**Plow-Up Cover Crops In Tobacco Fields**

Since March and early April have had heavy rainfall, small grain cover crops on tobacco field sites have made rapid growth. Thus, it's time to plow under these cover crops.

Sod tobacco field sites should have been plowed by now.

That the word from Russell Hunt and Ira Maasie, UK Cooperative Extension Service tobacco specialists. They issue a few tips for the work:

1) Apply fertilizer and manure to the field before plowing the cover crop, then turn it all under by mid-April. This will permit decay of organic matter in the manure and of the roots and tops of the cover crop.

2) Don't apply manure to the surface and leave it there. This causes loss of nitrogen from the manure (if weather conditions are hot and clear, a favorable condition for nitrogen loss).

When turned under, manure's nitrogen will be retained in the soil. And, they say, don't apply manure too late; this can cause trouble as outlined above.

3) Plowing fields early (turning under small-grain cover crops) to speed decay of the organic matter may possibly help prevent a field condition known as "pythium soft rot." (Rotting of the plant stem near the top of the soil). This condition arises often, especially if the soil surface is filled with decaying organic matter.

**Resident Law Changed For Bonus Requirement**

Nov. 3, 1959, is a date no longer significant to claimants for Kentucky's veterans bonus. September's special session of the legislature removed it from the bonus law.

Item 5 in the application form (pink) used by living veterans and item 4 in the beneficiary (yellow) forms thus are

no longer needed. A million forms have been printed, however, about 75 per cent of them distributed. It was impossible to call all the blank forms back in—And-to-issue new, correct forms would have compounded the confusion. So a slip was printed advising people to ignore the obsolete item.

A spokesman for Adjutant Gen. A. Y. Lloyd, bonus administrator, says the slip were given widespread distribution throughout the state. A slip accompanies every individual application form mailed to an individual, and one goes out with every batch shipped to a county court house, bank, service organization or anywhere else. He said that everyone of the people qualified to assist

veterans in filling out the forms is familiar with the change in the requirement.

"But," he added, "there are still some people, particularly those living outside the state, who may not know that Nov. 3 residency is no longer a bonus requirement."

"General Lloyd is anxious to get all the claims filed as soon as possible," the spokesman said. "He feels that there may be delay in some cases because of a misunderstanding in this matter. He hopes Kentucky people will advise their out-of-state friends and relatives that the law has been changed and that Nov. 3 affidavits are not now needed. "Just tell them to get those applications in," he said.

**Corn Yields Increase If Plant Population Up**

Kentucky farmers probably would increase corn yields per acre from 10 to 12 bushels if they would increase the "plant population" of their corn fields. That's the belief of the UK Agricultural Experiment Station agronomy department. They base it on a three-year "rate and date" test at three locations.

Fields that had 8,000 plants per acre -- average for Kentucky commercial farms -- averaged 74.5 bushels an acre. That's a respectable yield, the agronomists say; but fields of 12,000 plants per acre averaged 81.1 bushels.

When the population was jumped to 16,000 an acre, the yield was 94.6 bushels. But, say James Shane and Frank Leefer, researchers, the 16,000 plants-per-acre requires additional fertilizer and increasingly careful management. This is especially true when fertility levels of fields are known to be low.

They think 12,000 to 14,000 plants an acre would "do very well" for a Kentucky average, therefore.

As for a date of planting: Fields planted on April 25 uniformly had higher yields than those planted May 12, May 28 or June 8. These experiments indicate that the best planting dates are between April 25 and May 10.

**Sign-up Deadline, May 12 For Feed Grain Program**

The sign-up of farmers in the 1961 feed grain program is now well under way in Rockcastle County, according to word from Shellie Mullins, chairman of County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee.

The program provides payments to corn and grain sorghum producers who divert a portion of the acreage formerly planted to these crops to an approved conservation use.

The average county rate is \$29.50 per acre for reducing such acreage a minimum of 20 per cent below the base 1959-60 average. Individual farm rates may be higher or lower, depending on the farm's productivity in relation to the county average. A higher rate will apply for reducing corn and grain sorghum acreage from 20 to 40 per cent below the base.

Corn and grain sorghum producers must cooperate in the 1961 feed grain program in order to be eligible for price support on the normal production of this year's corn and grain sorghum acreage, as well as for support on any of their other 1961 feed crops--barley, oats and rye.

Acreage diverted under the feed grain program must be put to an approved conservation use, and it must represent an additional amount over the farm's average devoted to a

conservation use in 1959 and 1960. Where applications are made in advance and program funds are still available, farmers may receive ACP cost-share assistance in installing the conservation-use practice on the land.

