Patsy Cummins, a University of Kentucky Sophomore and a graduate of Mt. Vernon High School, was chosen winner of Bel-Arena's local Queen's Contest at the skating rink Saturday night. She is now eligible to enter the State competition, and if successful there, she will go to Miami Beach for three days, all-expense-paid, and compete with other State winners on the National level.

Patsy became successful in the first stage of the contest by winning a decision over eleven other contestants from a panel of five judges. University Helps Rockcastle U Of K Man Tells C Of C

The University of Kentucky is a big, complex organization that serves students as well as the public, and as such, the public should support it.

So said Morris Cierley, professor of education and Chairman of the Division of Education Administration and Supervision at the University, at a meeting of the Rockcastle County Chamber of Commerce Tuesday night.

Mr. Cierley told those present the services offered by the University of Kentucky directly affects the economy of Rockcastle County. He also noted that H. Lee Durham, county agent, and Mrs. Kizzie Owens, home demonstration agent, are both U of K faculty members and both directly aid the people of Rockcastle County.

The professor gave statistics of the University, telling the group U of K has ten colleges; 62 buildings; 10,000 students currently and expecting an additional 100 new ones each year.

He pointed out to the C of C that the university has outgrown itself and needs to expand considerably to keep up with the world of science and education. He stressed the cost of additional faculty members is high as well as buildings.

Mr. Cierley reported the university will ask the next session of the State Legislature to appropriate \$2 million dollars to run the union.

money that came from me and was used on Lake Cumberland has already been paid back in the way of recreational facilities the lake has provided me. I feel the same about the proposed reservoirs on Laurel and Rockcastle.

The multi-purpose dams, it being proved, are paying their own way. This tax money appropriated for the area for the dams is actually a long-term investment which will repay more than we put into it.

Because of the proposed dam or dams on Rockcastle, I, along with 800 persons, attended a public hearing on the advisability of the project. I don't believe I ever went to a meeting before, when as many as 25 persons discussed a public issue that arguments did not arise before it was over.

However, at this session, which was moved from the Rockcastle County Courthouse to the Renfro Valley Barn to take care of the crowd, everyone was in complete harmony. It was a distinct pleasure to attend such a meeting. And from it, I believe the Rockcastle River reservoir will become an actuality instead of a dream that has been in the minds of those in the area for more than a score years.

Reservists, Guard Entitled To Leave

Reservists and members of the National Guard were reminded today that they are entitled to a leave of absence from their regular employment, upon request, for the purpose of performing training duty with the Armed Forces of the United States or the National Guard.

"This means that such persons are entitled to reinstatement with their employer after performing such duty," Regional Director of the Bureau of Veterans Reemployment Rights, U. S. Department of Labor, John W. Rogers, pointed out.

Mr. Rogers, however, cautioned those who seek such leave that a request must be duly made and that the employer must be notified of the day and time of regularly scheduled, weekly or week-

end drills and of any changes in drill schedules, and that further the trainee must submit an additional request for any other training duty such as Summer camp.

Mr. Rogers emphasized: (1) The employee must report for work at the beginning of the next regularly scheduled working period after expiration of the last calendar day necessary to travel from the training site to the place of employment, or within a reasonable time thereafter if the return is delayed due to factors beyond their control. Failure to report for work as required will subject the person to the conduct rules of the employer pertaining to explanations and discipline with respect to absences from scheduled work.

(2) The employee must be qualified to perform the duties of the position unless he sustained a disability during training duty. If the employee is unable to perform and is not qualified to perform the duties of his former position, he may be entitled to reemployment in another position the duties of which he is qualified to perform.

"If the employee meets the conditions of eligibility, he shall be permitted to return to his position with such seniority, status, pay and vacation as he would have had if he were not absent for training in the Armed Forces or the National Guard," Mr. Rogers said. "He shall not be disadvantaged with respect to any rights based on contract or practice due to his statutory leave for training."
