Residents Must Know Self-Employment Tax

Lack of understanding of the difference between income tax and self-employment tax may be costing many residents of this area present or future social security monthly benefits for themselves and their families, according to R. A. Tweedy, district manager of the Lexington social security office.

"In many cases no income tax payment is necessary due to low income; exemptions for age or children; or medical and other deductions. It is important to remember, however, that if a self-employed person has a net income from his trade or business of \$400 or more in a taxable year he is required by the social security law to file a tax return and pay the self-employment tax. This is true even though he may not owe any income tax.

Net earnings for self-employment purposes are determined by taking the total gross income derived from a trade or business in a taxable year less the actual allowable deductible operating expenses. Misunderstanding of this rule may make the difference between being insured for social security bene-

fits and being unable to qualify for payments to himself and dependents as a result of disability, old-age or to his qualified surviving relatives upon his death at any age," Tweedy said.

If you have any question as to your liability in paying self-employment social security taxes contact your nearest social security district office. The Lexington office is located at 950 Winchester Road.

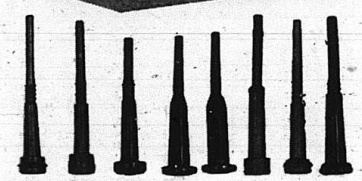

ing the fall months. Requests will be taken at any time after July, but these will be considered late or will have to be held for approval when funds are available. Farmers interested should make their requests during July. Mr. Mullins also stated that farmers interested in setting trees this fall should make requests as early as possible so orders can be processed in time for fall setting. Establishing a stand of timber and improving a stand of timber is a practice well suited for Rockcastle County.

"Interest is growing in timber conservation each year," Mr. Mullins said. "Expense is no stumbling block in connection with this practice as a practice can be obtained by purchase order. When the trees are set the government pays the farmer for setting the trees. Interested persons should contact the local ASC office soon and make requests for practice to be carried out or started this fall."

crew works throughout the year repairing and maintaining roads in the county.

State funds totaling \$13,352.08 combined with other local and federal money to operate the County Health Department.

Field service was inaugurated in Rockcastle County by the Division of Soil and Water Resources in 1960. This provides a representative of the Division to help local soil conservation districts to form and initiate a program, obtain loans to buy heavy equipment and education, and on soil practices.

In 1960, Rockcastle received \$900 in State Library Extension services; \$830 for Bookmobile books; \$2,637 for books for the regional library; and 2,438 for regional services.

According to Gov. Bert Combs, apart from direct local expenditures, Rockcastle County benefits from the services of each agency of State government.

"There's no yardstick for dividing the activities of most departments into 120 hunks to show to what extent citizens in a particular county are served," the governor said. "But it's obvious that all Kentuckians benefit from State funds which operate the Courts, Legislature, the University, five state colleges, the 14 vocational training schools, the schools for the blind and deaf, the State's mental hospitals, six tuberculosis hospitals and the Kentucky Training Home."

All counties, the governor pointed out, benefit from the statewide services of the State Health Department, the Commission for Handicapped Child-

Government Broadens Barley Support Program

The U. S. Department of Agriculture today broadened the price support eligibility for 1961-crop barley to include grade No. 5 barley or No. 5 garlicky

barley. This action will provide greater price protection to producers for this year's barley crop, which in some areas is of generally lower quality because of adverse weather conditions.

To determine the loan rate for specific lots, barley grading No. 5 will be discounted 15 cents per bushel below the basis support price for grade No. 2 or better, in addition to other applicable discounts.

Prior to this change, price support on this year's crop had been limited to barley grading No. 4 or No. 4 garlicky. Minimum test weight permitted under grade standards for No. 5 barley is 36 pounds per bushel. Maximum amount of this barley supported is 35 percent for grade No. 4 and 75 percent for grade No. 5.

Similar action has been taken previously to extend barley support eligibility to Grade No. 5 on 1957 through production. In other action the Department added Castro, Illinois a terminal market for storage of 1961 Barley, with the price

support rate of \$1.16 per bushel.

Starter Fertilizer Helps Corn Make Fast, Healthy Growth

STARTER fertilizer will get the corn off to a vigorous, healthy start if it is placed in a band one to two inches to the side and slightly below seed level, reports the Midwest division of the National Plant Food Institute, in citing statements by agricultural college agronomists.

Dr. A. J. Ohlrogge, Purdue University agronomist, says this band fertilizer placement method puts the plant food where it will be in the path of the young corn roots. The nutrients in this starter fertilizer speed growth from germination to the knee-high stage and pave the way for high profit yields at harvest time.

Dr. Henry Foth, Michigan State University soil scientist, points out the growth of corn roots is mostly outward and down until plants are about six weeks old. After that the roots begin to go down more than out.

Ohlrogge says the early growth period is perhaps the most important in the corn plant's life cycle. During the seedling stage there is a partial development of all the leaves, root system, auxiliary buds, nodes, internodes and primordial tassels the corn plant will ever have.

Dr. John Pesek, Iowa State University agronomist, says that starter fertilizers containing nitrogen, phosphate and potash usually need to be placed near the seed row at planting time. Depending on soil tests and the soil type involved, the ratio of nitro-

to-phosphate-to-potash should be 1-4-0, 1-4-4 or 1-4-2. Starter fertilizer isn't the entire story, the National Plant Food Institute reports. The corn crop has to be fed all season long. Hence the soil

must have sufficient nitrogen, phosphate and potash to do this crop-nourishing job. The needed nutrients can be supplied in the form of fertilizer broadcast and plowed down before planting time. Extra nitrogen, where needed can be side-dressed up until the last cultivation of corn.
