Many County Road Projects Listed By State Department

A total of \$33,042 has been allocated by the State Department of Highways for improvements and construction on rural Rockcastle roads.

Because of lack of space the Signal will be unable to report the definite section of the road to be improved or constructed. The following is the name of the road, the number of miles to be worked, and whether the work is to be bituminous surface or traffic bond (gravel). State Enumerates Service To County

Payments to all public assistance recipients in Kentucky totaled \$15,377,664 for the first three months of 1961, Commissioner of Economic Security E. L. Powell announced this week.

The payments are nearly \$1.7 million more than was paid out for the same three-month period in 1960. Powell said part of the increase is due to the fact that the number of eligible recipients has increased this year.

The major reason, however, he said, "is that the Kentucky Legislature appropriated more funds to the public assistance program this year—the largest increase it has ever recorded."

Monthly payments in all categories—aged, needy blind, dependent children and disabled—increased by an average of \$8.44 a month, Powell said.

In Rockcastle County, recipients received a total of \$119,497.76 for the three months, an increase of \$4,370 over 1960.

March payments to the aged recipients here averaged \$49.21; payments to the families of dependent children averaged \$81.11; payments to the needy blind averaged \$48.82; and payments to the permanently and totally disabled averaged \$51.69.

Powell said statewide payments made in March totaled \$5,125,957 this year.

Goals, Purposes Of Music Education In County Schools

By: Jack L. Adams

"All people do not agree in those things they would have a child learn. From the present mode of education we cannot determine with certainty to which men incline, whether to instruct a child in what will be useful to him in life, or what tends to virtue, or what is excellent; for all of these things have their separate defenders."

This statement could have been made recently by our school superintendent or any one of our principals, or it could have been made 10 years ago, or even 100 years ago. But it was spoken much longer ago than any of those dates. It was spoken by Aristotle some 300 years before the birth of Christ, and the same problem has existed ever since: What would

we have a child learn? Since Aristotle, and, more particularly, since Sputnik, on October 4, 1958 education has been a prime target in a year-long open season. What would we have a child learn? During his last months in office President Eisenhower's Commission of National Goals summarized their findings in **Goals for Americans**, which complied with his request to "develop a broad outline of coordinated national policies and programs." Recently, Life magazine undertook a similar project entitled, "The National Purpose." These are inventories which the President has pursued as a national leader, and which a national publisher has pursued out of his patriotic obligation to his readers.

At the local county level, you have a right to ask as a parent, taxpayer, and citizen, "Why music in our school?" As a teacher and a public servant the writer has an obligation to

you to attempt an answer. What would we in Rockcastle County have our children learn? Or we might say, How does the study of music help in the education of our children? The study of music is a never ending study, just as education itself is a never ending process. In the study of music as in any learning process, we grow continuously. We grow as long as we expect to grow and as long as we try to grow.

Many professional musicians have obtained their background in music from the program offered in their elementary and secondary music departments. However, it is not the aim of these music departments to make every member a professional musician. It is hoped that the background which they accumulate will be sufficient for them to have a professional career if desired. As however, this is not the sole aim of the school music program. It is also hoped that some

music students will choose music education for their career, for there will always be a need for dedicated, musically competent teachers of music.

It is further hoped, and since this reaches so many students, it is deeply hoped that beyond the professional music careers, just mentioned that every music student will become an educated listener as well as one who enjoys the best in musical performance. As a result, he will not only create a satisfying atmosphere of musical culture for himself, but will also stimulate a demand for the most excellent performance from his fellow students who have chosen music as their vocation. Standards are contagious. We might as well demand standards of excellence. Our culture depends not only on those who produce the best, but also on those who demand that the best be produced.

School groups are usually composed of either classes or

teams, but in a band or orchestra a student is a member of both at the same time. He must do his work individually yet still be a contributing member of the team or group. Just as one may be very much an individual, still he must be a productive and contributing member of his society if he is to be successful. His stature as an individual and his value as a member depend on continuous learning. Here, too, the art of learning and the art of living grow hand in hand. 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

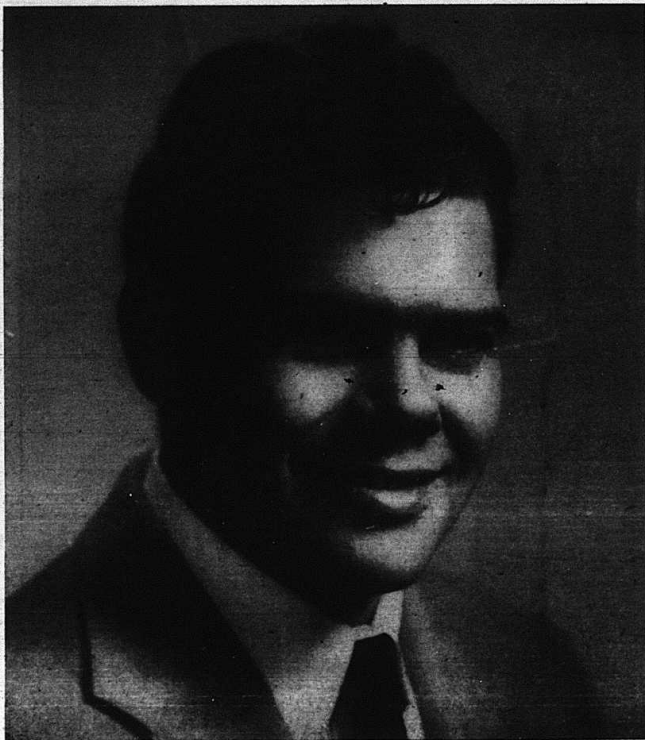

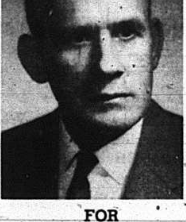
