**Setting Shade Trees**  
Set any time the ground can be worked until growth starts in the spring. Much better trees may be bought from nurserymen than you'll find in the woods. Young trees should be well formed, with a straight trunk, well braced and with a strong and fibrous root system. They are relatively inexpensive considering their length of life and it will pay to start with the best.

**Star Of Bethlehem Pest Control Work Starts Now**  
If you want to control the pest known as Star of Bethlehem (or snowdrop), start now, says James Herron, UK Experiment Station weed-control specialist. This weed - originally introduced as an ornamental flower - has become a serious lawn

pest. It is related to the wild onion family, blooms in the spring, but the tops die out shortly afterward leaving large brown spots in the lawn. Growth starts in late January or early February, but blooms are delayed until March or early June; flowers are star-shaped. Here's what to do:  
Use the material sodium TCA as a spray, at the rate of one pound per gallon of water and apply one quart of this solution (mixture) on each 100 square feet of area. If a sprinkling operation is used, use a pound of sodium TCA in five gallons of water and sprinkle five quarts of the solution on each 100 square feet of area. The best

time to make this treatment is March or early April. Herron points out this treatment will sterilize the soil for two to three months, depending on rainfall and type of soil. Areas so treated can be seeded with lawn grass in September or early October.

**Schedule - Forestry Jobs For 1961**  
Landowners often think forest management starts after a crop of timber has been removed. Profitable forestry, which keep land in condition for top production, starts with standing timber; it starts with

mature trees and the timber sale. A forester usually does the most good if his services are requested before timber is harvested. A doctor doesn't die the deceased much good - all he can do is offer sympathy. Fortunately, a woods can be brought back to life. It may be a long, tough job, but it can be done successfully. Many owners face a period of rebuilding, and 1961 seems a fine time for starting. Long range forecasts indicate that forest industries will use 80 percent more wood in 1999 than they need today. If wood consumption increases,

timber growing should become more profitable. Start managing your forest and produce a full crop of wood. Make a list of all the jobs which should be done in your woods. Get a 1961 calendar and decide what can be done in February, in March and in every month of the year. Don't neglect management; start an action program now. If you can't make a list of things for improving your woodlands, call on your county Extension Agent and your local forester. They will help you.

**Recommendation Given**  
The UK Agricultural Experiment Station this week said it was recommending the fertilizer analysis 4-16-4 for tobacco plant beds.  
Plant beds need a fertilizer low in nitrogen and potash - the scientists say.  
The 4-16-4 analysis should be applied at the rate of 30 pounds per 900 square feet (of a plant bed 9 feet by 100 feet) or 40 pounds per 1,200 square feet (of a bed 12 feet by 100 feet). If the fertilizer is mixed with a pesticide, it should be applied at least 30 days before seeding to control soil insects.

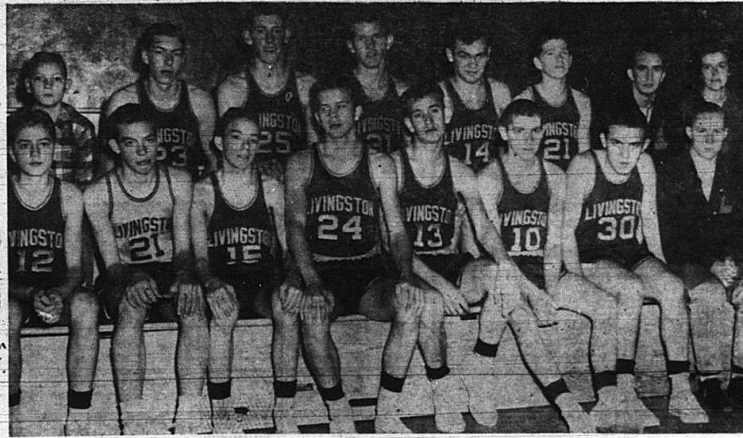

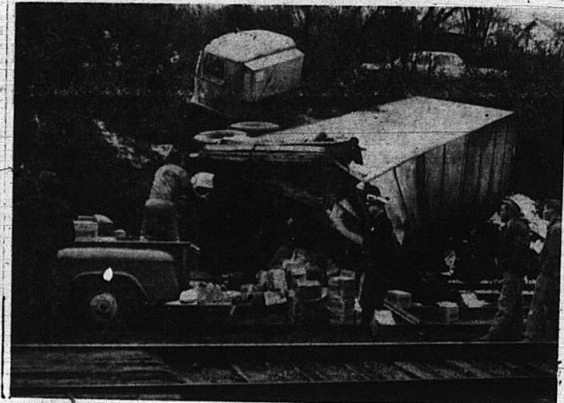

### Farm Grown Lumber Usually Cheaper

Farm-grown and special cut lumber for farm buildings will be cheaper usually than retail-purchased lumber.

So says James Newman, U.S. Cooperative Extension Service forester. He notes, however, that home-grown lumber should be checked for several things.

One is that the very fast-growing pines make rather poor lumber. Inspect bought ends and avoid pieces whose annual growth rings are wider than a quarter inch. (Hardwoods such as oak have good strength regardless of the growth rate).

Cross-grained lumber—from crooked logs—should not be used for framing, trussing or joists and rafters. Wood with cross-grain defects can be used as splice plates where strength is not a major factor.

Lumber is harder to nail if dried, but remember that green lumber will shrink or warp after nailing. Dry oak-or-beech framing are so hard they may have to be bored for nail holes.

If green or partly dry lumber is brought to the farm—stack it properly. County agents have a bulletin which shows how to stack such lumber. Newman's department also has this information.

Don't pile dry lumber on the ground. Protect it from rain or snow. If wet is to be used near the ground for a building, get pressure-treated lumber.

### WOOL GROWERS GET REMINDER

Wool growers were reminded today that the 1960-program payments, to be made this summer, will be made only on wool and unshorn lambs which are marketed before March 31, 1961. This is the closing date for the 1960 Program.

Shelbie Mullins, chairman of the Rockcastle County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, also pointed out that applications for such payments under the 1960 wool program must be filed before the end of April 1961.

He emphasized that adequate records on the sales must support the information on the payment applications. For instance, producers' sales records for shorn wool should show name and address of buyer, date of sale, name and address of producer, net weight of wool and net proceeds to producer after normal marketing deductions.

Payments to producers for the 1960 marketing year will follow the same methods employed for the 1959 year. Shorn wool payments will be equal to the percentage of each producer's cash returns from wool sales. The percentage—to be announced later this year—will be that required to raise the national average price received by all producers for shorn wool during the marketing year up to the incentive price of 62 cents per pound.

Lamb payments will be made to each producer who sells lambs that have never been shorn. The payments will be at a rate per hundredweight of live animals marketed to compensate for the wool on them on a basis comparable to the
