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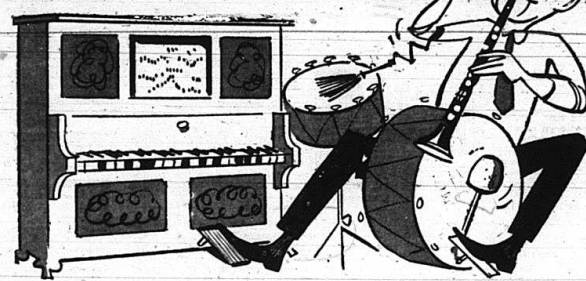

Candidates Nervous With Most Races Still In Doubt

It was a GREAT day for some of the candidates, and somewhat less than great for others as the tabulation of votes slowly rolled in from Tuesday's Republican primary. Most candidates were nervous with the leads changing back and forth from precinct to precinct. By the end of the day, the candidates leading in the morning could have lost their edge.

(An editorial on the election is on page 4 of this issue.)

In the top race, Thursday morning, it was a neck and neck race between Money Ed Cummins and D. B. Saylor for representative of the 17th Congressional District. At that time, Saylor had a slight 35-vote edge over Cummins, 799-764.

Charles C. Carter upset some predictions by holding to an 85-vote lead over Carl Williams. Williams picked up 99 more votes than Carter in Conway, William's precinct. Up to that time, it appeared Carter would "run away" with the nomination.

Tuesday morning, Carter had 741 votes, Williams 657. In third place was Jimmie Bales with 1,056 votes to 284 over Conrad Parrett for county clerk.

In the sheriff's race, Lovell appeared headed for victory. He held a lead of 442 votes over nearest rival Clifford Pittman. Votes in the race for county surveyor.

Pittman 290; Ballinger 287 and Baker 283. It's a three-way race for jailer, with Sam Hoskins now in the lead over his nearest rival Shirley Soward by 32 votes. Hoskins has 286, Soward 284, and Goldie Barnett 222.

Fred Murrell, candidate for coroner, apparently was on the way to victory with 734 votes. His nearest rivals, Walter Morris has 285, and Matt Jones 289.

Homar Hale looks like a winner in the race for tax commissioner. He has 878 votes, and T. J. Parsons has 513.

Joe VanWinkle has 528 votes, and Paul Griffin 485 in the race for county surveyor. In the First District, G. Hob Griffin leads in his race for magistrate, and Elmer Decker is leading in the race for constable.

Because of the time and details needed for the many candidates, the Signal cannot publish a more complete return. The ballot, by precincts, will be printed next week, if it is complete. All votes so far are unofficial.

It was a beautiful day for an election, but the predictions of at least 90 percent of the voters going to the polls fell short. Unofficial tabulations showed 4346 voted out of a registered 4688.

Several things were standing out as the tabulations progressed:

- 1. It was a record number of candidates participating.
- 2. Older politicians were 4

Set Sewer Survey At Brodhead

An application for a grant for a preliminary survey on a sewer system for Brodhead is planned by the Brodhead City Council.

The Council voted at a recent meeting to ask the Housing and Home Finance agency of the federal government for about \$2,000 to make the survey. The request is similar to one Mt. Vernon City Council recently voted.

Like Mt. Vernon, the survey will be made by Crawford and Crawford, engineers of Renfro Valley.

Money for such preliminary surveys has been given to cities around the country. If the survey finds the sewer system at

Brodhead unfeasible, the money will be marked off by the government. If the survey proves the project feasible, and the sewer system is constructed the government will add the survey cost to the over-all cost of the sewer.

The survey will determine the amount of money needed to construct the sewer system, the feasibility of such a system, and general engineering.

Man Found Dead In Car Up-Side-Down In Creek

The body of a Johnetta man was found early Wednesday in an up-side-down auto in Roundstone Creek about four miles north of the Brush Creek Bridge.

Manuel J. Owens, 33, son of Mr. and Mrs. Tom Owens, of Johnetta, died of drowning after his auto apparently hit a culvert and overturned down an 8-foot embankment into Roundstone Creek about midnight Tuesday.

The accident occurred on a gravel road and on a straight stretch. According to State Trooper Willie Martin, the body was discovered about 8 a. m., by Jack Bowman who was passing on a tractor and saw the wheels through the underbrush.

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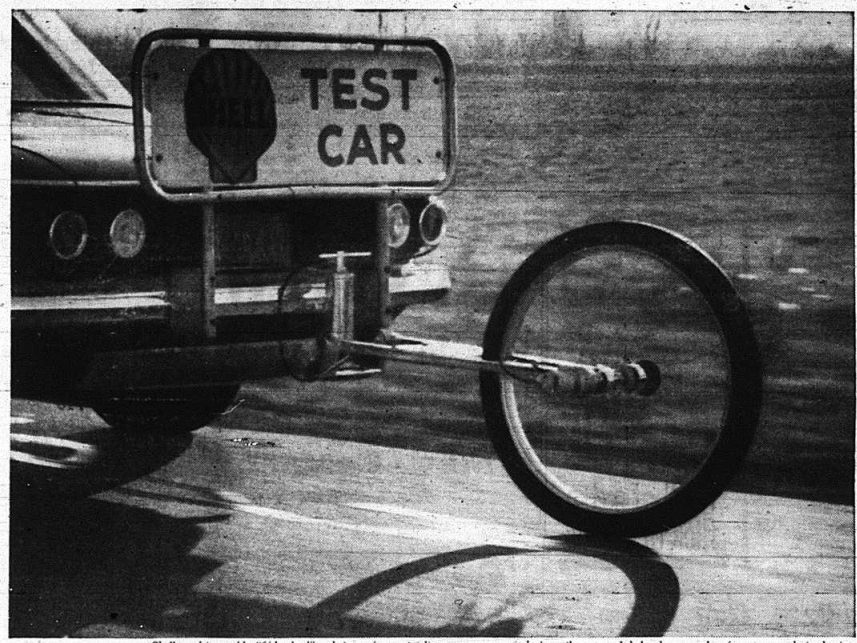

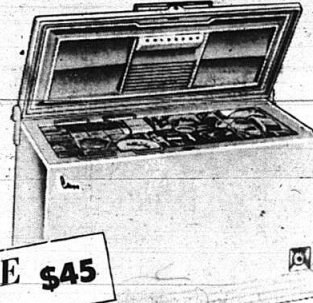
