ORDINANCE NO. 264

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF MT. VERNON, KENTUCKY, ACCURATELY DEFINING THE BOUNDARIES OF THE UNINCORPORATED TERRITORY PROPOSED TO BE ANNEXED TO THE PRESENT CITY BOUNDARY.

Vernon, situated in Rockcastle County, Kentucky, said point being in the line of the north boundary of School Street, adjoining the property of Roy Cummins, thence leaving the city limits line and with the property line of Roy Cummins and north degree 30 minutes W 12 feet to a fence post, corner to Jack St. Clair, said corner being the southeast corner of St. Clair lot; thence with line of St. Clair N 31 degrees E 150 feet, corner to Bullock thence with line of Bullock, N 60 1/2 degrees W 60 feet, intersecting the property line of St. Clair and being the southeast corner of line with Hodges and Bullock 175 feet, a total of 235 feet corner to Hodges, Bullock and Burgess Robbins, thence with the line of Burgess Robbins, S 31 W 150 feet to a crossing lane 28 feet, a total of 178 feet to corner of Dillingham, also being to corner to the north line of Crawford Sub-Division, N 60 1/2 W with the properties of Dillingham, Elaine D. Shuplet, C. A. 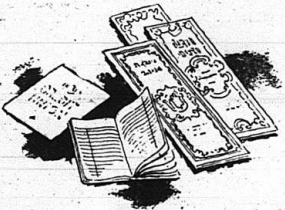

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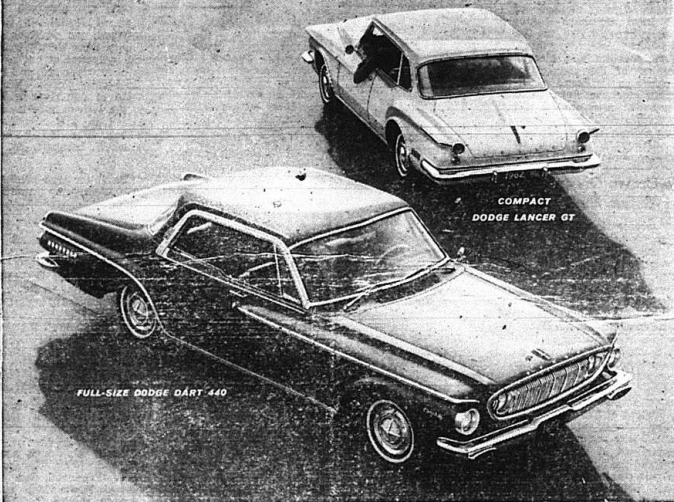

1962 Burley Land Should Be Chosen

Rockcastle County farmers were reminded this week that acreage diverted from the production of burley under the 1962 burley feed grain program must be devoted to an approved conservation use in order to comply with program provisions.

Chairman Shelle Mullins of the County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee issued the reminder this week. He also pointed out that such diverted acreage must represent

an increase of the acreage on the farm normally devoted to conservation uses.

Diverted acres may not be grazed after the final sign-up date for spring seeded crops and a crop must not be harvested from them. Weeds, corms, and insects must be controlled on the acreage as directed by the ASC, County Committee.

Crops of castor beans, rye, safflower, sunflower or sorghum may be grown and harvested on part or all of the diverted acreage. Although producing these crops makes the acreage planted ineligible for payment under the

barley feed-grain program, it does not prevent such acreage from counting toward the minimum diversion requirement for price support for barley produced on the farm.

Agricultural Conservation Program cost-share assistance may be available to farmers in establishing a conserving use on the diverted acres. Chairman Mullins said farmers should check with the ASCS office on available program assistance at the time they file the form indicating their intention to participate in the 1962 barley feed grain program.

Black Shank Control Method Due In Fall

If your tobacco field had black shank this year, here's your best control program, says Ira Massie, UK Cooperative Extension Service specialist:

(1) Immediately after harvest, seed the infected field to a permanent grass and a

legume and leave it out of tobacco production for at least the next four years. (2) After seeding, thoroughly clean all equipment used. One way to clean such field equipment is by washing it thoroughly on a field covered with heavy sod that will not be planted to tobacco in the near future. Be sure the touching parts (wheels, discs, etc.) are free of all dirt.

