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## WOOL PAYMENT

(Continued from page 1)

prices up to the previously announced incentive level of 62 cents per pound under the nation's wool program. It means that the producer will receive an incentive payment of \$47.60 for every \$100 received from the sale of shorn wool during the wool marketing year ending March 31, 1961.

The payment rate on sales of lambs that have been shorn to compensate for the wool on them will be 80 cents per hundredweight of live animals sold; this payment has been assigned to discourage unusual shearing of lambs before marketing.

No payment will be made on mohair sold during the 1960 marketing year since the average mohair price of 87 cents per pound received by producers was above the mohair support price of 70 cents per pound.

According to the National County ASCS Offices which will be making payments soon after July 1, Applicants for payment had to be filed by April 30 (May 1 this year because April 30 was a Sunday). The payments will be made on shorn wool and unshorn lambs marketed from April 1, 1960, through March 31, 1961.

The incentive level for shorn wool for current 1961 marketing year has also been announced at 62 cents per pound, the same as for each of the preceding years of the program. Program regulations continue the same as for earlier years.

## Shellie Mullins Tells Feed-Grain Program

A discussion of rules and regulations in the 1961 Feed Grain program was discussed this week in a letter from Shellie Mullins, chairman, Rockcastle County ASC committee.

Below is Mr. Mullins' letter:

Dear Cooperator,

This letter is a reminder to all corn and grain sorghum growers who signed up to take part in the 1961 Feed Grain Program. The acreage which you agreed to divert from the production of corn or grain sorghum this year must be devoted to an approved conservation use and weeds must be controlled as agreed between you and you and the County Committee when you signed your contract. The diverted acres must not be grazed after June 1, 1961, and a crop of any description must not be harvested from the diverted acres during 1961.

The sign up under the Feed Grain Program was a great success, showing in Secretary Freeman's words, "Participation in excess of our most optimistic expectations." But the program itself will be counted a success only if the growers who filed applications follow through in carrying out their intentions.

Failure to live up to all the terms of the Feed Grain Program could mean a reduction in the total payment to be earned under the program, or it might mean that the advance payment would have to be refunded either in whole or in part.

Remember, if you do not comply with the provisions of the program, none of the 1961 crop

feed grains grown on the farm, corn, grain sorghum, oats, barley, or rye... would be eligible for price support.

To receive maximum payment of your farm acreage must show compliance with the "permitted acreage" (the farm base for corn and grain sorghum minus the number of acres you agreed to divert from production of the crops in 1961), and conservation being carried out on the diverted acres.

Compliance with the program also requires that in addition to the diverted acres you must maintain acres of conserving crops equal to the average of conserving crops grown on your farm for 1959 and 1960.

If you have any question about the Feed Grain Program, please get in touch with us. We are anxious for all growers who filled intentions to participate to obtain the full benefits of the Program.

We will be ready to make final payments for diverted acres immediately after Sept. 1. May it truly yours, Shellie Mullins
