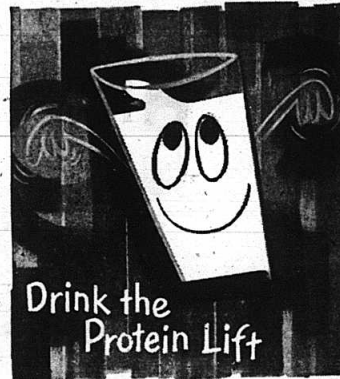

David Mullins Dies In Wreck

David Mullins, 47, of Climax, was killed early Saturday when his parked auto beside which he was standing, was hit by another car.

State Police reported Mullins had stopped on US 421 near the Blue Grass Ordnance Depot with his hood up and his lights on to make repairs. His car, officers reported, was parked partially in the southbound lane of traffic.

Police said a car driven by Donald Ray Gatliff, 25, of Mt. Vernon, hit Mullins car, knocked it into him, and then ran over him. The Gatliff car, police said, then skidded 97 feet before going off the road on the opposite side and hitting two trees.

Mullins, police reported, received multiple compound fractures of the lower left leg, several broken bones and broken ribs. The back of his head was torn off.

A passenger in Mullins' car, Willie Frank Cope, 24, Disputanta, was standing outside the vehicle and was knocked 27 feet.

Cope, Gatliff and a passenger in Gatliff's car, Willie Thomas Bullens, 27, of Roundstone, were admitted to the hospital at Richmond. Latest reports were that Cope is in fair condition. Bullens is recuperating in Berea College Hospital.

Mr. Mullins was born the son of Willie and Emma Smith Mullins. He attended Rockcastle County schools and served in the Army in Korea.

Besides his mother, he is survived by five brothers: Granville, Matt, Edward and Lloyd, all of Orlando, and Jack of Richmond Ind.; five sisters: Mrs. Katherine Gadd, Mrs. Virginia Owens, and Mrs. Jane Owens, all of Richmond, Ind.; Miss Evelyn Mullins, Orlando, and Mrs. Lillian Thomas, Richmond.

Funeral services were conducted Monday at Johnetta Cemetery with Bro. Bill Hamilton officiating. Spaulk Funeral Home was in charge of arrangements.

Mrs. Maggie Caudill Dies At Stanford

Dairying And Conservation

Conservation doesn't cost, it pays.

Conservation farming is a way of life.

One hears these sayings repeated time after time. What is behind them? Are they true? How does conservation pay?

A recent talk with a former resident of Rockcastle County points out some of the changes here. He said: "The bluegrass is green-up two weeks to a month ahead of our county. Now much of the county is green all year."

More acres of good pasture, more seeded, fertilized, limed, and maintained by continued fertilization, living and a overseeding to keep a balance of grass and legumes, is what Mr. Brock is seeing today. More acres of alfalfa and grass for hay, too.

When all this good grass and hay is marketed through livestock then the farmer readily sees that conservation really does pay. The more money that the farmer has is reflected in every business in Rockcastle County. Banks have greater deposits. Machine dealers sell more tractors, balers, hay crushers, and all kinds of farm equipment. Members have larger volume of sales. County tax assessments are higher which means better roads and better schools. Churches are repaired, improved, and new buildings constructed for more Sunday School rooms. All this starts on the farm with conservation farming.

When farmers of Rockcastle County have a new source of income from dairying of around a million dollars a year, they can really prove that conservation does pay. Within another year income from dairy products in this county will surpass the income from tobacco. The pasture, hay and grain pro-

duced by conservation farming is being marketed through cows.

As the conservation farmer pays off for new farm improvements, new machines, better roads, and schools, he has a higher standard of living.

Conservation farming then becomes a way of life through dairying.

The newly elected officers will attend a week leadership training camp at Hardinsburg June 28 through 30.

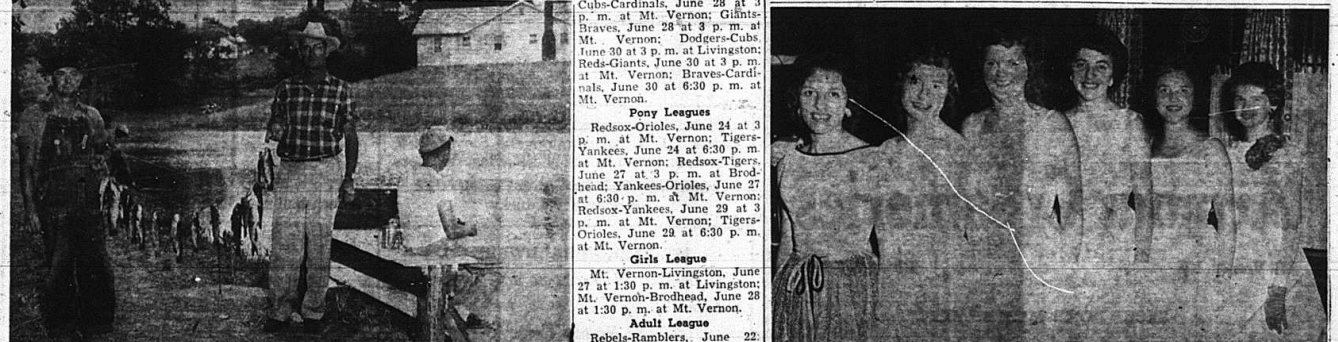