Massie cautioned farmers about use of tobacco stalks which came from infected crops. Black-shank or cork stalks should NOT go on land to be used in tobacco production. If they must be used, Massie says, put them on grass fields that will not go into tobacco within 3 or 4 years; and make sure drainage from these permanent grass fields is NOT on tobacco land.

gations for the betterment and improvement of the entire area. If we get into a fractional fight over the location all our testimony will be shelved and nothing will be accomplished for another four years," Mr. Joplin wrote.

The editor explained the oral testimony was presented on the basis of an eight-nine and 18 county area from information received from the Department of Economic Security, Department of Economic Development, Extension Service of the University of Kentucky, Bureau of Census, U. S. Department of Agriculture, U. S. Forestry Service and other agencies that have offices in Somerset. None of the testimony, Mr. Joplin reported, was restricted only to Pulaski County but was for the entire area.

"It took a lot of work to prepare the testimony. Three men spent a good part of a week, day and night, gathering the information and compiling it in to suitable briefs to present at the hearing. When we first arrived, first at Mt. Vernon and then at Renfro Valley, we talked with representatives of other delegations and assured them that in no way would we oppose construction of the dam at the Livingston site.

but that we would ask that the dam be constructed "somewhere on the Rockcastle River." We also said we would work for construction of two dams as originally were planned by the Corps of Engineers," Mr. Joplin declared.

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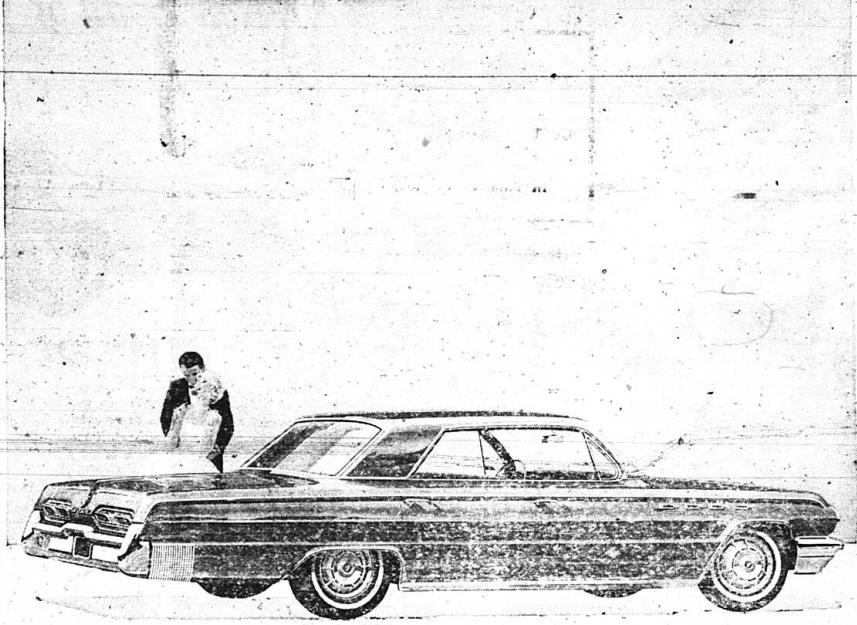
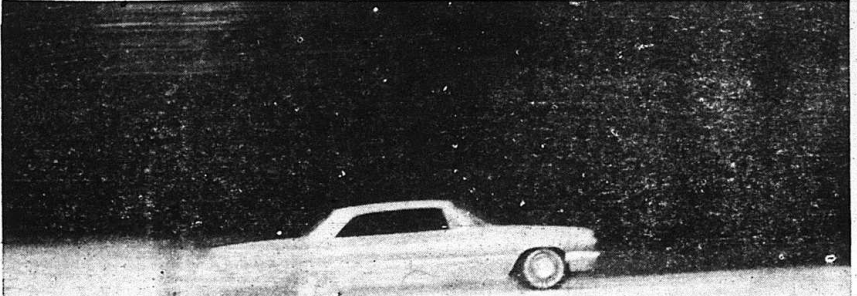
