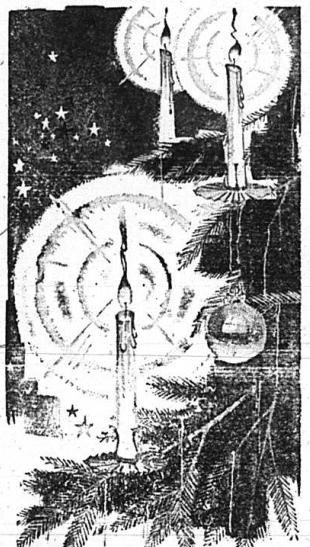

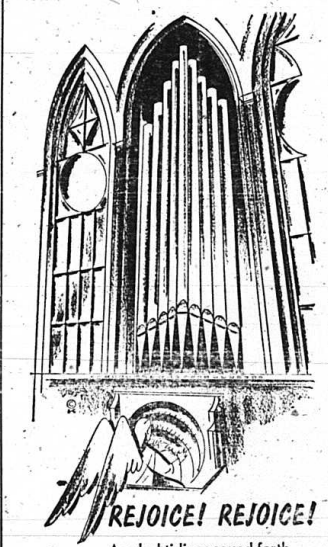

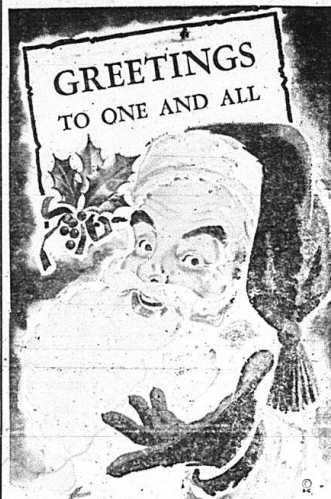

## Tobacco Allotments Being Accepted

Applications for 1962 new grower tobacco allotments are now being accepted in the Rockcastle County ASCS Office according to an announcement made by Shelle Mullins, Chairman.

Mr. Mullins pointed out that in order to qualify for a new grower tobacco allotment, all of the following requirements must be met:

- (1) Have had at least two years experience within the last 5 years (1957 - 1961) in growing the type of tobacco requested in the application as owner, operator, share-tenant or cash renter.
- (2) Own the farm.
- (3) Operate the farm.
- (4) The farm must not have a 1962 allotment for any kind of tobacco other than the allotment requested in the application.
- (5) Shall obtain, during 1962, more than 50 percent of his income from the production of agricultural commodities or products from the farm for which the new farm allotment application is filed.
- (6) The operator shall own, or otherwise have readily.

Atty. John Y. Brown, who is representing Price, filed two motions in court this week. One motion asked that the court set bond for Price. This motion had not been acted on when the Signal went to press.

A second motion, and one granted by Judge Tartar, asked that the trial be continued to the regular March term of Circuit Court so the Attorney Brown could have more time with his client.

Judge Tartar studied the motion and set a special date for the trial. A new jury will be chosen to hear the trial.

Price was arrested following the shooting that occurred the morning of December 3 on Price's property at Sand Springs. The shooting occurred in a wooded area about a quarter of a mile from Price's home. Miss Vance pronounced dead on arrival at the Rockcastle County Baptist Hospital.

Price has been in jail since the shooting.

In other action this week a jury failed to agree on the case of William Chasteen and Lynn Brewer, both of Big Hill area, accused of shooting into a truck belonging to the Berea Lumber Company and driven by John Hamer.

Hamer had taken a load of lumber to a school at Orlando and was returning to Berea when the shooting was alleged to have taken place.

Everyone wants Interstate 75, but no one wants the interchanges located as proposed -- except Mt. Vernon and Berea.

This was clearly illustrated at two public meetings held last week by the State Highway Department to get the public's ideas on a proposed route for Interstate 75 from Richmond to the Tennessee line.

The first meeting was held at London, and civic, business and political leaders were of the opinion the proposed route through Laurel and Whitley counties would destroy tourist business in London and Corbin.

Representatives of both towns were emphatically opposed to the route proposed by the State Highway Department. London and Corbin wants the route within a mile or so of the two towns.

As planned the route will by-pass London and Corbin from 6 to 8 miles.

The value of tourist business at the two communities was estimated at the meeting to be \$9,000,000 annually. All contended that unless the route is altered to London and Corbin, tourists will by-pass the two towns for accommodations in other communities with interchanges near the towns.

Though naming no towns specifically, it appeared those who attended believed, with London and Corbin, seven to eight miles away from interchanges, tourists probably would go on north to Mt. Vernon and Berea to spend the night. Both these towns are close to interchanges.

One representative from Corbin remarked it was strange to him that London and Corbin with millions invested in the tourist business, is missed seven to eight miles by I-75 and has one interchange, while "another town" along the way has two interchanges and its closest to London doesn't have half the amount invested in tourist business.

The only town with two interchanges south of Richmond is Mt. Vernon. According to the Highway Department, these were planned to take care of Benfro Valley and US 150, located some three miles apart.

When the hearing at London had concluded, the group had a one on record disapproving the route through Laurel and Whitley.

State Highway Commissioner Henry Ward promised the group the department would take another look at the routing.

At Berea, it was another story for Commissioner Ward. There was not a single voice raised against the proposed route. Commissioner Ward remarked it was refreshing to see such a large group in complete harmony.

Those in harmony were from Mt. Vernon, Berea and Richmond, as well as other sections of Madison and Boone counties.

The question of interchanges slipped into the background.

rea meeting as expected. A Richmond delegation, led by Dr. Robert Martin, president of Eastern Kentucky State College, asked the Highway Department to consider an interchange from Richmond to Barnes Mill Road. Doctor Martin said it was more feasible and would help cut traffic through downtown Richmond. A representative of Berea College suggested two interchanges at Berea. The Commissioner said there "isn't a chance."

Dr. R. G. Webb, of Livingston, in a letter read at the meeting, suggested an interchange at a point where I-75 is proposed to cross the

non, there was nothing, but "aves" on the proposed route, those who discussed the location pointed out the advantages Mt. Vernon would have because of the proposed route.

Commissioner Ward told the group the cost of the 39 miles of interstate highway would be approximately \$42,200,000. He said the route proposed at the meeting would be the route the state would suggest to the Federal Bureau of Highways in Washington as the most feasible and economical route.

Concerning a construction timetable for I-75, J. C. Cobb, of the United States Bureau of Public Roads, was questioned by the Signal:

Mr. Cobb would it be probable that by this time next year construction will be going on in this area on I-75? He replied: "I would say more probable in two, two-and-a-half years. There's considerable preliminary work to be done."

A second question to Mr.

Cobb: Will the next construction be from Richmond south through Rockcastle rather than from Jellico north? He answered: "We will construct south from Richmond."

Another question: Will the present US 25 be maintained at a high level?

Answer: "We will keep US 25 in top shape."

Question: Has a more easterly route, say through Manchester, been considered seriously? Answer: "It has certainly been considered, but this is the proposed route we have shown here at the meeting."
