for the coming season, Agriculture Secretary Freeman announced Tuesday.

Freeman also announced that dark-tobacco acreage will stay the same for 1961.

Burley was the only tobacco granted an increase, its first since 1951.

The increase makes 329,095 acres available for allotment to burley growers this year, compared with 310,275 acres in 1960.

10 Pct. Increase Asked
Kentucky's growers and most representatives of the tobacco industry had asked for a 10 per cent increase in the burley allotment.

But Tuesday's news was greeted with enthusiasm, since Freeman conceded that the increase is a moderate one and more than seven tenths of an acre.

1960, compared with 15,822 in 1960.

The extra acres are to take care of allotments for new growers and for adjusting inequities.

Quota Vote February 24
Dark-tobacco growers will vote February 24 on whether to increase their allotment for the next three years, Freeman announced.

In his statement on burley, Freeman praised the growers and gave some of the recent history of the program. He said:

"Burley-tobacco growers themselves, made this increase in the 1961 allotted acreage possible. Burley-tobacco supplies became excessive as a result of the record crop of 668,000,000 pounds produced in 1954."

"Faced with this situation, burley growers won legislation in 1955 that enabled them to reduce their acreage 25 per cent in all farm allotments of more than seven tenths of an acre.

Farm And Home News

Seeding The Lawn

For those who did not sow bluegrass seed on their lawn in September, February is the second best time of the year to sow it. Usually, 1/4 to 1/2 pound of an extra good bluegrass seed should be sown on each 1,000 square feet of area. If there is heavy growth of old, dead crabgrass, rake the area before sowing the seed. The question of sowing the seed on a light snow is very debatable. The seed is light, and when the snow melts the seed float on the water and lodge at the lowest place in the soil.

The lawn may be fertilized at the same time the seed is sown. Use good, high-grade, complete fertilizer, such as an 8-8-8 or 10-6-4. Apply at the rate of about 15 pounds to each 1,000 square feet of area. As a matter of fact, if bluegrass seed was sown in September 1960, you probably won't have to sow any more now, but you should apply the fertilizer now. Fertilizer applied at this time will dissolve and become available for the grass to use before weeds, such as crabgrass, begin to germinate in late spring.

An Old Saying: "We Never Miss The Water 'Till The Well Goes Dry"

Pitiful thing is we often miss getting water when we drill the well - there just isn't any water there. Thousands of dry wells have been sunk in Kentucky and we've sunk a lot of money in trying to get water where there isn't any water in the ground. As the geologists say, "There is no ground water." In many parts of the state water may readily be obtained by sinking a well. In other places there is no hope of getting water.

Much of the geoswork in getting water is being overcome through the use of maps designed to show where ground water may be found. The entire state of Kentucky has been or is now being surveyed for ground water. Maps have been completed and are now available for a large area of Central and Northern Kentucky. Counties already mapped are those between Louisville on the west, Cincinnati on the north, Morehead on the east and Stanford or Lincoln County to the south. In a few years maps will be available showing ground water for the remainder of the

state. These maps indicate where ground water may be and also the probable amount and quality.

The maps that are already completed and the new ones as they become available, should be in the hands of County Agents, Soil Conservation personnel and well drillers throughout the state.

Before drilling a well all available maps should be consulted. In this way considerable money may be saved by removing much guesswork that has always been associated with well-drilling in Kentucky.

Farm Ponds And Community Water Systems

In many sections of the state where suitable ground water is not available, adequate farm and home water supply is a big problem. There are two possible solutions to this problem - farm ponds or lakes and community water systems. Farm ponds or lakes may be used as a source of water if it is properly filtered and chlorinated. The two processes can be done fairly easily and cheaply and there is a growing use of pond water in many parts of the state.

A community water system calls for organization of a number of people who want to com-

bine their efforts in supplying water to their farms and homes. A community water system is organized on much the same basis as a Rural Electric Coop. The difference is that water is piped to each farm or home. A good number of community water systems are in successful operation in the state and the number is growing rapidly.

