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will be showing up now, says Lytle Leonard, UK Cooperative Service conservatorship. They should be repaired before heavy spring rains erode them. He recommends a covering of manure, to help get grass going. At this time of year, manure probably is plentiful. It makes some soil cover and protection, as well as fertilizing. It also protects it from grazing. If manure is not available, use mulching material. Straw or crop residues will be well. Put this material on thin spots.

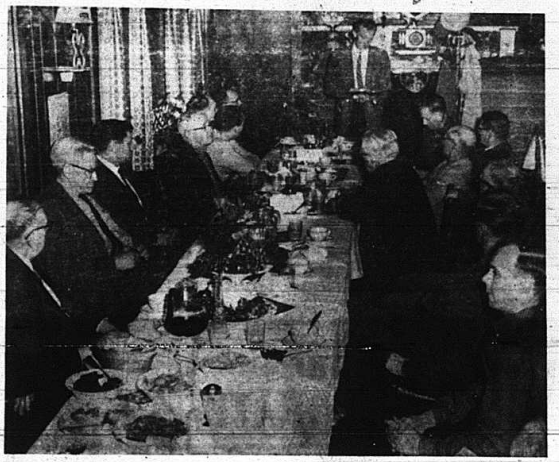

Kentucky Sheep Week

Scheduled May 8-12

Early lamb production will be the theme of this year's Kentucky Sheep Week, scheduled May 8-12.

As scheduled is a two-day conference on foot rot, says R. C. Miller, UK Cooperative Extension Service specialist.

The Sheep Week observance opens Monday, May 8 with the Eastern Kentucky sectional meeting. This will be at Quick-and-Experiment Substation in Breathitt County. The 24th annual meeting of Kentucky

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sheepmen will be Tuesday, May 9 at the UK Experiment Station farm in Lexington. The foot-rot conference will be May 10-11 and replaces this year the usual scheduled farm tour.

The week closes with a sectional session Friday, May 12, at the Princeton Experiment Substation in Caldwell County.

Early lamb production is featured this year to help sheepmen get away from late lambing as far as possible. The more lambs finished for sale at 85 to 100 pounds for May and June means more money for the more profit for sheepmen.

Outside-state and in-state producers and sheep authorities have been secured for the various meetings.

Better Roads Needed

State Boss Declares

Highways in the 10 counties of the Eighth Highway District have 83.15 miles of roads that do not measure up to the standard to which they should be built, Henry Ward, commissioner of highways, has pointed out in a letter to members of Congress from Kentucky.

Ward told the legislators that unless more Federal money is made available, we cannot expedite the Federal aid highway program in Kentucky.

"Under the present financing plan, we will have an estimated \$2,786,000 a year," which the Federal Government and State Government have put up in equal amounts, to accomplish the job," Ward said.

"At this rate it would take 34 years to bring the deficient highways up to standard."

Ward said that a report of the Automotive Safety Foundation and reviews of that report by the Department of Transportation show there are 9,310.2 miles of road in the state that are deficient. There are

19,091 miles of highways on the Federal aid system in Kentucky.

These deficiencies cannot be corrected with the funds available to the Department of Highways in a period of time that would meet the needs of our state," he said.

Ward said, "I am not suggesting that we are seeking to transfer this whole problem to Washington. It is one that all of us as Kentuckians need to know about, however, so that we may work together to seek its solution."

State Tobacco Fields

Should Be Plowed Now

Tobacco-field plowing time is here now, says Russell Hunt, UK Cooperative Extension Service tobacco specialist.

Sod fields should be plowed immediately, he says. Small grain fields should be plowed by mid-April.

Manure, stalks and all fertilizer should be plowed under. There is little or no danger of losing nutrients by leaching when fields are plowed at this time.

There are some advantages to plowing under fertilizer, Hunt notes:

1. Fertilizer is easier to ap-

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ply on soil prior to plowing. It is a cheaper method of application.

2. Fertilizer plowed under is moved from the surface to the bottom of the furrow. It will be dissolved and available to the crop; when plowed under, even under dry conditions.

3. Plowing fertilizer under may help reduce weed growth in the field. It is also a desirable way to get high yields.

County Gets \$40,124

January State Aid

Payments to Rockcastle counties on the State's public assistance rolls totaled \$40,124 in January, Commissioner of Economic Security Earle V. Powell announced this week.

Powell said the payments represent a total increase in the county of \$2,185 over January, 1960.

The average payment to the county's aged last month was \$49.71; payments to the families of dependent children averaged \$88.03; payments to

the needy blind averaged \$43.92; and payments to the permanently and totally disabled averaged \$31.19.

Powell said payments to the county's public assistance recipients are increased this year due to the State's new revenue program. The sales tax, which went into effect last July, allowed the State to increase its total allotments for public assistance, which in turn increased matching funds from the Federal government for the program.
