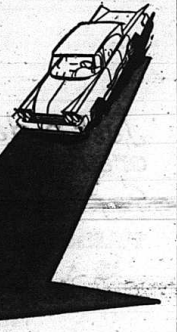

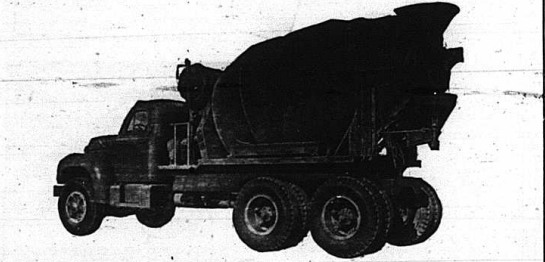

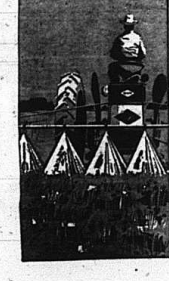

### TREE FARMING REBUILDS FOREST

Modern logging and tree farming methods make careful and effective provisions for the re-estabishment of a forest, according to S. Ronald Singer, service forester. State provides for the regeneration of trees, and we have learned to work with her in continuing our wood supply. But there are certain things which job by herself — where land clearing, repeated burning, or some other cause has destroyed a natural re-estabishment of money-making trees, we must step in and plant the necessary trees, Mr. Singer reported. A natural re-estabishment of timber growth ahead of our need is to be put idle acres to work growing trees. This is being done at a rate estimated of a few years ago, he declared. There are several reasons for this tremendous increase in tree planting and re-estabishment. We learned that tree growing is profitable, and that low cost and free seedlings are available from the Kentucky Division of Forestry nurseries at Dawson Springs and Morgantown, also. It has been learned that trees are easy to grow, because once they are planted all the farmer has to do is to keep fire and animals out and the trees will grow. Now is the time to plan your tree planting for next spring. Your Service Forester will be happy to help you work out the best type of trees for you and your farm, Mr. Singer concluded.

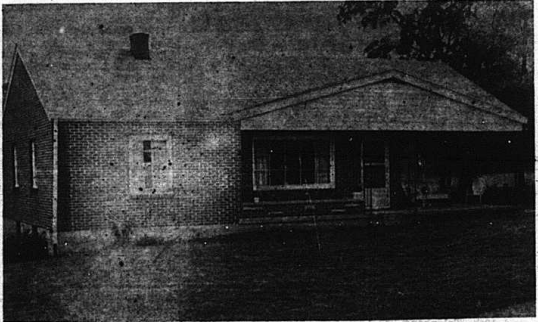

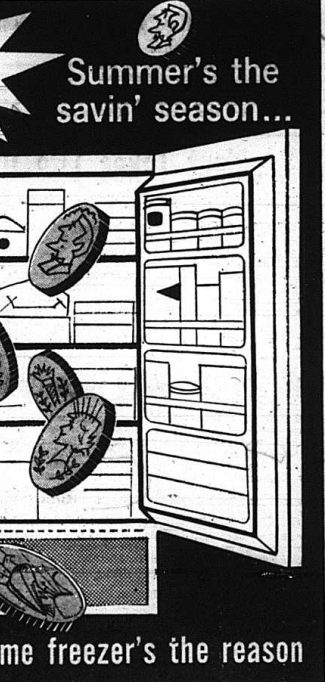

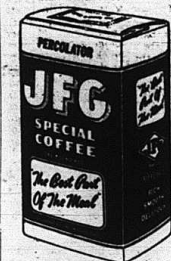

## Starter Fertilizer Helps Corn Make Fast, Healthy Growth

**STARTER** fertilizer will get the corn crop off to a vigorous, healthy start if it is placed in a band one to two inches to the side and slightly below seed level, reports the Midwest division of the National Plant Food Institute in citing statements by agricultural college agronomists.

Dr. A. J. Ohlrogge, Purdue University agronomist, says this band fertilizer placement method puts the plant food where it will be in the path of the young corn roots. The nutrients in this starter fertilizer speed growth from germination to the knee-high stage and pave the way for high profit yields at harvest time.

Dr. Henry Foth, Michigan State University soil scientist, points out the growth of corn roots is mostly outward and down until plants are about six weeks old. After that, the roots begin to go down more than out.



Ohlrogge says the early growth period is perhaps the most important in the corn plant's life cycle. During the seedling stage there is a partial development of all the leaves, root system, auxiliary buds, nodes, internodes and primordial tassels the corn plant will ever have.

Dr. John Pesek, Iowa State University agronomist, says that starter fertilizers containing nitrogen, phosphate and potash usually need to be placed near the seed row at planting time. Depending on soil type and the soil type involved, the ratio of nitrogen-

phosphate-to-potash should be 1-4-0, 1-4-4 or 1-4-2.

Starter fertilizer isn't the entire story, the National Plant Food Institute reports. The corn crop has to be fed all season long. Hence the soil must have sufficient nitrogen, phosphate and potash to do this crop-nourishing job. The needed nutrients can be supplied in the form of fertilizer broadcast and plowed down before planting time. Extra nitrogen may be needed can be side-dressed up until the last cultivation of corn.
