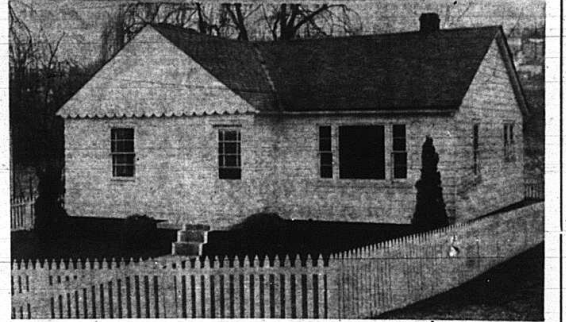

Successful Year -

Rockcastle County Health Department Reports

Through the cooperation of civic and county organizations, as well as individual citizens, the work of the Rockcastle County Health Department during 1960 was extremely successful.

So goes a report of the department's activities during 1960 issued this week by Dr. Walker Owens, health officer. In his report, Doctor Owens stressed the following:

Communicable Diseases

Visits to schools and homes where dangerous communicable diseases have been reported are a routine health department activity to guard against epidemics. During this period 4017 immunizations were given.

Tuberculosis constitutes a major problem of control for communicable diseases in the county. There now are 28 active cases of TB under supervision, 12 of which are hospitalized.

Ten new cases were diagnosed. A total of 924 people received an x-ray at the time the mobile unit was in the county. In addition, skin testing was continued on 40 first graders who are from TB families. This completes all known contacts of active cases.

School Service

During this period, 862 school children received physical examinations or individual inspections. 188 visual tests were given, resulting in discovery of 125 with visual defects. These children were referred for further examination and treatment. (Continued on Page 4)

Should Disclose Feed Grain Acreage

Farmers in Rockcastle County who may be interested in a possible feed grain production adjustment program in 1961 are urged to call at the County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation office, according to Shellee Mullins, chairman of the ASC County Committee.

The request is made to farmers at this time because farm feed grain and other crop acreage information will be needed for any feed grain program that may be authorized for the coming crop season.

Farmers who supply feed grain and other acreage figures at this time will not be obligated to participate in a feed program if one becomes available, but will be eligible to participate.

However, Mr. Mullins points out that a program can be quickly put into operation if the necessary farm acreage information is on file at the county office. He asks farmers' cooperation in providing information that will be needed before a program can be put in effect.

Interested farmers are asked to bring to the county ASC office their records of the acreage of cropland used for feed getting away. (Continued on Page 4)

 ment.
 The service of a dental health trailer and a dentist were obtained in 1960. 1350 dental inspections were performed on school children by the nurse and dental technician. Dental corrections were made by the dentist on 732 children. 58 dental health talks were made by the nurse to 2855 children.
 In place of having the dental trailer this year, Dr. Loyce is to have a 3-hour weekly clinic at his office.

Chronic Disease
 As good health practices increase our life span, chronic disease or diseases of middle and old age become more and more a public health problem. The report stated. During this period, 18 persons with cancer or suspected cancer were seen and 15 more were sent to the cancer clinic. 100 heart persons were seen by the Health Department, 10 of which were referred for further treatment. In addition to this, 18 patients are receiving treatment for rheumatic fever at home. These children daily receive Bicillin tablets furnished by the American Heart Association. Since not all patients are receiving Bicillin that should be, an effort is being made to reach these people.

Crippled Service
 There were 24 children admitted to this service last year. Part of these children were hospitalized, others have received surgery. On the remaining ones, the department gave advisory home visits and follow-up work.

Health Education
 Health information for individuals and groups is provided through the use of weekly radio programs, pamphlets, posters, news articles, film showing and talks from members of the Health Department. Citizens are encouraged to participate in community health programs and to take an active interest in local health projects.

Sanitation
 During this period, 182 restaurants, 21 hotels and motels and 5 schools were inspected. The department took 49 pasteurized milk samples and 41 water samples to the laboratory for examination and analysis. Supervision and help were also provided to the people of the county in matters such as public and private water supplies, fairs, carnivals and other objects of environmental sanitation.

It is the duty of the sanitarian to help Rockcastle County maintain a healthful standard of living, by working with the community groups for clean homes, clean farms, clean businesses and industry, a clean neighborhood and a clean community.
 The sanitarian is trained to

be aware of the potential health dangers which may exist, such as unsafe water and milk supply, polluted streams, garbage or trash dump, uncontrolled rats, flies and mosquitoes. By being sure that the local and state laws relating to sanitation are carried out, the sanitarian is working in the interest of the community.

Laboratory Services
 Tests for typhoid, diphtheria and other infectious diseases and bacteriological and chemical analysis of milk, water, food and sewage may be secured through your local health department.
 Examination of stool specimens for the presence of intestinal parasites and examinations of the brains of animals suspected of having rabies are also services which the local health department provides.

Vital Statistics
 Collection of birth and death certificates and the issuance of burial permits are the duties of the local health department. Facts concerning communicable diseases are gathered by the local health department and used in planning improved public health programs.

There were 198 births and 101 deaths in the county through Sept. 30, 1960. A complete count for the year is not available just now as all birth certificates for 1960 have not yet been filed.

of the health department will promote a better health for our county. I think it would be to the benefit of the community if we are trying to accomplish, and therefore hope that they will make use of the health department to the best advantage.

First of all, we have trained personnel to carry out the services provided. They are equipped to do full-time preventive health service. It is imperative that our nurses, sanitarian and clerk must have the assistance of everyone in the community—other physicians, dentists, milk dealers, restaurant owners, school teachers, employers and employees of all sorts—in order to have a public health program which works.

The Rockcastle County Board of Health consists of three practicing physicians, a representative of the Fiscal Court, a Dentist and the County Judge. In the event that a special situation arises, such as an epidemic, the Board meets and considers the steps needed to control same. Then the Health Department staff acts on the measures decided upon by the Board.

In summing up, it would be impossible to thank all the people who have helped make our work successful during the past 12 months—this would take pages of paper. We do,

however, thank all groups that have been cooperative and helpful.

corn, grain sorghums, oats, barley, and other crops for the crop years 1959 and 1960.

The report should be on the basis of the acreage planted and the use made of the crop produced. Accurate information must be obtained immediately for possible establishment of farm feed grain base acreage.

Since Rockcastle County is classed as a minor feed grain producing area, only interested farmers are being asked to make reports. In counties classed as major feed grain producing areas, acreage reports are being obtained for all farms.

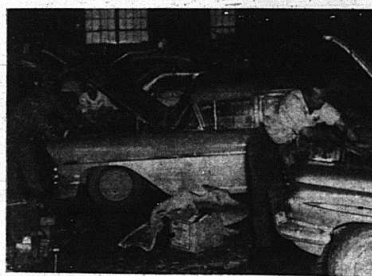
