## First Mt. Vernon Annexation Now Assured

The first property annexation by the City of Mt. Vernon is well on the way to realization.

The Mt. Vernon City Council voted unanimously at a meeting Thursday night to accept a petition by 12 residents in the hill area at the rear of Mt. Vernon Grade and High School to be annexed to the city.

Since the 12 residents constitute a 100 percent sign-up of those who wish to be annexed to the city, and since the city is willing, about all that remains is a legal advertisement in the Signal.

The Council did put an "ir" in its annexation motion. It will accept the new area, if residents bear the costs of an official survey of the area; costs of advertising; and costs that might arise out of lawsuits or other court actions, should the annexation be questioned.

Since all the residents have signed the petition, all that appears to remain are the legal steps to annexation.

By a council the annexation would add 36 residents to the city's 1,106 population making a total of 1,142. The number of acres involved in the annexation is to be determined.

As far as can be ascertained, this will be the first annexation by the city in its history. At least there are no records at City Hall showing a completed annexation. The only other annexations of any kind were re-arrangements of the city limits.

### SEWER SYSTEM

In another action the council approved a contract with the Community Facilities Administration of the federal government for a \$2,100 grant to be used for a preliminary survey for the city's proposed sewer system estimated to cost about \$355,000.

Work on the preliminary survey is now underway.

### TAX RATE

At its meeting, the Council set the city tax rate at 75 cents per \$100 of property valuation, and 20 cents per \$100 of property valuation for the city's special tax which includes payment for the city's new fire truck.

There is no increase in the tax rate. It remains the same as in previous years.

### FIRE CALLS

Dr. Jack Henderson was at the meeting to ask the Council to set up a program, or method, whereby residents immediately outside the city limits will be allowed fire truck protection by paying for it in advance. The Council said it would look into the matter and ask Doctor Henderson to suggest ways to handle the program.

### AUDIT

The Council accepted the city audit and set its publication in a future issue of the Signal.

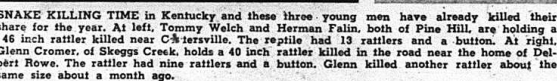

## County Listed In Area Development Program

What will it mean to Rockcastle County to be included in the Department of Agriculture's Rural Areas Development program?

Senators Thurston Murton and John Sherman Cooper announced this week Rockcastle has been added to the list of 27 Kentucky counties that qualify for federal aid under the program now in the operational stage.

Exactly what it will mean to Rockcastle remains, but generally, the program is designed for low-income counties to receive funds for developing industry and establishing needed public facilities.

The Area Redevelopment Act covers 463 rural counties in 36 states. The 27 Kentucky counties are: Adair, Allen, Barren, Butler, Clinton, Cumberland, Edmonson, Estill, Crayson, Green, Hart, Jackson, Lawrence, Lee, Lewis, Livingston, Logan, Madison, Metcalfe, McCreary, Monroe, Morgan, Owen, Powell, Rockcastle, Simpson, Warren and Wolfe.

As outlined by Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman, the act represents a full scale campaign to end rural poverty by stimulating economic expansion in rural counties.

He listed the following tools to be used by the department:

Financial assistance to 460 rural counties designated eligible for loans and grants under the Area Redevelopment Act.

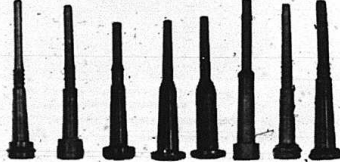

Board, representing 12 USDA agencies, including the Kentucky ASOS' State and County ASOS' offices, to coordinate all Departmental resources which will be used in Rural Area Development program.

Appointment of special Rural Areas Development staffs in each USDA agency assigned to give top priority support to the RAD program.

Secretary Freeman noted that the announcement of the counties which are eligible for grants and loans under the ARA program clears the way for swift action in these areas.

USDA's Rural Areas Development Program seeks to eliminate low-income and underemployment in agriculture by bringing to bear all the resources of the Department plus the ingenuity and drive of economic leaders in the states. Secretary Freeman said.

"One of the tools that USDA is now putting to use in its program is loans and grants by the Commerce Department's Area Development Agency to the nation's lowest income counties for industrial and public facilities," he said.

The term "public facilities" remains vague. As far as the Signal can determine, it probably means parks and other like recreational facilities. Whether it means buildings such as recreational centers, courthouses, jails, libraries, and the like, remains to be stated by the department.

Secretary Freeman noted, the economic development program gets as goals better community facilities and services, development of recreational potentials, introduction of new industries, and expansion of the agricultural economy.

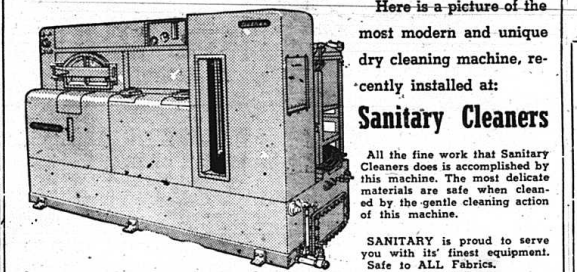
