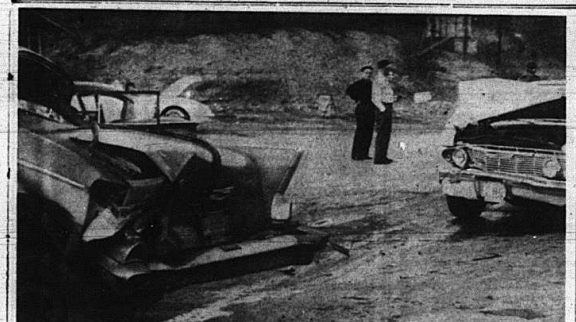

## ROUNDSTONE GAME

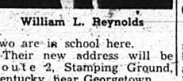

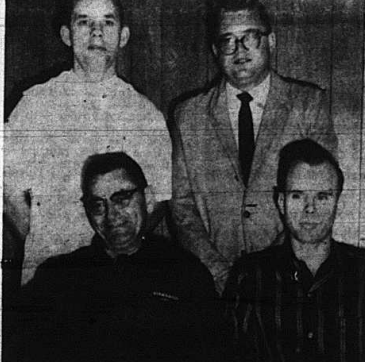

way in an accident in which total damage is \$100 or more, or when personal injury or death occurs.

Kentucky law clearly states, Sullivan pointed out, that the operator of any motor vehicle involved in an accident is responsible for filing the report. This report is due in the Department of Public Safety in Frankfort within 10 days after the accident.

A person whose driver's li-

cence is suspended must take a driver's test before his license is reinstated.

Accident report forms are available from all police agencies. Sullivan cautioned those filing reports to spell correctly the full names of all drivers and owners.

The Financial Responsibility Bureau in his division is always available, Sullivan said, to assist drivers in complying with the law.

# To The Voters Of Rockcastle County

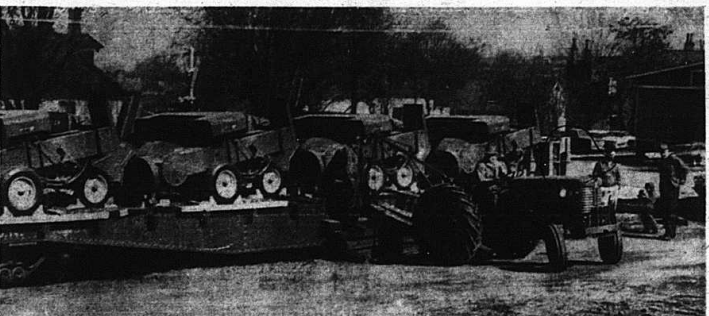
