**Forestry Notes**

To reword a well-known phrase, "a farm is a farm is a farm." But just what is a farm? Does land have to have live stock, chickens, and tobacco on it to be a farm?  
Last week I examined the long tree farm near Lewis up on Chestnut Ridge Road. To anyone passing by it would appear to be nothing more than an area of woodland. And they would be right, because this is a Tree Farm.

**Law Care Important During Early Spring**  
February may seem the wrong time for thinking about lawn care, but some things can and should be done now, according to N. R. Elliott, UK Extension horticulturist.  
If your lawn was sown in bluegrass seed this past September, late February is the time to apply fertilizer, so that it will give you and the grass can use it before weeds start to germinate in late spring. Use a good, high-grade, complete fertilizer, such as 8-6-8 or 10-6-4, he suggests. Apply at the rate of about 15 pounds per 1,000 square feet.  
Late February is also the best time to sow bluegrass seed. September is the recommended month, but, if you did not get your lawn sown last fall, this is the best time to do it. Usually, 14 to 25 pounds of an extra good bluegrass seed should be sown on an extra 1,000 square feet of lawn area.  
Planning your flower and shrub arrangement now, during the cold weather, can give you better looking grounds next summer. You may want to change the location of some flowers, move some shrubs, discard some old shrubs, or add new ones. Making plans now will help you be ready to make needed changes when the time comes.  
If there's many varieties of plants on the market confuse you and you need help, visit your local county Extension agent.

Plant beds need a fertilizer low in nitrogen and potash the scientist says.  
The 4-16-4 analysis should be applied at the rate of 30 pounds per 800 square feet of a plant bed 9 feet by 100 feet or 40 pounds per 1,200 square feet of a plant bed 12 feet by 100 feet.  
If the fertilizer is mixed with a pesticide, it should be applied at least 30 days before seeding to control soil insects.

## Old Depot At Brodhead To Be Torn Down Soon



The man that entered the L&N depot at Brodhead was tall, unshaven, sunburned, and looked as if he'd been "on the road" for many a week.

He looked steadily and coolly at Agent J. R. Cass. Suddenly, as if to make up his mind, he drew a gun and leveled it at the agent.

In the minutes that followed, he tied Mr. Cass, gagged him, took an undisclosed amount of money, and left. A conductor found the bound agent a considerable time later and released him. The railroad reports the "culprit" is still at large.

Such was the "hazards of the business" in railroading in 1902, and especially for agents in smaller depots across the land.

In a short time, the sound of hammers will be heard, and the old Brodhead landmark, that could tell many a violent story, will be torn down.

Maurice Howard, who operates a funeral home in the depot building, and Wilson Green are taking bids on the wrecking work. Mr. Howard plans to move the usable lumber to Crab Orchard to construct a display room at his funeral home there.

Many people in the area will still remember the "good old days" of the Brodhead depot. It was to the depot that every one headed when it was time for a train.

"Who got off?" was a popular question if someone happened to be late. "I wonder who they're going to visit?" could become or be expanded into a general talk-fest.

In those days, the railroad boomed with passengers. Many Rockcastle residents still remember the fare was 15 cents from Mt. Vernon to Brodhead; and many caught old 21, 22, 23, and 24 between the two towns to do business, or to go to the fair, or to court the pretty Brodhead girls.

It was easy and convenient for Mt. Vernon people to catch the Louisville-bound train late in the afternoon, ride to Brodhead, and return about 11 p.m. on the Corbin-bound train. It also worked just as well for Livingston residents.

## COURTS REMOVE BONDS ROADBLOCK

With the removal of legal roadblocks, workers in the State Veterans Division are now enthusiastic over the prospect of beginning early payment on Kentucky's veterans bonus. State officials hope to offer \$100 million bonus bonds for sale sometime in March.

Then, after a 30-day delivery period, the buyer will pay for the bonds and the State can start paying bonus claims.

Another \$35 million to \$50 million in bonds will be sold later to complete the program. Around 450,000 claims are expected in about half that number have already filed. All claims must be filed by midnight, Dec. 31, 1961.

Kentucky is the first state ever to pay a bonus to veterans of four wars at one time. Payment is based on rates of 39 per cent of the state's debt and \$15 per month for overseas duty. A maximum of \$300 is allowed for domestic duty and \$500 for overseas duty.

When the checks do start going out, there will be a backlog of over 70,000 approved claims to be paid at once. Almost 50 per cent of the claims are having to be returned for additional required information of some kind. Adjutant Gen. Arthur V. Loyd this week announced the addition of a Saturday shift in the Processing and Certification Branches of the Veterans Division, beginning Feb. 18. The Saturday shift will affect only bonus processing and certification employees, he said.

Claims examiners urge applicants to get help from the veterans organizations or from the Red Cross in properly filling out the form. They also ask people not to write in about their claims except to give notice of change of address or at a veteran's death. Unnecessary correspondence, they say, serves only to delay a claim.

There are 32 local FFA members who have a supervised farming program. The major enterprises of the boys are tobacco, dairy, beef, hogs, corn and hay.

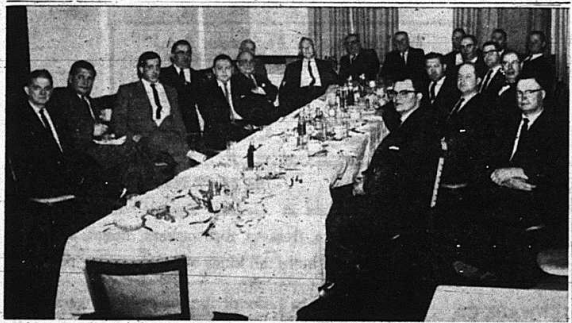

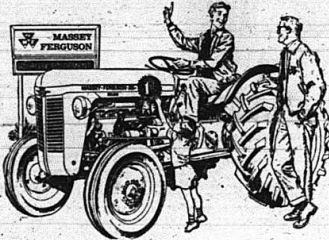

Shearing Ewes Test Staged By U of K

Shearing ewes prior to breeding may bring earlier lambing under certain conditions, the UK Experiment Station animal husbandry department has found.

P. G. Woolfolk, sheep researcher, last season raised four groups of ewes sheared prior to breeding. In two of these groups, he found, average lambing dates were a week to three weeks earlier. In the other groups, there was no appreciable difference.

Woolfolk used the following groups: (1) Two-year-old Texas ewes of Suffolk cross origin; this group's lambing date average was no better than the unshorned group composed of similar ewes) and the lambing percentage was no better.

(2) A group of Hampshire crosses on a two-year-old ewes; the sheared ewes lambed about three days sooner on the average and had a slightly better lambing average.

(3) Hampshire cross yearling Montana ewes; these animals lambed about three weeks earlier than the unshorned ewes.

Woolfolk said the shearing did not help or hinder average daily gains in the test. Likewise, the twice annual shearing did NOT bring extra wool. But, he says, the test indicates that shearing might be beneficial to improve breeding performance of Montana ewes.

## Make Timber Loans To Small Companies

A new program to provide loans to small firms purchasing timber from national forests was announced jointly today by Robert F. Collins, Forest Supervisor, Cumberland National Forest, USDA and James G. Garwick, Regional Director, Small Business Administrations.

The program developed jointly by the Small Business Administration and the Forest Service, Department of Agriculture will provide small firms with funds for building access roads and thus reduce the strain on working capital needed for normal operating expenses.

Applications to SBA for road construction loans will be accepted only from small business concerns who are successful bidders for national forest timber sales and who can meet the size, eligibility and credit requirements of the Small Business Administration.

SBA business loans may not exceed \$50,000 in Government.