Corn and grain sorghum producers who are interested in taking part in the feed grain program are urged to get in touch with the County ASC office right away.

The deadline for accepting Acreage-History Reports in the county office has been set for May 12, 1961. May 22, 1961 is the deadline for farmers to state their intention to participate and make their application for payment.

To date approximately 85 farmers have filed acreage history reports. Mr. Mullins urges all farmers that might be interested in the Feed Grain Program to contact the county ASC office. Mr. Mullins also stated that half of the payment may be issued in advance to the farmers.

Mr. Mullins said that due to the rush of setting the program up some of the necessary forms have not as yet been received, but the office does have an adequate supply of forms on which farmers may sign their intention to participate. Farmers who wish to actually retire land from production of corn may come to the office from now through May 22, and file their application for payment.

Too many landowners wait until the slack season rolls around before they start to think about forestry work, and then waste valuable time trying to set up a work plan, he said.

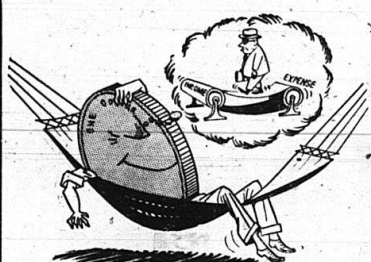

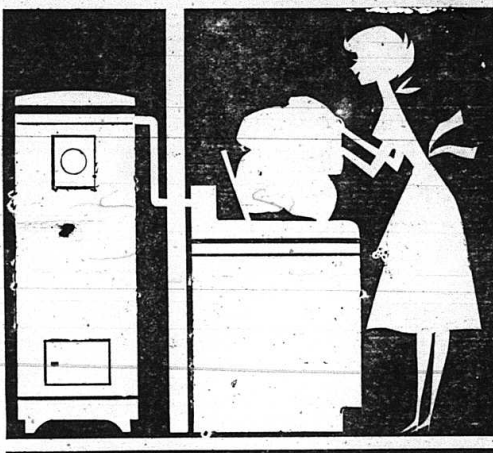

### COUNTY ROAD WORK APPROVED BY STATE

The State Department of Highways approved a \$33,042.69 rural, highway and repair and construction program for Rockcastle County during 1961 and presented it to the Rockcastle Fiscal Court at its meeting Tuesday.

Some 56 projects are listed in the program. The projects touch almost every section of the county.

Because of the length of development of projects in including such things as locations, number of miles, type of surface, the Signal will be unable to print them this week because of a lack of space. We will, however, list them in a future issue of the Signal.

In further action on the meeting, the Court took under study and advisement a request by Dr. Walker Owens, Rockcastle County Health Officer, to increase the county's allocation used to run the Rockcastle Health Department.

At the present time, the county allocates \$800 to the Health Department. Doctor Owens requested this be increased to \$1,400. The remainder of the money used by the department comes from the state.

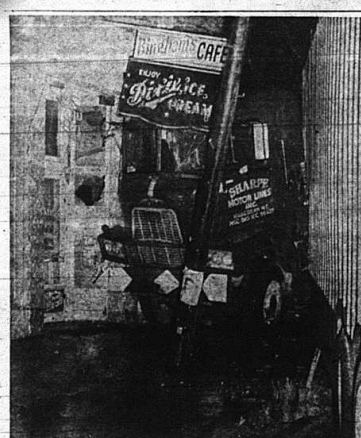

## SAYS RATS EATING COMMODITIES

County Judge Candidate Jimmie Bales took a verbal swing in two phases of the county commodity program at a meeting of the Rockcastle Fiscal Court Tuesday—in a question and answer bout with Thomas A. Lewis, state district director of the commodity program.

Bales first brought up creamery butter, now on some counties commodity list but not Rockcastle's; and secondly, took sharp issue with the type of building used to store dry commodities.

The rats eat more commodities in that building than the people of Rockcastle County, Bales declared, and when Lewis reported he hadn't found that to be the case through inspection by himself and state inspectors, Bales said farmers they'd "better have their glasses changed."

In the case of creamery butter, Lewis told the court and several spectators that creamery butter is allocated to counties that can provide storage space, and about 22 or 33 are now receiving butter.

He explained at this time he would hesitate to tell how many counties could have a butter even if there were ample storage space. He noted that butter is now available and on hand through June distribution, possibly through July and August, but after that time there might not be sufficient butter to distribute.

Lewis said it depended on whether the farmer would sell his butter under the price support program of the federal government. Lewis decided not to sell, then there could be no butter, he declared.