Kentucky Motorists Get License Warning

Records of the Division of Driver Licensing, Kentucky Department of Public Safety, show that several thousand persons have let their operator's licenses expire in recent months.

Don C. Sullivan, Director of the Division of Driver Licensing, said that a license which has expired is worse than no license because it gives a driver a false sense that he is driving legally. To avoid this, the Director asks that every person who holds a Kentucky operator's license, look at it from time to time to make sure that it is still valid.

Every two years, a license must be renewed in the driver's birth month, Sullivan said. The renewal year is printed in the upper right hand corner of the license. If a driver waits to renew his license, it may be necessary for him to be re-examined before he can be issued a new license.

Drivers may make application for renewal of their licenses at the office of the circuit court clerk in the county where they live.

To help drivers keep tab on the date their licenses are due for renewal, the Division of Driver Licensing is beginning a program of periodic reminders, which are being distributed to newspapers, radio and television stations.

Teachers Qualifying Increase Nine Percent

The number of 1961 graduates from Kentucky's 23 colleges and universities who are qualified to teach in elementary and high schools next year will be up 9 per cent over last year. Superintendent of Public Instruction Wendell P. Butler announced this week.

Butler said a statewide study under the supervision of Miss Louise Combs, director of the Division of Teacher Education and Certification, showed a 1961 supply of 2,883 new teachers, up from 2,643 in 1960.

Since 1953, when the education foundation program was established, there has been an 85.5 per cent increase in the number of new teachers graduating from Kentucky schools. According to Superintendent Butler, the increasing supply of college graduates prepared for teaching, plus the higher salaries provided by the State this year, is gradually helping to reduce the teacher shortage.

Kentucky teachers with college degrees received a State-financed raise averaging \$900 per year in 1960.

"During the 1959-60 school year, there were 2,800 teachers in Kentucky schools serving on an emergency basis," Butler said. "These emergency teachers have some preparation in education, but have not received college degrees. They were issued temporary certificates to overcome the teacher shortage."

"During the current school year, we reduced the number of emergency personnel by one-fourth - to 2,100. We expect increased State appropriations for salaries will continue to attract more qualified teachers than within the next two-year period the need for emergency teachers will be virtually eliminated from Kentucky schools."

Motorboats Display Wrong Number Sizes

Many motorboats on Kentucky rivers and lakes are displaying identification numbers of the wrong size, type of color contrast, according to Scott Barbour, director of the Division of Boating, Kentucky Department of Public Safety.

The new State agency has adopted Federal numbering regulations that have been in effect for more than 40 years. They require that boat identification numbers be at least three inches high, block characters of good proportion, and of a color that contrasts with the background to which they are affixed.

The boat owner is responsible, Barbour said, for being sure that the numbers can be read easily so that his boat can be quickly identified.

Dark numbers need to be used on light-colored boats, and light figures on dark-colored craft, the director pointed out.

A contrasting border around numerals is not satisfactory, because it allows them to blend with the background when viewed from a distance, Bar-

bour said. Although some numerals may be advertised as "Coast Guard approved", Barbour said, that agency does not grant specific approval to products of this type.

Motorboats may not be operated on the waterways of Kentucky unless they are properly registered and numbered. Issuance of 1961-62 registration certificates will begin May 1.

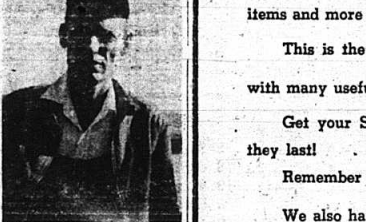

Under present legislation, price supports for the 1961 burley crop will be at the same level as for the 1959 crop, \$37.20 a hundred pounds, adjusted in direct proportion to any change, up or down, in the cost of things farmers buy.
