Fiscal Court Ups County Judge's Salary

COURT DECREASES COUNTY ATTORNEY

The salary of the county judge was raised and the salary of the county attorney lowered as of July 1, in action by the Rockcastle Fiscal Court this week. The salary of the county judge will be increased \$75 per month, or \$900 a year. The judge has been receiving \$3,000 a year plus fees from court costs, not in excess of \$7,200 a year. The salary of the county attorney will be reduced from \$125 a month to \$50 a month. With the \$75 decrease, the court was able to apply it to the salary of the county judge. The vote for the salary change was unanimous. It was the second increase for the county judge in the last 16 years, and the first since 1945 by the members of the court. County Atty. James Lambert suggested to the court that the salary of the county attorney be reduced and the reduction applied to the salary of the county judge whose job Mr. Lambert is doing. Both offices have a \$7,200 per year State Statute limitation. All salaries under the court's jurisdiction came in for a re-visit, and all but the county judge and county attorney remained the same. Magistrates will continue to receive \$50 per month as a trial judge, and \$15 for each Fiscal Court meeting. The county court clerk will receive \$50 per month with fees not to exceed \$7,200 a year. The sheriff will receive payment not in excess of \$7,200. Both the sheriff and the county court clerk will get a maximum of \$10,000 a year (if they collect that much) from fees to apply to office expenses and deputy salaries. The jailer will receive pay not to exceed \$7,200 a year. Other county salaries are: Coroner, \$50 per month; dog warden, \$30 per month; janitor, \$75 per month; county librarian, \$50; county court stenographer, \$25 per month, and livestock inspector, \$20 a year. The court also re-appointed Ernest Bullock as county treasurer, at a salary of \$75 per month, the same amount as in (Continued on page 4)

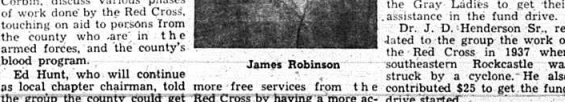

Letter To Editor

The year 1961 may be a year of decision for the people of Kentucky and Rockcastle County; a year in which we may decide to go forward, or we may continue our slow and plodding way along the Path of Progress. Do we wish to be informed of the giant strides made by some of our neighboring states in the matter of industrial expansion, better educational opportunities, increased payments to welfare and better roads, or do we want Kentucky to stay just as she is?

Not many years ago North Carolina was comparable in resources and per capita wealth to that of Kentucky. Through strong leadership and a proper tax program to pay for expanded services we have outstripped us that there is no longer any comparison. 9 DAYS REMAIN TO PAY TAXES

There are less than 12 days to go and over 200,000 Kentuckians have not filed their 1960 Federal Income Tax Returns. The majority of these taxpayers are in the 1040A tax bracket having income of up to \$10,000 may use this form providing their income consists of wages reported on W-2, and not more than \$200 in dividends, interest and wages not subject to withholding according to G. C. Hooks, district director.

In using Form 1040A the tax standards taxpayers take the deduction allowed in lieu of the deduction for contribution, interest, taxes medical and other expenses.

As in the past years taxpayers with income under \$5,000 may figure their own tax or have the Internal Revenue Service do it for them.

Mr. Hooks said if the taxpayer computes his own tax and finds additional tax due, he must have money order payable to "Internal Revenue Service" must accompany the return.

Johnsson Grass Seeds Live Long Time Buried

No wonder Johnsson grass, the farm pest, is so troublesome. Its seeds apparently live for long periods in a dormant state before suddenly taking the notion to sprout.

J. F. Freeman, UK Experiment Station weed specialist, found that Johnsson grass seed he put 100 Johnsson grass seed in clay pots and buried five sets of several of these pots in the summer of 1956.

In succeeding years he has dug up one set of the pots and tested the seed for germination ability.

Of the set dug up in the summer of 1960, four seeds after burial, 81 seeds of each 100 buried still were viable.

Freeman has one set of pots left—and little doubt as to what he will find about the seeds' vigour.

He says: "No wonder Johnsson grass is such a pest. It reproduces from underground rootstocks, which can be virtually eliminated by continuing cultivation. But it's a different matter with buried seeds. Some of them can stay dormant for years—then suddenly germinate and have the farmer in trouble almost overnight."

Rules On Boating Discussed By State

The new Division of Boating this Spring will begin enforcing regulations to safeguard boaters, swimmers and fishermen on Kentucky waterways.

Scott Barbour, director of the division in the Department of Public Safety, said the number of complaints from victims of reckless boaters should be reduced by enforcement of a regulation which specifies:

"No person shall operate any motorboat, or manipulate any water ski, surfboard or similar device in a reckless manner— or from or within 100 feet of regular bays, moorings, harbors, or swimming areas, or within 100 feet of a dam or lock."

The regulation also requires that boats in harbors or congested areas be operated at idle speed or with no wake.

Boats are prohibited from operating in areas designated for swimming in waters not designated but being used by swimmers; boaters should use every precaution, Barbour said.

Boats passing moored craft must do so in a manner and at a speed not to endanger the occupants by swamping the moored boat. Skiers and swimmers must exercise care as swimmers, skiers should not place themselves in jeopardy. Although the regulations do not specify it, Barbour said, "Boats should show yielding fishing boats every courtesy."

First Checks Mailed To State's Needy

The Kentucky Department of Economic Security has mailed the first payment checks to needy persons under the program of medical aid to the indigent, Commissioner Earle V. Powell announced.

The first batch of 32 checks, representing \$634.15, went to pharmacists who have filled prescriptions for medical supplies to needy persons covered under the new State program.

Powell said first checks to physicians, dentists and hospitals for services under the program would be mailed Wednesday, March 29, and represent a total of \$2,659 in medical care.

Kentucky began accepting applications for indigents for medical care in January, Powell said. The program did not receive final Federal approval until late March, however, which has caused the delay in mailing payment checks.

"In the future," he said, "checks will be mailed to medical vendors in the month following treatment."

The checks to pharmacists cover payment for 183 prescriptions which have been filled since the program began. The first check on the list was made out to the Campton Drug Company, Campton, for \$109.

Public Assistance For February Told

Kentucky's public assistance recipients received a total of \$5,107,576 in February, Commissioner of Economic Security Earle V. Powell announced this week.

Of this amount, \$39,633 went to Rockcastle Counties who are on the public assistance rolls. In February 1960, recipients here received \$37,904.

Powell said the statewide total for the month represents an increase of \$623,165 over money paid by his department last year.

He said the increased payments this year resulted from the larger budget, financed largely by sales tax receipts. Public assistance payments are made in four categories: this county, the aged (65 or older) received an average payment of \$49.54; the families with one or more dependent children received an average payment of \$87.21; the newly blind received an average payment of \$48.45; and the permanently and totally disabled received an average payment of \$51.72.

did not report the wages to the Director of Internal Revenue for the employees. It was then necessary to contact the employer for information concerning the wages that should have been reported for social security purposes.

All persons except farm people who pay household help \$50.00 or more in cash wages during a calendar quarter must report the wages to the Director of Internal Revenue. Earnings low as \$40.00 a week during each of the 13 weeks in a calendar quarter will equal \$52.00 and this amount must be reported. The cash wages of domestic employees on a farm operated for profit are reported along with any other employees on an annual basis instead of quarterly. If such an employee is paid \$150.00 or more in cash, the employer must report it. If any other farm worker is not paid as much as \$50.00 cash wages in a calendar year, the wages regardless of the amount paid must be reported if he or she works as many as 20 or more days in the year on a time basis by the day, week, etc.
