Council OKs Sewer System

GOVERNMENT LOAN WANTED



The federal government's Housing and Home Finance Agency this week began studying a preliminary survey of a sewer system for Mount Vernon following Thursday night's approval of a sewer system by the Mt. Vernon City Council.

The system is expected to cost about \$419,469. The council decided to proceed with the construction project if the money comes from a federal loan at a 3 and three-eighths percent interest rate, and provided the system is according to specifications of a preliminary survey by Crawford & Crawford, engineers, of Renfro Valley.

Just when the federal government agency will decide on the loan is anyone's guess. Any approval, or disapproval, could be several weeks or perhaps months, away.

At the meeting, the council also decided that should the federal government reject the city's application for a loan, it take another look at the proposed system before issuing bonds to a bonding company to pay construction.

Four councilmen voted for the resolution — Willis Craig, William L. Norton, Dr. Ruth H. Bradley and Floyd Owens. Delimiting the resolution for or against the resolution were David McCauley and Kenneth Cummings.

McCauley told the council he was for a sewer system but that he felt the citizens of the town should be polled before a decision was made.

He also said he believed the system incurred was too large for six men to decide on.

Mt. Vernon will have to borrow about \$370,000 to construct the system, including a sewage disposal plant. The loan will be paid through revenue bonds over a 30 year period. The remaining \$52,000 will come from out-going grants, including one from the State Health Department.

Water users in Mt. Vernon will have an increase in water rates plus a sewer charge when the system is finished. It is estimated the base water rate will be upped from the present \$2 to \$3.50 when the sewer rate is expected to be about 50 percent of the base water rate, bringing the total sewer charge water rate to \$4.95 monthly.

VOTES \$6 FEE FOR ARRESTS

The part-time work status of City Policeman Jesse Baker was changed to full-time at a meeting of the Mt. Vernon City Council Thursday night.

To pay pay of Policeman Baker's salary, the Council voted five to one to re-establish the \$6 arresting officer fee in City Police Court. Voting "no" was Councilman William L. Norton.

In short, the arresting officer will get \$6 for every conviction in police court as did police officers until about four years ago when it was discontinued following a controversy over police arresting methods.

At that time, the fee was discontinued and the police judge at the time was put on a \$100 a month salary. The only fee charged since that time has been a \$5 per conviction fee going to City Atty. John Allen.

In order to pay the salary of Policeman Baker, Police Chief Walter Shepherd and Policeman Carl Kelley agreed to a \$25 a month reduction in salary. The \$50 will be added to Baker's salary. At the end of the month the arresting officer fees will be totalled and divided three ways by the officers.

In casting a "no" vote, Councilman Norton told those present he had "every confidence, in the honesty and integrity" of the present policemen, but that he is "opposed to giving arresting officer fees directly to policemen."

It was reported by Police Judge Larney Durham that fines and costs in police court in November totalled \$12,500.

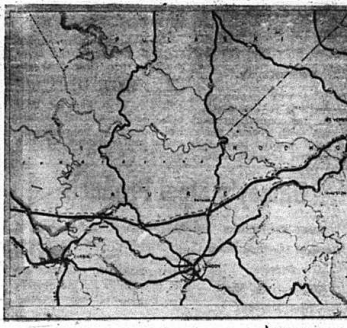

State Discusses I-75 At Berea Meet

The economy of an area seldom suffers greatly from the construction of a super-highway, but it does call for adjustments in the community.

Such was the gist of a public meeting being held on the Berea College Campus when the Signal went to press today.

On hand for the meeting were State Highway Department officials, Rockcastle and Madison counties officials from Mt. Vernon, Berea, Richmond, Broedhead and Livingston, as well as plain residents who live along the proposed route of Interstate 75.

The meeting was called to talk over the proposed route and to see if anyone in the counties would protest the route. About the only doubt in the minds of some was how the road would affect personal property, and most of these inquiries appeared to be of a minor nature.

Reasons for the proposed route to the east of Mt. Vernon were enumerated by the State Highway Department as:

(1) Shorter distance and less cost.

(2) Will allow close tie-in of present US 25.

(3) To help Mt. Vernon.

(4) To help Renfro Valley.

The delegation from Mt. Vernon that attended the meeting went on record approving the routing which is to be about 2 miles east of Mt. Vernon and in a semi-circle around the town. Most of the members of the delegation felt the east routing of the highway would benefit Mt. Vernon more than a route to the west of the town.

The Rockcastle County Chamber of Commerce presented the State Highway Department with a letter

from the chamber approving the routing of the highway.

The same type meeting was held Thursday morning at London to familiarize Laurel and Whitley counties residents of the routing of the highway.

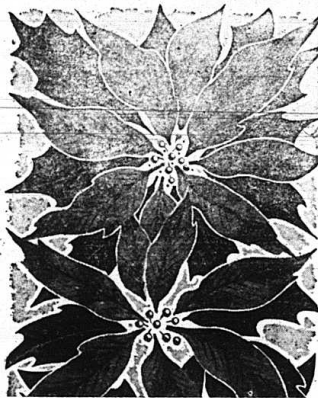
