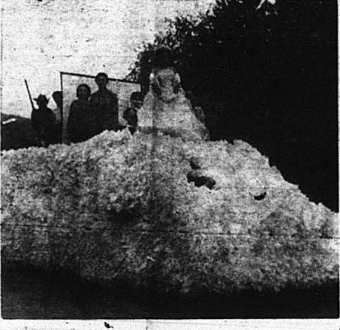

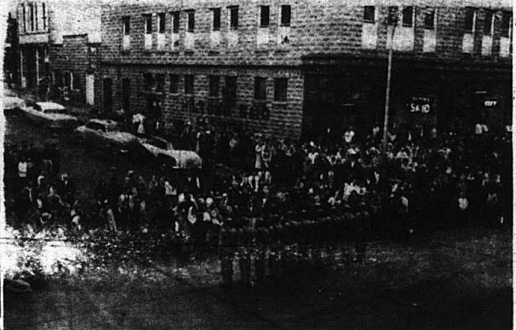

CORN SUPPORT PRICES SAME The U. S. Department of Agriculture today announced that the national average support price for 1961-crop corn will be \$1.20 per bushel, unchanged from the minimum "advance" support price announced March 22. The final county support rates will also remain unchanged from the minimum rates as announced June 27. Legislation authorizing the feed grain program for the 1961 crop provided that support for corn could be set at a level not less than 65 percent of parity. The support price of \$1.20 per bushel in March is 74.1 percent of the October corn parity price of \$1.62 per bushel. Since this is above the minimum legal level of 65 percent of parity, no change is being made in the 1961-crop corn support price as previously announced. Cooperators in the 1961 feed grain program are eligible for price-support on their share of the farm's normal production of corn. Producers have been notified of the normal production figures for their farms, or can get them from their county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) committees. To be in compliance with the 1961 feed grain program, cooperators must have diverted a minimum of 20 percent of their corn base acreage to conserving uses. USDA officials pointed out that the favorable weather throughout much of the corn-producing area, which is pushing corn yields to record levels, might prompt farmers to reassess their storage situation for this year's crop. They added that USDA's farm facility loan program under which producers may borrow up to 85 percent of the cost of farm storage structures is available to help producers obtain adequate farm storage capacities.

burley Land Should Be Prepared Now The 1961 burley tobacco crop is practically finished now. Harvesting and housing it will end under way. Test soils immediately after harvest. Fall sampling is virtually the same as far as results go-as-as spring sampling. In addition, soils are now in better shape for sampling and if liming is needed, it can be done this autumn. Phosphorus and potassium requirements established by fall sampling also vary so little from spring testing that the fall results can be safely used. Manure should be applied to the selected ground as it is produced during the fall and winter months. About 10 tons an acre is considered the maximum. Massive cautioned farmers to avoid fields known to have a history of the various tobacco diseases.
