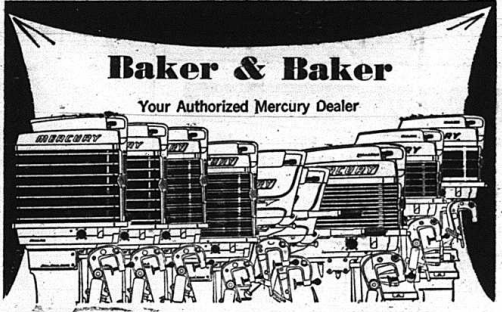

Interstate 75 County Route Still Uncertain

The route of Interstate 75 through Rockcastle County still remains in the doubtful column, according to a letter to the Signal from Henry Ward, commissioner of highways.

Mr. Ward reported the project, which is in the planning stages now, is in the distant future, so it is highly possible that subsequent information could be changed from time to time.

The tentative plans call for a diamond-type interchange at US 150. There are no plans for widening US 150, but this situation could also change, Mr. Ward wrote.

Best information has it that the interchange will be in the general area of Mareburg.

Mr. Ward wrote the State's entire interstate system is scheduled to be underway by 1969, and completed by 1971.

Mr. Ward noted when the preliminary stages are finished, the department will be able to establish the route more clearly. He estimated this would take from four to six months.

Civil War Shell - Used For Doorstop By Family

It's nice to have Civil War mementos lying around the house, but sometimes they can be "used."

So it was recently with John Noe, of Louisville, and formerly of Mt. Vernon.

Mr. Noe read a Courier-Journal story of how a shell, similar to one he owned, had been identified at Fort Knox as a United States Parrott shell used by both the North and South during the Civil War.

The calm Jefferson County police and the old shell he had been using as a doorstop in his home for 25 or 30 years, was turned over to Fort Knox identification authorities.

Sure enough, it had a pound of gunpowder in it. Various children over the years had played with the shell from time to time.

All is not quite-over as far as Mr. Noe and his shells are concerned.

He remembered having another shell on his farm near Mt. Vernon. A search a few days ago revealed the shell, but it had no powder.

Mr. Noe found both shells after a heavy rain on the farm many years ago. In all probability, the shell belonged to Union forces. On two or three occasions in 1861 and 1862, Union forces stopped west of Mt. Vernon on the way to and from Camp Wildcat.

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
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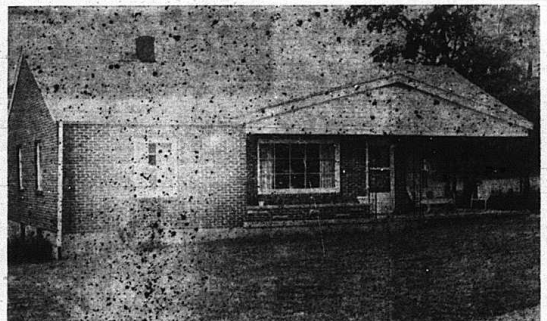

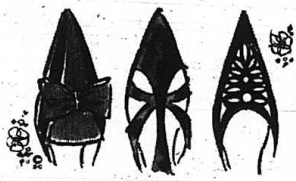
