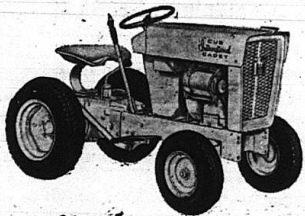

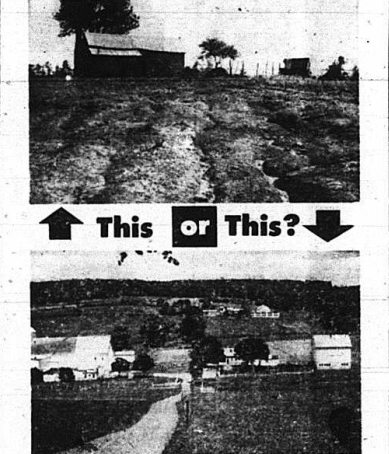

## State Allots \$715,152 To County Schools

### School Schedule

Only a few more days remain before school begins in Rockcastle County. Tuesday, the county teachers will assemble at Brodhead High School for a program and to discuss the school year. Wednesday, some teachers will assemble at Mt. Vernon, Brodhead, Livingston and Roundstone schools. Rural teachers will meet at the Board of Education Building. Wednesday, they'll enroll an expected 3,150 students. Thursday, summer vacation will be a thing of the past as most classes get underway.

### \$39,494 INCREASE GOES TO SALARIES

The state has tentatively allotted \$715,152 to the Rockcastle County schools for the 1961-62 school year, according to an announcement by Mrs. Neureul Mize, superintendent of county schools. The funds come from the State's Minimum Foundation Program of school aid. This year's allocation to Rockcastle County is \$39,494 over last year's \$675,657, or an increase of 5.8 percent. The allocation was part of a record \$101,500,000 reported going to state schools by Superintendent of Public Instruction Wendell P. Butler. The increase allowed Rockcastle schools will go to increase all certified teaching personnel salaries. The salary increase for each teacher will depend on degrees, hours and experience. Generally, those holding bachelor and master degrees, 24 hours beyond a master's degree, and experience will get about \$200 more per year. The increase will not affect those teachers who are not certified. Rockcastle fared better than some of its neighboring communities in the allocation of funds. For example, Berea Grade and High School lost \$2,183. London Grade and High School lost \$331. Superintendent Butler reported local school districts this year must put up \$47,432, 954 of their own tax revenues as their share of the State-local foundation program. Last year, local districts had to devote at least \$5,858,028 of local revenues to the foundation program. The amount of money being allotted tentatively is six percent greater than last year.

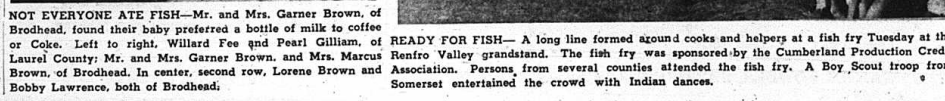

#### Dog Licenses To Be Checked

Karl W. Vick, Kentucky's new dog licensing administrator, is going on the road to see how well the State's laws covering licensing and control of dogs is being enforced.

Vick, of Auburn, Route 1, was recently named to the post by Commissioner of Agriculture Emerson Beauchamp. The new administrator said his immediate plans are to visit each of the state's 120 counties to confer with local fiscal court officers on stricter enforcement of the code.

A part of his duties Vick also administers the state live stock fund which reimburses owners of livestock for damage

caused by marauding dogs. Claims are filed with the Department of Agriculture for investigation and payment on all claims made once a year.

The fund was set up in 1954 as part of a general reorganization and strengthening of laws relating to dogs. Claims paid since 1954 until the end of 1959 totaled \$22,966.

Dogs six months or older must be licensed before July 1 of each year, Vick reminded dog owners. Licenses cost \$1.50 per year with the county dog warden retaining 25 cents and forwarding the remaining \$1.25 to the Department of Agriculture.

This department uses 75 cents for administration and payment of claims at the close of each fiscal year. The remaining 50 cents is refunded to the counties on a quarterly basis in accordance with the number of licenses sold.

burg, will continue as assistant administrator. Field agents are Billy Ray Wilson of Lebanon and Earl Adams of Murray.
