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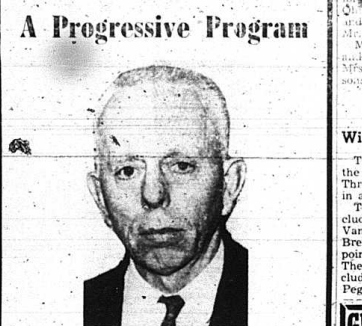

Tourist Potential Near Livingston

Livingston has great potential tourist attractions with Wildcat Battleground, Sucker Cave, Lee Carter and Rook and Castle Rock nearby, Ray McClure, editor of The Mount Vernon Signal, told the Livingston Parents-Teachers Association Monday night.

All groups and organizations in Rockcastle County should do everything possible to promote and publicize the Livingston area and work hard for a dam near the town, he said. McClure spoke to the group briefly on the Battle at Wildcat Mountain which took place 100 years ago this week. He recited events that took place during the days preceding and after the battle.

He enumerated three points which made the Battle at Wildcat important: (1) It was the first Civil War Battle in Kentucky (2) It delayed the Southern offensive and gave the Union time to prepare for future battles in other areas of Kentucky (3) Helped the morale of the Union badly in need of a victory at that time.

"Although the battle is not considered one of the great battles of the Civil War in numbers killed and wounded, the area in which this battle was fought should be preserved at least as a state shrine," he said.

With a lake at Livingston and the natural beauty of the landscape, Livingston could become one of the most desirable tourist areas in Kentucky, he concluded.

Civil War Parade Saturday

WILDCAT BATTLE 100 YEARS OLD

The first Civil War engagement on Kentucky soil that was important enough to be designated a battle was fought 100 years ago this week at Camp Wildcat near Livingston, and in Laurel County.

A strong position on Wildcat Mountain had been seized by Col. Theo. T. Garrard's Seventh Kentucky (Union) Infantry Regiment, supported by detachment of Col. Frank Work's First Kentucky (Union) Cavalry. In a heavily wooded country of rickety gorges, it would be difficult to attack and it commanded the junction of three roads which ran respectively to Richmond, Mt. Vernon and London.

Brig. Gen. George H. Thomas, U. S. Regular Army officer, had relieved Brig. Gen. William Nelson at Camp Dick Robinson and it was Thomas who had sent Garrard beyond the Rockcastle River to establish Camp Wildcat and oppose any advance by Confederate forces under Brig. Gen. Felix K. Zollicoffer, who had come from East Tennessee through Cumberland Gap into Kentucky in September.

On Oct. 17, Garrard had sent word to Thomas that Zollicoffer was advancing in force, and had asked for reinforcements. Thomas sent Brig. Gen. Albin Francisco Schoepf to his aid with the 33rd Indiana, the 17th Ohio, the 10th and 14th Maryland artillery, the rest of Col. Wolford's cavalry and two Tennessee Union regiments. Schenck was a Hungarian. (Continued on page 4)

The proceeds will go to the band to buy necessary equipment.

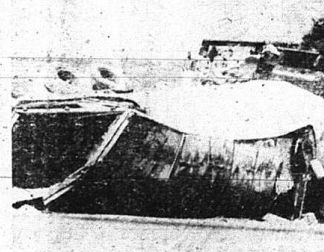
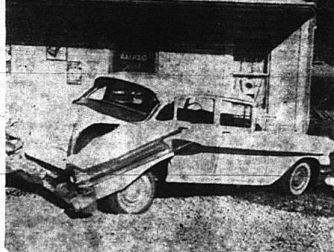
Report Taxes Again

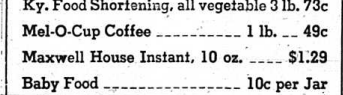
