State Explains Why Change in Tax Bills The separate property tax bill sent out by county tax commissioners on each motor vehicle owned in Kentucky is not for a new or additional tax, William S. Riley, chief of the Revenue Department's legal section, has pointed out. The separate bills were sent because of a new law requiring proof that the additional (property) tax has been paid on a motor vehicle before it can be licensed. "There is no new tax on motor vehicles nor does the new law impose double taxation," Riley said. "The additional tax on motor vehicles has long been part of Kentucky's property taxes, and the registration fee has also been in existence a long time—there is no new taxation under this law." The separate motor vehicle tax bills were sent de-

spite the fact that the Court of Appeals is yet to decide on the validity of the new law. It was declared unconstitutional by Franklin Circuit Court. The Revenue Department appealed this decision. 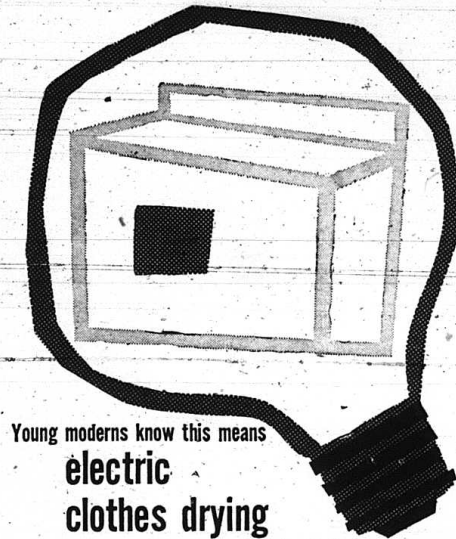

DR. BAKER (Continued from page 1) As a boy John Baker came to Berea to attend school and graduated from Berea Academy in 1921. He attended Berea College, Eastern State College and took his pre-medical training at the University of Louisville.

First Practice In Texas His first practice was in Seneca, Texas, in 1929. There he spent three years. He recalls many interesting experiences in that section of the country. One incident in particular stood out in his memory and that was a Mexican woman who came across the border to have her child so that it would be a United States citizen. He delivered the baby and it was the largest one he ever delivered and weighed over fourteen pounds. He went on to say that the Texas Rangers waited only a few days to return her to Mexico. "I often have wondered if that child was legally an American citizen," he said.

The Bakers returned to Kentucky in 1932 and set up an office in Mt. Vernon where he practiced for four years. In 1937 he came to Berea where he has practiced general medicine for 25 years. The greatest part of his work is in obstetrics. During his entire practice he has delivered around 8,000 babies.

When he first came here few mothers went to the hospital for delivery. He slipped how he would go for miles into the country and many times he would have to wait for twenty-four hours in the patient's home until time for the birth. Dr. John, as he is known by almost everyone, said that he later tried to induce expectant mothers to come to the Berea College Hospital for delivery. "If they came he would not charge a fee. He said that at the beginning of his practice here, only about 25 babies were born annually at the hospital, now a baby is seldom born at home. Smilingly he said, "It's a picnic for them to come to the hospital. I would have been very well off if even half of the patients had paid their fees."

Shorn Wool Price Set By Government A shorn wool incentive price of 62 cents per pound has been announced by the U. S. Department of Agriculture for the 1962 marketing year which begins April 1, 1962. The mahair support price is set at 74 cents per pound. According to Shelle Mullins, chairman, Rockcastle County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, the 1962 price for wool is the same as for the first 7 years of the program from 1955 through the 1961 marketing years. The mohair price is up 1 cent from the 73-cent level for 1961. Payments to producers for the 1962 marketing year will follow the same methods used for the current 1961 year. Shorn wool payments will be equal to a percentage of each producer's cash return from wool sales. The percentages will be based on the 1961 marketing year. The national average price received by all producers for shorn wool up to the incentive price of 62 cents per pound will be made to each producer who sells lamb that have never been shorn. The payments will be at a rate per hundredweight of live animals marketed to compensate for the weight of them on a basis comparable to the national average incentive payment per pound of shorn wool. Payments for the 1962 marketing year will be made on shorn wool and unshorn lambs marketed during the period April 1, 1962-March 31, 1963. Payments will be made in the summer of 1963 following the end of the marketing year. County ASCS Offices now are making payments for the 1960 marketing year, covering the period from April 1, 1960 through Mar. 31, 1961. The payment rate for shorn wool for 1960 was 47.6 percent, the percentage required to bring the average price of 42 cents per pound of shorn wool to the 62-cent incentive level. The result is a payment of \$47.60 for every \$100 received from the sale of shorn wool. The payment on unshorn lambs was 80 cents per hundredweight of live lambs marketed. On October 26, 1940 wool and lamb payment made to producers in Rockcastle County totaled about \$722.67.