Lewis talked generally about the state and federal government program, explaining its (Continued on page 4)

April 20, 1961  
Dear Mr. Albright,

Congratulations on your appointment. I feel certain that the committee for Rockcastle County could not have selected anyone who would take the responsibility as seriously as you or who would work harder than you to make the Centennial in the county successful through complete and accurate research.

As I discovered some time ago almost all historical information concerning Rockcastle County is more than scarce, it is in a sense almost non-existent. Through my part-time work in the archives department here at the University, I have, you might say, the inside story through my access to the archives department term paper last year for a class in Kentucky History and wrote a brief history of Rockcastle County up to the turn of the twentieth century. I will give you all the information which I used in that paper in connection with the Civil War. Also, since writing that paper I have come across some additional information and have become acquainted with some of the source materials where I believe that I can secure some more information.

You know that I will be more than happy to assist you by turning over to you this material. However, I cannot have this material to you by Monday, April 24, which is the time which I interpreted your letter as saying that you needed it. This delay is necessitated by the facts that my time is quite limited due to having a term paper to do research for in addition to my work in the library which takes fifteen to twenty hours per week. Also, a large part of the information which I already have is at home and I would have to get it together for you.

You will be home on the 29th of April and I will bring what I have to you including the full, and as nearly accurate as I can get, story of the murder of my great-grandfather, William B. Laswell, at his home on the old Mt. Vernon Road in the spring of 1865.

You may rest assured that I will do all that I can to help you. I hope that through something like this Centennial Celebration some public spirit will be aroused in the citizens of Rockcastle County. We missed an excellent opportunity 1 1/2 years to celebrate the 150th year of the county of Rockcastle. I hope that this sorry state of affairs is not repeated ever again.

administration and the difficulties encountered. It was only after his talk that the questions on local matters arose.  
First to question him was Charles C. Carter, county judge candidate.

Carter told Lewis one of his opponents has advertised that if elected he would increase the flow of commodities. Carter wanted to know if that would be possible.  
Lewis: "I don't know how he could increase the commodities. He'd have to get Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman to change his thinking, and the laws. At present, there are only 10 food items available."

Bales had a question on this. Bales: "Mr. Lewis, you say the flow of commodities can't be increased. Wouldn't adding a freezer and getting butter an increase?"  
Lewis: "Butter is the only thing."

Carter told Lewis an opponent was promising to get a freezer unit and it had been reported the opponent had been to Washington to see about it. Carter wondered if it wasn't the duty of the Fiscal Court to see about, and OK, a freezer, rather than a candidate.  
Mr. Lewis replied that he speak with the county, not individuals, under the law. He said that if someone donated a freezer, fine, that some counties couldn't afford one. But he was sure that if someone donated a freezer and the court accepted it, and it met state specifications, and it was included, then the state would include butter under the commodity program.

Bales then remarked he was dealing with the Army for a freezer and the Rockcastle Fiscal Court, and declared: "We'll get a freezer, if we have to get it from the Boy Scouts." On the matter of the storage of dry commodities, Bales questioned Lewis on the type of building required for commodity storage.

Lewis replied that it should have all the usual features, including safety from water, rats, and be clear.  
Bales: "Have you looked at the building being used here?"  
Lewis said he had seen the building and that it was inspected by state inspectors.  
Bales: "Why do the rats eat more of the commodities than the people?"  
Lewis replied that he and the inspectors had not found that to be the case.  
Bales: "Then you'd better have your glasses changed! By the way, if there is loss by

spillage and damage, then who pays for the loss?  
Lewis replied that it would be his duty to look into the matter if that were the case, and if he (Lewis) found it to be the fault of the county, then the county would have to pay the loss. Lewis noted that he would visit the storage place before he left town.

The matter was closed when County Judge Money Ed Cummins told the court and Mr. Lewis that he had been told by the state that Rockcastle's storage building was one of the best warehouses for commodities in this part of the state, and that repairs have been made many times. He would be glad for an inspection at any time.

Judge Cummins said the court has indicated it does not have sufficient funds for the storage of butter, but that he'd like to have butter on the list if the county could get storage.

Lewis reported in closing that he had dealt with the court by law, and that he tried to administer the commodity program with no political motives.

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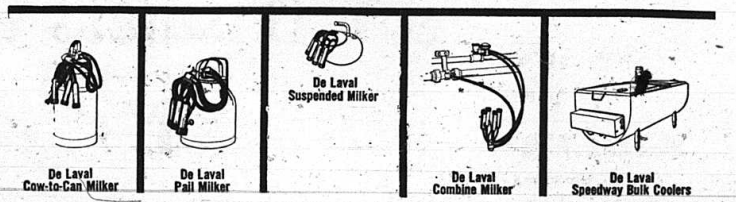
