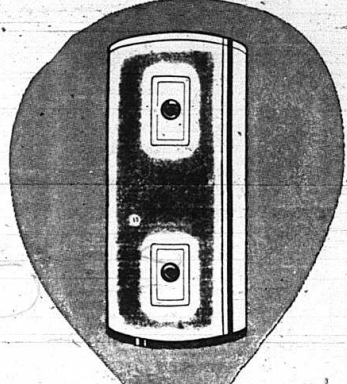

To The Attack

Civil War Group Readies Program For Year

Some 15 persons interested in the activities of the new Centennial Committee took a look at various projects available to work on during the year at a meeting Monday night at Renfro Valley.

When every possible project was explained and examined, the group voted to make its top project a re-created production of gunpowder at Great Salt-peter Cave with souvenir samples of the gunpowder.

The group also set up a committee to check with various organizations and individuals to see if they would like to participate in a North-South color guard complete with uniforms. Those participating would purchase the uniforms.

Appointed to the committee were Jim Earl Hammons, Henry Hines and Billy Gregory. The project at Salt-peter Cave includes re-constructing and assembling vats, pipes and other materials that were used in the manufacture of gunpowder during the Civil War. The cave was the focal point of gunpowder manufacture for the Northern armies. The gunpowder made by the group will be packaged and sold to visitors.

Some discussion was held concerning a re-enactment of the Battle of Wildcat Mountain near Livingston on October 21, the anniversary of the battle. The group left the decision to a later date.

Several names of persons from Rockcastle who participated in the Civil War were listed at the meeting. Schools and other groups have been searching for as complete a record as possible of those who participated either with the North or the South.

The next meeting of the Centennial Committee will be May 8 at the Renfro Valley studios. The public is invited.

Circuit Court Holds 4 Trials

A circuit court jury Friday found Frank Himes, 18, of the Disputanta area, guilty of voluntary manslaughter and fixed his punishment at 2 years in the penitentiary.

Himes' attorneys appealed the case to the Kentucky Court of Appeals.

Himes was convicted on the manslaughter charge stemming from an auto collision near Renfro Valley in which Mrs. Thelma Foster, of Somerset, was killed.

In another case, Clinton Gill, Wildcat, was found not guilty on a charge of housebreaking. In another case, John R. Hill of Berea, was found not guilty on a charge of voluntary manslaughter. Mr. Hill was charged in the death of Arthur Taylor of Snider, in June 1958. Mr. Taylor was walking along U. S. 25 when he was struck and killed.

Robert "Duke" Gibson, no address was released to out-of-county law enforcement officers, after a jury failed to agree on a verdict in his forgery case. Gibson was accused of raising the amount of American Express money orders.

Will Livingston get a new bridge over the Rockcastle River in an area south of town? This question was thrashed around this week by several officials, but apparently the "yes" or "no" remains with the State Department of Highways, or finally with the citizens of Livingston who are interested in the project.

The object of the bridge is to have a road across to Ward Cemetery on the south side of the Rockcastle River, access to several residents, and to Wildcat Battlefield, a Civil War battleground.

At the present, some 12 to 15 families live in the area across the river and immediately adjacent to Livingston. Ward Cemetery is in Rockcastle County, Wildcat Battlefield is in Laurel County.

In a letter to County Attorney James W. Lambert, who wrote him concerning the bridge, Congressman Eugene Siler wrote this week that he was in sympathy with the bridge project and would contact the State Department of Highways in an effort to get state funds for the bridge.

Families in the area now have to walk across the L & N Railroad bridge, or cross the river by boat. In the dry summer months, cars can ford at a point about a half-mile from the town and near Trolley Inn.

How much money it will take for the bridge project is a matter of conjecture. It will depend on the type of bridge. A one-lane steel structure would probably cost between \$5,000 and \$10,000. A two-lane, highway concrete structure could cost over \$100,000.

Dr. R. G. Webb has indicated residents would probably be very pleased with almost any kind of bridge. Earlier he had mentioned it might be possible to obtain a one-lane steel bridge that the state had taken out at some location.

An editorial in a recent issue of the Signal entitled "Livingston Needs Its Bridge" was read last week by Gov. Ben Combs and passed along to Henry Ward, Commissioner of Highways. Mr. Ward indicated a study of the project would be made at the time Rockcastle is allocated state funds for rural road construction.

Use Brodhead Depot Lot For Parking

As predicted, the Louisville & Nashville Railroad Company has agreed to lease the land, at the site of the Brodhead depot to the City of Brodhead to be used as a community parking lot, according to W. R. Winkler, superintendent of the Railroad.

Railroad officials set an annual rental fee of \$5. At the present time, the Brodhead depot is being torn down and the usable lumber moved to Crab Orchard by Fumeral Director Maurice Howard to be used to construct a display room for his funeral home there.

Although the effective date of the benefits of the Act is July 1, 1961, Mr. Briley emphasized that the April 30 date is not an arbitrary deadline.

He pointed out that prior to July 1 all registrations must be checked to assure that they are correct and procedures must be established to increase or reduce the annuitant's retirement annuity, depending on whether he elects to continue under private coverage or to elect coverage under the Uniform Plan for which the Civil Service Commission is contracting with the Aetna Life Insurance Company.

In addition, the Aetna Company must know who is enrolling under the Uniform Plan so as to set up its records and prepare the necessary identification cards for issuance to persons enrolled in that plan.
