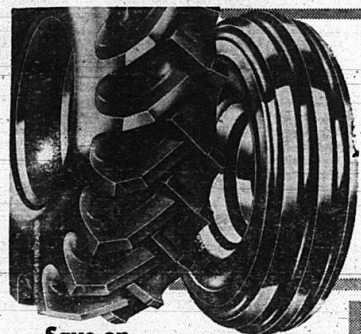

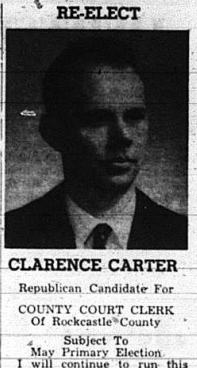

Emphasis will be placed on reaching persons who are most likely to have tuberculosis. X-rays will be given to anyone 20 and over. They will be given persons under 20 years of age only if they have positive readings on tuberculin skin tests.

The unit will be Dr. Walker Owens Health officer, a positive skin test does not mean that a person has tuberculosis but that they have a positive skin test. The physician will decide how often a person under 20 has been exposed to someone who has. Therefore, the most recent program for tuberculosis casefinding calls for X-rays to be given to persons under 20 years of age only if they have positive readings on tuberculin skin tests.

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### Three Area Wrecks Injure Six People

Three auto accidents causing injuries to six persons occurred within the last few days.

### Forest Fire Time Nears

Would you set fire to a neighbor's house? Of course you wouldn't. Do you know that nine out of every ten forest fires are caused by careless people who think of themselves as law-abiding citizens?

So reports S. Ronald Singer, service forester, London.

The burning of dead grass, brush, and trash is responsible for the destruction of millions of dollars worth of personal property every year, Mr. Singer said.

"Remember, when you go into a forest to fish, hike, or picnic, always be careful with fire. Before starting a fire be sure you are prepared for any emergency. Be a good neighbor. When a forest burns everybody loses."

"When you see a wild-fire, report it to your county fire guard as soon as possible. Early detection will save your neighbors' land and possibly yours, too. Your county fire guard and his crew are trained to save your land and put out the fire as quickly as possible," Mr. Singer noted.

Your fire guard will also show you how to use fire safely if you have to burn for any reason.

Be safe. Contact your county fire guard, C. G. Stewart, at 256-2335, in order to report a forest fire, or to ask for help in using fire to burn an area, he said.

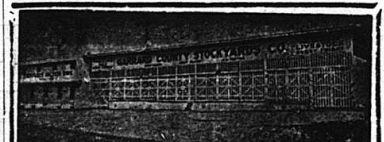

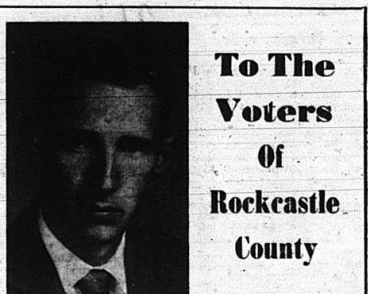
