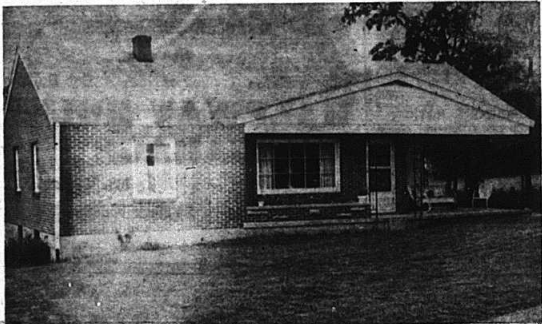

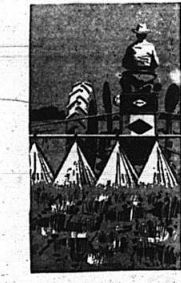

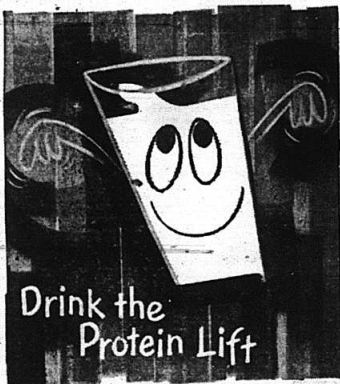

Money Order Rates To Go Up

The new money order rates are as follows: one cent to \$10 will be 20 cents; \$10.01 to \$50 will be 30 cents; and \$50.01 to \$100 will be 35 cents.

Mr. Houston estimated the farm's gross income today at \$25,000, as compared to \$5,000 about 10 years ago.

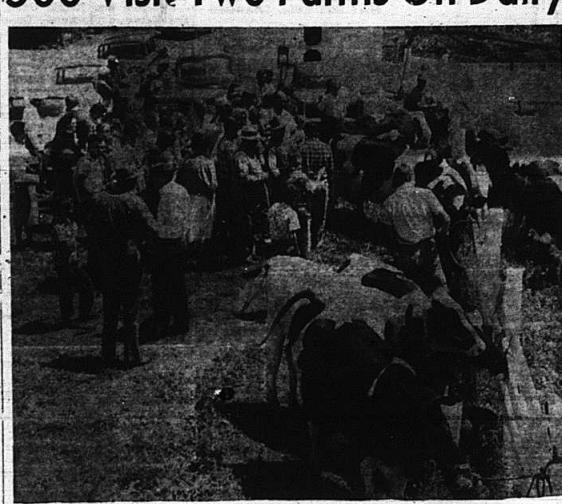

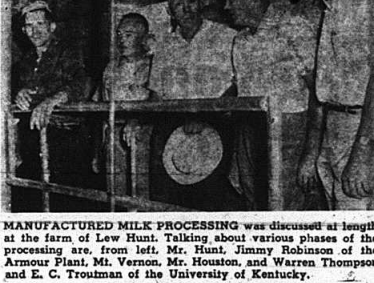
Forage Use In Dairying Told

By: H. Lee Durham
County Agent

Forage - consuming livestock require an average of five tons of hay equivalent per 1,000 pound unit is required for maximum efficiency then, at the present time, we need 50,000 tons of hay to feed them.

New, let's take a look at the current forage production: We now have approximately 52,487 acres of pasture producing 6 tons per acre which totals 31,492 tons. We have approximately 1,150 acres of Alfalfa producing 21 tons per acre which totals 24,100 tons. We have 2,100 acres of Clover grass producing 1.3 tons per acre or a total of 2,730 tons. We also have 6,500 acres of lespedeza producing 1.2 tons per acre or 7,800 tons.

STRIP MINE OPERATORS MAY GET RULE CHANGES

A public hearing has been held in Frankfort by the Strip Mine and Reclamation Commission on a proposed new strip mine reclamation regulation and a minor change in an existing regulation.

There has been some question what is meant by "grading where practical," and the proposed change in this regulation is to clarify this point.

Also presented to the group was a new proposed regulation covering "standards for evaluating vegetative cover." This is to make clear to operators the kind of vegetative cover suitable for planting and the percentage of survival necessary for acceptance by the Reclamation Commission.

Operators must post bonds which are held until reclamation of strip-mined land is completed and inspected by the commission.

A number of operators objected to both regulations. It was pointed out by John Crowl, Madisonville, executive director of the Kentucky Reclamation Association, that "it has been found that the more difficult it is to grade, the more difficult it is to grow trees. The machines make the soil too compact." Deputy Commissioner Mar-

shall Qualls, chairman of the meeting, pointed out to Crowl that grading is necessary according to the law, which was passed to make certain that proper reclamation work was done on strip-mined land.

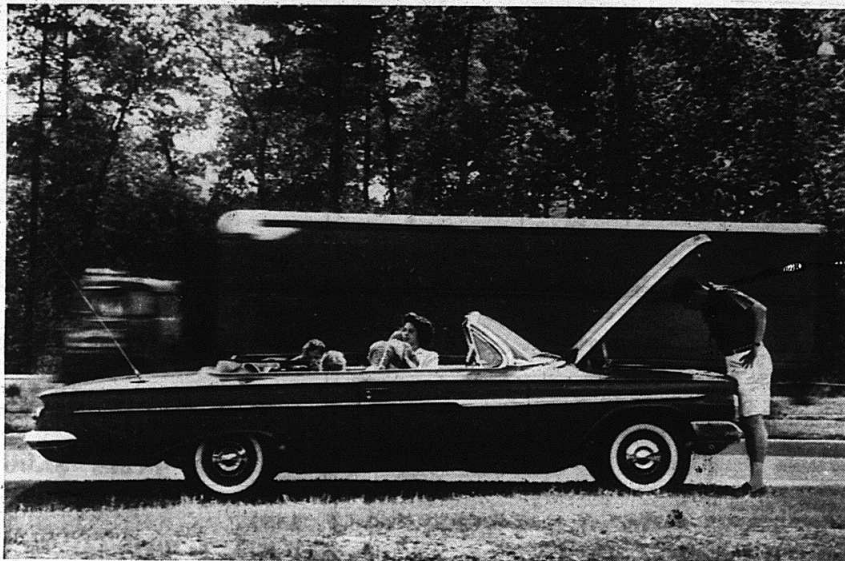

tons per acre or a total of 7,800 tons. The total tons of forage produced at the present time is 44,432 tons.

What is possible, if recommendations are followed (soil tests, fertilizing, seeding, etc.) keeping the same acreage of the same forage crops? \$2,487 acres of pasture at two tons per acre equals 104,974 tons.

1,150 acres of Alfalfa hay at 2.9 tons per acre equals 3,335 tons. 2,100 acres of clover grass hay at 2.0 tons per acre equals 4,200 tons. 5,500 acres of Lespedeza at 1.8 tons per acre equals 11,700. The total tons potential then if proper recom-

mendations are followed for hay and pasture would be 124,008 tons. This would provide feed for 24,800 cattle units (1,000 pound units).

Yes, dairying is increasing in importance in Rockcastle Co. It is being estimated that dairying, second in income only to tobacco at the present time, will surpass tobacco in income brought into the county within the next few years.

Last year, the 13,021 acres of tobacco in Rockcastle County sold for a total of 1,417,805.69. If dairying income goes beyond the above figure for tobacco, it will certainly mean more and more to the economy of Rockcastle County.
