The Chamber also seemed to think there is a possibility of the Army Corps of Engineers, who will hold a public hearing at the Courthouse at 7:30 p. m. on Sept. 15, has already made up its mind as to the location of the dam, and in that case, about all anyone could do is to object to it and hear Corps officials, ask the Corps questions, and then think about a future approach to the matter.

The chamber appointed a committee to meet Corps officials Tuesday as well as to discuss the dam, and that might attend the meeting, and take them to dinner. Clarence Carter is chairman of the committee. On the committee are: John Lair, N. M. Smock and Raymond McClure.

In other action, the Chamber agreed to leave the Christmas promotion program up to the three county units to make as they saw fit. At one meeting the Chamber discussed a joint Christmas card for the three towns.

WANTS COUNTY OK ON NARROWS SITE

An Editorial

A dam on the Rockcastle River has been "in the wind" for several years. Since the beginning, one site has been proposed and discussed. This week a second site was introduced for consideration.

At 7:30 p. m. on September 19 at the Courthouse at Mt. Vernon the Army Corps of Engineers will hold public hearings on a Rockcastle reservoir at which time all important questions and problems will be open for discussion to anyone who wants to discuss them. Everyone would heartily approve of a dam at a good location on the Rockcastle River. We feel it would bolster the economy, add measurably to recreation facilities, and generally improve the entire area, especially Livingston.

There are however, a number of questions that should be answered before the communities go on record approving or disapproving a dam.

About 1957, there was considerable talk about a dam on the river, and a meeting was held at Renfro Valley by interested persons from Rockcastle and Jackson counties.

At that meeting, the dam was discussed for the dam was at the area of Livingston, about four or five miles northwest of Livingston on old US 25.

Obviously, the site most desirable to Livingston would be one which would furnish Livingston with ample water for industrial and recreational facilities. This site would

Brodhead's New Nursing Home To Open First Of Year

A home away from home—a place for rest and quiet—good food and care—all these things will be available to elderly people in Rockcastle when the new Sowder Nursing Home opens at Brodhead around the first of the year, or sooner.

Remodeling and new construction work at the Sowder Motel in West Brodhead is underway this week in order to change the motel to a nursing home and get it open as soon as possible.

According to John Sowder, of Brodhead, owner of the new nursing home, the investment in the home will be between \$40,000 and \$50,000. Plans and specifications have been approved by state engineers, the State Fire Marshal and the State Health Department. If construction follows the plans and specifications, the nursing home will receive its license as soon as it is completed and inspected.

A license for a nursing home permits medical care with a physician regularly visiting patients. All treatment and medications administered will be on the order of a physician. Skilled medical care will be provided in order to get a license, and nursing personnel will be on duty at all times. Patient and administrative records will be complete and written for all patients admitted to the nursing home.

The new home will be in the shape of an L, and will have 14 rooms—seven private and seven for two patients. Eight new rooms are being constructed and will join to the present motel which will be remodeled.

There will be a nurse's room, a doctor's examination room, large living room, recreation-sun room, dining room and kitchen. A hall will extend along the entire front of the building and be mostly glass enclosed. The courtyard will provide parking space and a shade area for the patients. The entire structure will be fire proof.

A total of 22 elderly and indigent patients can be cared for at the home. Six people will be employed for 24 hours of work. There will be three practical nurses—one on duty at all times—a helper for the nurse, a cook and a housekeeper.

Mrs. Bevin Hodge, who has been at Eastern State Hospital, Danville, for 13 years, will be in charge of the home and personnel.

This week, concrete block foundation is being laid at the home. P. J. Burke Jr., of Brodhead, is doing the building construction. A. H. Reynolds, of Brodhead, is doing the heating and plumbing. Crawford & Crawford, engineers, Renfro Valley, are the architects.

Mr. Sowder reported a patient can choose the doctor he or she wishes when needed. He said county doctors have agreed to cooperate. The home, though with modern medical facilities, will be unable to treat outside people. A nursing home does not compete with a hospital, it cooperates with a hospital, Mr. Sowder declared.

believes the Corps of Engineers would readily construct a dam at the Narrows since it has been "on the books" for many, many years.

He also believes Rockcastle citizens should go along with this site. If citizens go along, he believes, the dam will be under construction by this time next year. Get a dam at the Narrows, and then begin assembling necessary data for a dam on up the river, he advises.

Of course it may be true that the quickest way to get a dam would be to go along with his proposal. But before we do, we would like to hear from the Corps of Engineers on the whole matter. For example, it would be interesting to know if the Corps of Engineers would consider a dam at either of the two sites. We do not believe the Corps would be greatly interested in a dam that would necessitate the relocation of the City of Livingston and the Railroad tracks. But perhaps the Corps will have alternatives that will be more beneficial to the area than a site at the Narrows, and still not cover Livingston in water. This possibility should be thoroughly explored.

There are other questions that would be presented to the Corps of Engineers in regard to long range planning and the effects of the lake that will form.

(1) What effect would a large body of water in the south area of the county have on the routing of Interstate 75?

Suppose an added bridge is too expensive and not in the State Highway Department budget. Suppose the Highway Department decided to take the Highway an alternate route through Big Hill instead of straight through Rockcastle. Should this happen it could prove an economic disaster to Rockcastle.

(2) Will a continuous four feet of water at Livingston attract heavy, or moderately heavy industry? If not, the industrial advantage of a

dam at the Narrows is nullified as far as Livingston is concerned.

(3) What are the recreational advantages of four feet of water in the Livingston area?

(4) If a dam is constructed at the Narrows, would there be enough water for a second dam at the northwest of Livingston?

(5) Is a dam at the Narrows better than no dam at all?

(6) Why not build a dam north of Livingston and later a dam at the Narrows?

All these things we will want to know from the Corps of Engineers. As we have pointed out, to believe a dam on the Rockcastle River COULD benefit Livingston and Rockcastle County.

Let us all go to the meeting and find out what we can or cannot get. This is a very important meeting and the future of the county for years to come could well be decided in those two hours. There will be delegations from London, Somerset, and McKee and each will no doubt have a proposal to make. Rockcastle County citizens should be there to protect and promote their interests.

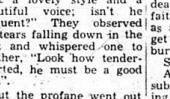
