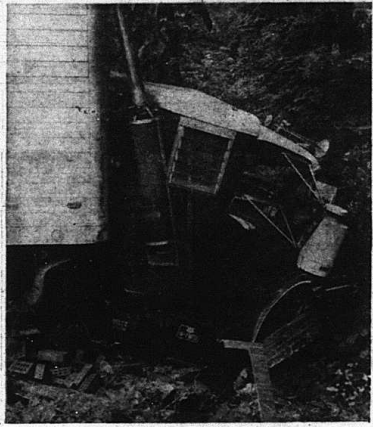

County School Budget Set At \$85,000



BEREA RUBBER COMPANY is 10 years old and is planning a celebration to commemorate the event. On July 29 there will be guided tours and displays that will be shown to the public. The Berea company is one of the largest O-ring manufacturing plants in the world. Employees living in Rockcastle County earned a total of \$221,000 last year.

A total of \$850,000 has been appropriated to run the Rockcastle County School District for the 1961-62 school year, according to a report by Mrs. Neutral Miracle, superintendent.

"The budget" provides for a term of nine and one-fourth months for all elementary schools and high schools.

Largest single item in the school budget is \$560,000 to pay the salaries of teachers and instructors. This is usually the largest item in the school budget.

Broken down the money will be spent as follows: Administration, \$25,000; instruction, \$560,000; attendance and health services, \$8,000; pupil transportation services, \$75,000; operation of school plant, \$36,000; maintenance of school plant, \$22,000; fixed charges, \$12,000, and community services, \$2,000, for total current expenditures of \$740,000.

Other items of expenditure include capital outlay, \$34,000; debt service, \$86,000, and total expenditures other than current, \$110,000. The total budget appropriate is \$850,000.

Estimated receipts from sources of district taxation were also reported by Mrs. Miracle. The unexpended cash balance in the general fund July 1 totaled \$3,000. The tax levy on property evaluation will produce \$23,475.44. Total assessed valuation of the general fund July 1 is \$3,790 and based on levy made, will produce \$66,850.

The total assessed valuation of all bank shares in the district is \$58,000. (Continued on page 4)

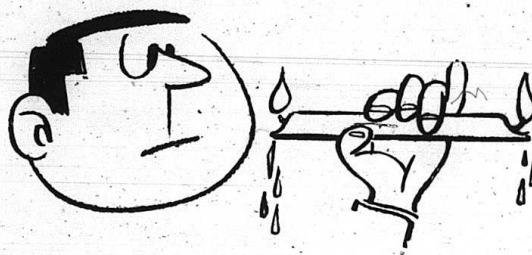
